Background

Following the revision of civilian oversight ordinances, the Auditor and the Board focused on establishing systems and processes under the new framework including:

- A signed MOU with the Police Department
- Case management system IAPro
- Restructured Board training program
- Participation in City events and community engagement opportunities

Auditor maintains full access to APD records, systems, evidence, and personnel

- Full access to APD, including Chief of Police & Office of Professional Responsibility (OPR)
- All Auditor staff maintain CJIS certification authorizing access to confidential personal information
- Weekly meetings with Chief McGuire, Office of Professional Responsibility and APD leadership
- Collaboration and open communication on media releases and investigations.



Auditing & Oversight Infrastructure

- Regular meetings and communication with APD leadership
- Monthly case reviews with Office of Professional Responsibility
- APD Leadership & Office of Professional Responsibility attendance at Board Meetings and sharing of information

Complaints and Investigations: Overview

- The Auditor received 8 complaints and 4 commendations regarding officer conduct
 - 3 of 8 complaints within Auditor's jurisdiction & investigations completed
 - ▶ 3 of 8 complaints not within Auditor's jurisdiction or referred to another entity/department
 - ▶ 2 of 8 complaints are ongoing investigations due to non-responsive complainant
- The Auditor is conducting an administrative investigation on the in-custody death of Allan Tucker; Board will review in 2026

In-Custody Death: Allan Tucker

- There are 3 independent investigations into the August 15th
 Critical Incident:
 - Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT): criminal investigation determining whether the officer(s) involved will face criminal charges.
 - Alexandria Police Department administrative investigation by Office of Professional Responsibility to determine violation of APD Directives.
 - Auditor's administrative investigation to determine violation of APD Directives and City administrative regulations.

Critical Incidents



In-Custody Death: Allan Tucker

Timeline of Investigation

- Auditor immediately notified within 30 minutes of incident
- Auditor notified members of the Independent Community Police Review Board and arranged de-brief meetings for the following days/weeks.
- Auditor reviewed body-worn camera footage with Chief of Police, CMO, and CAO.
- Auditor confirmed access to all relevant records and evidence, including reports by CIRT, Medical Examiner's Office and other outside agencies.
- All records and evidence are reviewed upon receipt from APD and the CIRT team.

Upcoming

- CIRT final report and Medical Examiner's report pending
- Auditor will release final report within 14 days of CIRT final recommendations
- Board public hearing expected early 2026

Critical Incidents



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Auditor Policy Reviews – PowerDMS

- APD shares all policy updates and revisions with the Auditor
- Once received, the Auditor reviews before signing-off in PowerDMS.
- Questions and concerns on the policy are communicated to Chief of Police and John East, Captain of OPR.
- 2025 Policies Reviewed by the Auditor: Arrests, License Plate Readers, and Truancy.
