# IV. ORAL REPORTS

City Council on Boards, Commissions and Committees:

\*Children, Youth and Families Collaborative Commission (CYFCC) (Councilwoman Gaskins and Councilmember Bagley)

Councilwoman Gaskins reported that the executive committee met to discuss what the Commission would like to see included in the City's legislative package as it relates to childcare crisis as ARPA and other funding sources diminish and continued investment in youth mental health resources. Councilman Gaskins reported that the committee discussed priorities for the year for the Commission including inclusion of more youth voices in their discussion. Councilwoman Gaskins noted that on October 5 there would be a Youth and Caring Adults Summit held at First Baptist Church.

# \*Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC) (Councilmember Bagley and Councilman Aguirre)

Councilmember Bagley reported that NVTC discussion the upcoming Commuter Choice funding round for the I-66 corridor with a substantially larger pool of money to allocate for use. Councilmember Bagley reported that there was discussion on BRT for the region and was a presentation on how BRT would impact bus services in the area. Councilmember Bagley noted that there will be a legislative forum held at George Mason University on December 1 to discuss transit issues in the region.

# \*Virginia Railway Express (VRE) (Councilmember Bagley)

Councilmember Bagley reported that the Fare Free Friday program contributed to an increase in ridership for the system and there was a discussion how to convert those riders into customers on other days. Councilmember Bagley noted that there would be an upcoming discussion of fares for the service, including the possibility of a Saturday service.

Councilman McPike noted that item #13 is the Resilient Alexandria report compiled by the Citizen Corps Council and thanked them for their work on the project.

# Alexandria Renew Enterprises Subcommittee (Mayor Wilson and Vice Mayor Jackson)

Mayor Wilson reported that there would be some road impacts to Jamieson Avenue that have been ongoing and beginning the first week of October there would be full road closures until January 2024. Mayor Wilson reported that there will be three community listening session held this week at various locations in the community about the construction works for the system.
