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# OPENING

#### 1. Calling the Roll.

Mayor Euille called the meeting to order. All members of Council were present.

#### 2. Public Discussion Period.

1. Susan Newell, 101 W. Linden Street, chair, Alexandria Social Services Advisory Board, spoke about the well-being of all Alexandria, helping one another and themselves along the way. She said the players are the Social Services Advisory Board, the Federal Government, the Virginia Department of Social Services, the Mayor and City Council, Department of Community and Human Services, the administration staff and clients of DCHS, residents, boards and commissions, and businesses. She said who they are becomes more clear when examined in the larger context. Ms. Newell said they are tasked with all matters pertaining to the social welfare of Alexandrians and acting as the public welfare social advisory board, and their collective purpose can be summarized as advancing the well-being of all Alexandrians. 2. Charles Ziegler, 30 N. Langley Street, vice president for advocacy, Friends of the Beatley Central Library, spoke about the one percent of the budget that is spent on the public library system and it is a wise investment to fund fully the library budget this fiscal year. He said the library supports English language learners by offering free English courses every week, offers hundreds of programs for children to support early literacy and school readiness, providing individual research assistants, meeting room space and technology access to small business owners, providing assistance to job seekers by providing assistance with writing resumes and cover letters and free computers and wireless services. He said that in FY2015, over 1.3 million items were borrowed from the library and there were over 1 million visits to the library and virtual library, and almost 50,000 people attended library programs. He said the Friends of the Beatley Central Library provides support for the library. Mr. Ziegler thanked Council for its past support of the libraries and hoped support would be forthcoming in the 2016 budget.

3. Nancy Blanton, 2181 Jamieson Avenue, said she is a Friend of the Beatley Central Library and she spoke in support of funds for the Alexandria Public Library, noting many examples of return on investment, including bringing children to the library to introduce them to books, participating in story times, provides opportunities for adult learners to further their education in different ways, for English language learners, technology and databases, research assistance and workshops on many things. Ms. Blanton said the libraries provide tremendous support for academic achievement and this is the kind of return on investment they should be seeking.

4. Bert Ely, 200 S. Pitt Street, spoke about the pending proposal to mitigate flood damage along the Alexandria waterfront, and noted that it is important to do flood mitigation properly and in a cost-effective manner. He said the flood mitigation plan currently on the table will create the worst of all worlds - it will be costly, ineffective and will cause more damage than if the City did nothing. He submitted an analysis of the City's pending flood mitigation plan, which is based on the 2010 flood mitigation study. He said a better, more cost-effective way to mitigate flooding along the waterfront is by constructing a lower four-foot elevation gravity based system that will not be subject to federal regulation. Mr. Ely said the estimated cost of the project exceeds any benefit the six-foot elevation mitigation plan might deliver, and it is not too late to go back to the drawing board and is essential that the City do so. He said City Council must demand the preparation of a new cost benefit analysis that contrasts a four-foot gravity system against a six-foot pumping based system and should be conducted by a third party organization without previous ties to the City.

Mayor Euille asked staff to report back to Council at the legislative meeting on February 10, so it can have more conversation about the issue.

Mr. Jinks, Acting City Manager, said staff will be prepared to speak to this on January 27.

5. Dino Drudi, 315 N. West Street, said Council has to be careful that they don't set up something that ends up being the butt of jokes and studied in law, engineering and architecture books as a textbook example of a really big screw up, as happened with Montgomery County's Silver Spring transit center. Mr. Drudi said that some months ago, he encouraged Council for the metro station development to look at option B alternative of moving the railroad track. He asked Council if it has any plans to take park land to put the metro station in the option B location.

Mayor Euille noted that they are considering the options.

Mr. Jinks, Acting City Manager, noted that all the alternatives will be covered in the draft environmental impact statement process.

6. Paul Alfieri, 614 Melrose Street, spoke in opposition to rezoning the Woodbine Convalesce Center, which is currently zoned for residential and for which there is a proposal to rezone it to a bigger and high density commercial building. He said it will be detrimental to the neighborhood if that happens.

7. Jim Kapsis, 24 E. Windsor Avenue, chair of the Environmental Policy Commission, spoke of the long-range planning work program, noting that the Commission has a strong concern with two of the recommendations. One is to think about how it updates the green building policy, which is five years old, as well as the environmental action plan. The recommendation of staff to Council on Tuesday's docket puts green building policies update into FY2018 and on the environmental action plan, it pushes it into FY2017. He said they are already behind in updating these policies, and the Commissioners are working to update these now and if there isn't support in the work plan, it is unclear how they can move forward. Mr. Kapsis asked Council to strongly consider pushing both the green building policy review and the environmental action plan review into FY2016.

