Such changes would be based on changes to Phase 1A anticipated and/or Phase 1B services per the Phase 1A Basis of Design Report, additional work should the City receive additional funding via grants (i.e. FEMA BRIC grant or other), and/or the development of proposals for Early Work Packages; and (3) authorized the City Manager to further amend the Proposed Interim Agreement to allow for Early Work Package amendment(s) up to an additional maximum of \$5,000,000. Early Work Packages may include: Advanced preparation of work areas, early site/civil packages for utility/infrastructure repair or replacement, and/or advanced purchase of long-lead, high-risk, or cost-sensitive materials, selective demolition and/or replacement of aged, failing, or high-risk infrastructure, consistent with the stated scope of work.

RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT AN APPLICATION TO THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION FOR FY 2023 SAFE STREETS AND ROADS FOR ALL FUNDING

WHEREAS, in 2021, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act) was signed into law and funded \$1 billion annually from FY 22-27 for the U.S. Department of Transportation's Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) discretionary grant program; and

WHEREAS, up to \$1 billion is available in FY 2023 from the SS4A Program; and

WHEREAS, the SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries, and supports Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg's National Roadway Safety Strategy and USDOT's goal of zero deaths and serious injuries on our nation's roadways; and

WHEREAS, the Alexandria City Council adopted the Vision Zero Policy and Action Plan in 2017, which include a goal to eliminate fatal and severe injury crashes by 2028; and

WHEREAS, the Alexandria City Council adopted the Alexandria Mobility Plan in 2021, which aims to improve mobility, access, safety, and convenience for all road users; and

WHEREAS, the Alexandria City Council desires to submit an application to the SS4A program for up to \$5,000,000 for Fiscal Year 2023 to implement safety improvements at the intersections of Duke Street and South Patrick Street and Duke Street and South Henry Street;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALEXANDRIA:

1. Hereby supports the application for up to \$5,000,000 from the Safe Streets and Roads and All Program through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Fiscal Year 2023 call for projects; and

2. The City Council hereby commits to include up to \$1,000,000 in funds for the local match, if awarded, in its Capital Improvement Program budget; and

3. Hereby grants authority for the City Manager to execute project administration agreements and any other necessary documents to execute the SS4A grant.

18. City Council adopted a Consideration of a Resolution to Establish the 2023 Personal Property Tax Relief Rates.

RESOLUTION NO. 3172

RESOLUTION TO SET THE RELIEF RATES UNDER THE PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX RELIEF ACT

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 58.1-3524 of the Code of Virginia and Section 3-2-224 of the City Code, City Council has the authority to establish the relief rates assessed for vehicles; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3-2-224(e)(5) of the City Code, the City is required to set the relief rates annually by resolution; and

WHEREAS, City Council has now determined that it is necessary and desirable to set the relief rates as follows.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCILOF THE CITY OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA:

1. That the relief rate for vehicles under City Code Section 3-2-224(e)(5)(A) is 52%; and

2. That the relief rate for vehicles under City Code Section 3-2-224(e)(5)(B) is 27%; and

3. That the relief rate for vehicles under City Code Section 3-2-224(e)(5)(C) is 14%; and

4. That the rates set forth above may vary due to changes related to the vehicles subject to the tax that occur before the tax bills are issued; and

5. That this Resolution shall be effective for Calendar Year 2023.

19.City Council adopted a Resolution to Support Establishment of a Joint City Council/School Board School Law Enforcement Partnership Subcommittee.

The resolution reads as follows:

Resolution No. 3173

WHEREAS, City Council wishes to establish a temporary subcommittee in support of the School and Law Enforcement Partnership (SLEP);

WHEREAS, the City Council and Alexandria City Public Schools Board support continuous improvement and collaboration on the responsibilities of school resource officers (SROs);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA:

1. That there is hereby established a School and Law Enforcement Partnership SRO Subcommittee;

2. That the School and Law Enforcement Partnership SRO Subcommittee shall consist of four (4) members, as follows:

a. Two (2) members of City Council

b. Two (2) members of the Alexandria City Public Schools Board

3. That the Mayor shall appoint the two City Council members of the School and Law Enforcement Partnership SRO Subcommittee, naming one as chairperson.

4. That the School Board chair shall appoint the two School Board members of the School and Law Enforcement Partnership SRO Subcommittee.

5. That one staff representative from both the City and Alexandria City Public Schools shall be named to help support the Subcommittee's work.

6. That the functions of the School and Law Enforcement Partnership SRO Subcommittee shall be to:

a. Review common structures of SRO programs and best practices for policing in K-12 schools, including the roles and responsibilities of SROs;

b. Review empirical research on student outcomes associated with SRO programs, including program evaluation options that measure quantifiable impacts on school climate and safety;

c. Develop recommendations for 2025 MOU revisions for consideration in a future joint City Council and School Board work session during the 2023-24 school year.

7. That pursuant to City Code Section 2-4-8, the School and Law Enforcement Partnership SRO Subcommittee shall meet on an ad hoc basis and will be formed for an initial duration of no more than one year from the date the group holds its initial meeting, with the goal of completing its work by December 2023. The Subcommittee will report to a joint work session during the 2023-24 school year. If necessary, the duration may be extended by City Council by resolution for an additional one (1) year period up to three times for a total duration of three (3) years.

8. That the School and Law Enforcement Partnership SRO Subcommittee shall cease to exist upon (i) the completion of its enumerated functions, (ii) the date it submits its final oral or written report to City Council and the Alexandria City School Board, (iii) the expiration of the term specified in this Resolution or of any extensions, or (iv) three years from the date of its initial meeting, whichever comes first.

The vote was as follows: In favor, Mayor Wilson, Vice Mayor Jackson, Councilman Aguirre, Councilmember Bagley, Councilman Chapman, Councilwoman Gaskins, and Councilman McPike; Opposed, none.