Mayor Euille noted that he would provide an opportunity for the EPC to be part of the dialogue at Tuesday's meeting.

8. Joe Valenti, 1200 Braddock Place, spoke about his attendance at two public forums, one on criminal justice and community partnerships and the second on an Arlandria community forum. Mr. Valenti said the Arlandria forum was overflowing and was designed to draw out the community and was an example of the City coming into the community and doing culturally relevant and competent outreach and making sure that major issues that affect City residents are taken to venues where individuals are comfortable in their own communities. He said he wants to make sure there is an effort made to bring in as many voices as possible when looking at community forums. Mr. Valenti said on the affordable housing proposal on the docket today, he asked Council to maintain a commitment to housing that goes beyond individual projects and make sure that housing as a priority continues as it looks to the difficult budget situation.

9. Bradley Sampson, 1218 Wilkes Street, said he is the contact person for Narcotics Anonymous, and the meetings at the Lee Center and their room request application was reviewed and due to changes in policy, there is now an hourly fee requirement for use, and their group has met at the Lee Center since 1988 and 1993. He said they are a non-profit organization, and the function is to provide a suitable and reliable environmental for recovery, and maintaining the same location weekly has enabled them to share the message so that those who might benefit from the program can find them. Mr. Sampson asked that their organization be grandfathered into free use of space.

Mr. Spengler, Director, Recreation, Parks and Cultural Activities, responded to questions of City Council regarding the policy that was put in place in October 2013. He said that in this particular case, they have reached out to DCHS to see if this can be identified as an affiliate program of DCHS and they expect a positive response so that it will qualify as a no

charge use. If that doesn't work, they would work to develop a memo of agreement that would spell out services so they could use the facility at no cost.

10. Brett Egusa, 612 Melrose Street, spoke about the Woodbine Convalesce Center, and said it is a dispute about whether a developer can develop an adjacent triangular piece of property next to the existing Woodbine property into a for-profit commercial assisted living enter. He asked Council to consider if there is an actual need in the City for the assisted living in the City, and if there is a need, why is that need necessary to go about changing the zoning for the parcel of land.

11. Bill Goff, 1313 Bishop Lane, said that in 2005, the City did a report on an All City Sports Facility, that would include recreational and high school sports. He said he understands the City will be given a free field with lights and turf, located in the Eisenhower Avenue area. Mr. Goff said it would be a great all sports facility for recreation and high school sports, and he recommended that Council consider the site.

(2) private enterprise and investment are not reasonably expected, without assistance, to produce the construction or rehabilitation of decent, safe and sanitary housing and supporting facilities that will meet the needs of low and moderate income persons and families in the Area and will induce other persons and families to live within the Area and thereby create a desirable economic mix of residents in the Area.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that pursuant to Section 36-55.30:2.A of the Code of Virginia 1950, as amended, the Area is hereby designated as a revitalization area.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 4920

AN ORDINANCE to amend and reordain Article K (ALEXANDRIA COMMISSION FOR THE ARTS), Chapter 4 (COMMITTEES, BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS), of Title 2 (GENERAL GOVERNMENT) of The Code of the City of Alexandria, Virginia, 1981, as amended.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF ALEXANDRIA HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Article K, Chapter 4, all of Title 2 of the Code of the City of Alexandria, Virginia, 1981, as amended, be, and the same hereby is, amended and reordained by the amendment of Sections 2-4-90 and 2-4-91, to read as follows.

Sec. 2-4-90 Creation, composition and organization.

- (a) There is hereby established a standing commission known as the Alexandria Commission for the Arts.
- (b) The commission shall consist of 16 members to be appointed by the <u>C</u>ity <u>C</u>ouncil. The composition of the commission shall be as follows:

(1) five members shall have expertise in the arts, either as practitioners of various art disciplines or as professional administrators working in the field;

(1) <u>four member shall have expertise in the arts, including, but not limited to,</u> <u>arts educators, professional practitioners of various art disciplines and</u> <u>professional administrators working in the arts;</u>

- (2) three members shall have specific expertise in visual arts either as professional practitioners of visual art, curators of visual art, or as professional arts administrators currently working in the field;
- (3) five three members shall represent the public at large, as arts consumers and <u>or</u> participants;
- (4) five three members shall represent be professionals in fields relevant arts, educational or business expertise relative to arts and cultural development, including such perspectives cultural planning, marketing, finance, funding, tourism, promotion, and non profit organizational development, and real estate development;
- (5) <u>two members shall be professionals in the field related to the visual</u> appearance of the cityscape, such as architecture, environmental design, landscape architecture or urban design; and
- (6) one member shall be a student who resides in the City and attends a high school located in the City of Alexandria.
- (c) Members of the commission shall be appointed in the manner prescribed by article A of this chapter. The members shall serve for a term of three years, except in the case of an appointment to fill the unexpired portion of a term.
- Sec. 2-4-91 Function; powers; duties.
  - (a) The functions of the Commission shall be as follows:
    - (1) to support the development and expansion of the arts and the expansion of public access to and participation in the arts, in Alexandria;
    - (2) to serve as an advisory body for the arts in Alexandria;
    - (3) to advise the city council concerning appropriate policies that will strengthen the arts and further public access to the arts in Alexandria;
    - (4) to serve as the single funding source for all activities concerning arts which are not conducted as part of the regularly scheduled city program, including:
      - (a) the establishment and periodic review of criteria and standards for grant applications for city funds and accountability for the use of such funds, and
      - (b) the allocation to particular arts activities from such funds as may be appropriated from time to time by the city council for such purpose;
    - (5) to seek national, state and private support on behalf of the arts in Alexandria, and
    - (6) to prepare and submit to city council a cultural plan for the City of Alexandria and revisions thereto.
    - (1) to advise City Council with regard to policies that will strengthen the arts and further public access to the arts and cultural matters identified by the City Council;

- (2) to establish and periodically review criteria and standards for arts grant applications for City funds and accountability for the use of such funds; the allocation from such funds to eligible organizations and activities as may be appropriated by the City Council for such purpose;
- (3) to review the public art annual work plan as developed by the Office of the Arts and a work plan task force and make recommendations to the City Council as part of the budget process:
- (4) to review and approve public art project plans for specific public art projects, and to review and approve artist selection and concept development;
- (5) to create committees and task forces, as necessary, to focus on public art project development and artist selection;
- (6) to review proposals for donations of public art and commemorative art and make recommendations to the City Council;
- (7) to collaborate with the Office of the Arts on public art project evaluations; and
- (8) to support public communication and outreach as related to the arts and;
- (9) to serve as citizen liasons to City planning initiatives when public art is involved.

(b) The commission is empowered to adopt rules and regulations in regard to procedure and other matters so long as the same are not inconsistent with the city code, including, but not limited to, the establishment of committees, through w to carry on its functions and purpose.

(c) A commission chair, vice-chair and secretary shall be elected annually by the commission members at the organization meeting designated in the commission's bylaws.

(d) The commission shall hold at least 10 regular meetings each year, and as many special meetings as the commission may deem advisable.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall become effective upon passage.

(r) Cell phone and mobile device use. Drivers shall not use cell phones or other mobile devices when transporting passengers except for emergencies and trip related activities.

Sec. 9-12-81 - Requirements for vehicles.

Every taxicab and the equipment used in connection therewith, subject to a vehicle permit pursuant to this division, shall at all times comply with the following minimum standards:

(k) Two-way radios. Every taxicab shall be equipped with a two-way radio, properly installed and kept in working order at all times. Such radios shall be operated in compliance with the regulations of the Federal Communications Commission. Each radio unit will have a properly operating device that provides the ability to conduct a twoway conversation with the taxicab dispatcher. The hack inspector shall be provided with the serial number of each radio.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall become effective upon the date and at the time of its final passage.

WHEREUPON, upon motion by Councilman Wilson, seconded by Councilwoman Pepper and carried 6-0, City Council approved the regular meeting minutes of January 13, 2015, as amended by the City Clerk to correct the number 76 to 767 on page 20 of the minutes. The voting was as follows: In favor, Mayor Euille, Vice Mayor Silberberg, Councilman Chapman, Councilwoman Pepper, Councilman Smedberg and Councilman Wilson; Opposed, none. (Councilmember Lovain was absent.)

# ORAL REPORTS FROM CITY COUNCIL ON BOARDS, COMMISSIONS AND COMMITTEES.

- \* WMATA (Mayor Euille)
- \* Council of Governments (Mayor Euille)

Mayor Euille reported that the budget process with WMATA is underway and it will be a challenging budget process. He said everything is on the table to address the shortfall. He said they are dealing with safety and service delivery as well. As a result of the incident a couple of weeks ago, as chair of the COG Board of Directors, he has coordinated with the COG staff that most of the meeting will be a joint meeting between COG and WMATA to talk about safety and protocol.

Mayor Euille noted that the Virginia Municipal League has its VML Day on Wednesday in Richmond, and many members of City Council will be there.

#### \* Quality of Life Committee (Councilman Wilson and Mayor Euille)

Councilman Wilson said they met last Friday and one of the things of note was there was an opinion that was issued by Attorney General Mark Hearing regarding the request that the ICE makes of local sheriffs to detain undocumented individuals, and the Attorney General's opinion was that those were requests and that the sheriffs did not need to hold inmates past their date based on the ICE request. Councilman Wilson said the City's undersheriff provided an update on the Alexandria Sheriff's Department process on handling this. Ultimately came to a determination that in order to comply with the Attorney General's guidance that ICE would be providing a warrant for arrest in the case of individuals when they want the City to detain them.

Mayor Euille noted that part I crime continues to be at a healthy level.

#### \* City/School Subcommittee (Councilman Wilson and Mayor Euille)

Councilman Wilson said the Subcommittee met last evening and had a lot of follow-up from the joint work session held in December, and they have a good list of actions that came out of that. He said they have an MOU that will be signed with the Alexandria community trust, which is to lead the early care and education work group for the implementation of part of the youth master plan, and they had a discussion of how to measure data for early childhood efforts and how to integrate that data. He said they had a discussion around how to incorporate early childhood needs in the City in the long range planning efforts from a facilities effort. Councilman Wilson said they discussed the after school discussion, and it looks like the plan is that after the budget process, in June they would have a joint work session on the after and out of school efforts. Councilman Wilson said the appropriate levels of fund balance and how those

funds should be handled. There was a desire from Council to have a clear policy for everyone to understand on how fund balance would be used and carried over and at what levels between the two bodies. Councilman Wilson said they issued a joint RFP for health care for combined City schools and DASH.

Mayor Euille noted that Council would also hold the joint work session with the School Board on the budget on March 17.

Mayor Euille noted that for the first time in a long time the graduation for T.C. Williams will not conflict with a City Council public hearing meeting and the graduation will be held on Monday, June 15 at the George Mason University campus.

Councilman Smedberg said for the fund balance roll-over policy, he hoped they would have a much broader discussion beyond just the subcommittee, as there is much to be discussed.

# \* Transportation Planning Board (Councilmember Lovain)

(Councilmember Lovain gave this report later in the evening.)

Councilmember Lovain said he mentioned previously that the Transportation Planning Board was going to approve the projects under the federal enhancement for seniors and individuals with disabilities program, and the other thing they approved was an update on the bicycle and pedestrian plan for the national capital region, so it fits in well with the City's consideration. The plan shows that since 2005, the region has added almost 200 miles of new bike lanes, for a total of 700 miles of bike lanes in the region.

#### \* Transportation Commission (Councilmember Lovain)

Councilmember Lovain said the Commission received a briefing on the Route 7 study that NVTC has been conducting, and hopefully they will chose to go down transit corridor C to Van Dorn Metro instead of using King Street to the King Street Metro.

In honor of the 283rd birthday of our country's first President on February 22, 1732.



Consideration of the Calendar Year 2015 Real Property Assessment.

**ISSUE:** (1) 2015 Notices of Assessment will be mailed to property owners on February 10; and (2) DREA staff will present the new real estate values at the February 10 City Council legislative meeting.

**<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>**: That City Council receives the report.

**BACKGROUND:** Included in the attached report are the annual changes in real property assessments from CY 2014 to CY 2015 and historical statistics related to assessment appreciation/depreciation, new construction, and residential sales activities.

Assessment notices will be mailed to property owners on February 10 and reflect updated market values of as of January 1, 2015, as well as those for the previous two years. The comparative estimates are mandated by a 2014 amendment to §58.1-3330(B) of the Code of Virginia which requires disclosure of the assessment (land, improvements, and total), tax rate, tax levy, and percent change for the previous two years. The 2015 tax rate, which will apply to the January 1, 2015 assessed value, is scheduled to be set by the City Council on May 7, 2015 and therefore a 2015 tax rate is not reflected on the forthcoming assessment notices.

#### **DISCUSSION**:

#### OVERALL CHANGE IN CY 2015 REAL PROPERTY TAX BASE

This year, **the City's overall real property tax base increased 3.5%** from the original January 1, 2014 assessment to January 1, 2015, or \$1.25 billion from \$35.90 billion in CY 2014 to \$37.15 billion in CY 2015 (Attachment 1, Page 2, Line 74, Column 6). This increase reflects continued improvement in the residential and rental apartment sectors of the market. However, while the overall residential tax base was up 4.33% the commercial sector was up only 2.37%. The table on the following page shows the year-over-year land book change in grand total taxable real property assessments from CY 2011 to CY 2015.

Attachment 2 shows the change in the tax base from a starting point of the 2014 equalized assessments. The equalized assessment represents the year-ending 2014 assessments (as of December 31, 2014), and reflect changes that occurred throughout the calendar year including administrative reviews, appeals, decisions of the Board of Equalization, supplemental assessments, subdivisions, consolidations and demolitions.

#### Points of Interest Relating to CY 2014 Assessment Changes:

- Locally assessed real property assessments increased 3.50% (which consists of both new construction and appreciation in value of existing property), or \$1.24 billion, from \$35.34 billion in 2013 to \$36.57 billion in 2015 (Attachment 1, Page 1, Line 49, Column 6).
- The **residential property tax base increased 4.33%**, or \$880.65 million, from \$20.31 billion in 2014 to \$21.201 billion in 2015 (Attachment 1, Page 1, Line 21, Column 6). Residential property assessments for 2015 have now surpassed the previous peak in 2006 when the total assessment was reported at \$20.33 billion.

**The average assessed value for a residential single-family home as of January 1, 2015 increased 2.92%**, from \$682,178 in CY 2014 to \$702,098 in CY 2015 (Attachment 2, Page 1, Line 6, Column 9). For 2015, 96% increased in value, 2.5% decreased, and 1.5% remained unchanged.

**The average assessed value for a residential condominium as of January 1, 2015 increased 3.51%**, from \$292,574 in CY 2014 to \$302,843 in CY 2015 (Attachment 2, Page 1, Line 14, Column 9). For 2015, 95% of all condominium properties increased in value, 4% decreased, and 1% remained unchanged.

- The commercial property tax base increased by 2.37%, or \$355.84 million, from \$15.02 billion in 2014 to \$15.38 billion in 2015 (Attachment 1, Page 1, Line 47, Column 6). This compares to the 1.93% increase the previous year. The 2015 commercial increase is primarily associated with the continued expansion of multi-family residential housing sector which increased 4.60% on a year-over-year basis. Approximately 1,330 Class A rental apartments were delivered over the course of 2015. The largest decrease was experienced in the hospitality sector which continues to perform at levels less than those projected by the operators. Based on the most recent income and expense data for calendar year 2013 both average daily room rates and occupancy failed to meet expectations and operating expense ratios increased when expressed as a percent of total revenue from all sources. The conventional office market remains weak with gross leasing activity in floor area amounts that fail to impact the net inventory through market backfill. Overall conventional office building values essentially remaining flat from the previous year. In 2014, gains attributable to multi-family were significantly offset by year-over-year decreases in other commercial sectors with the exception of general commercial.
- State-assessed public service corporation property assessments increased 2.64%, or \$14.77 million, from \$560.42 million in 2014 to \$575.19 million in 2015 (Attachment 1, Page 2, Line 72, Column 6). The decrease of 10.64% in telecommunications was attributable the continued retirement of their hard line networks. The 2015 state-assessed Public Service Corporation assessments are effective January 1, 2014. These values are certified by the State Corporation Commission (SCC) and the Virginia Department of Taxation (VDoT) in late September of the effective year of the valuation. The City bills all non-locally assessed properties on a fiscal year basis in order to accurately reflect these assessment changes.
- Tax exempt real property assessments increased 2.44%, or \$127.70 million, from \$5.23 billion in 2014 to \$5.36 billion in 2015 (Attachment 1, Page 2, Line 108, Column 6). The increase was primarily attributable to the City's acquisition of previously taxable parcels located along the Strand, and ARHA's construction of 51 dwelling units in Old Town Commons. Additional decreases were associated with the continued revaluation of land parcels zoned for public open space (POS) uses, which have limited development potential.
- Taxable new construction activity added \$504.87 million for CY 2015. Residential construction accounted for \$137.01 million of the new growth, while the commercial sector, which includes multifamily rental, accounted for \$367.86 million. The expansion of the multi-family residential sector alone was \$287.34 million. This compares to CY 2014 when \$349.25 million in new residential and commercial growth was added to the City's tax base. Overall, \$1.22 billion in new growth has been added to the tax base over the last five years. This equates to approximately 3.34% of the CY 2015 locally assessed taxable base. Historical new growth figures are detailed in Attachment 3.

**On-going new construction and recently completed development projects** include: the continued • build-out of conventional townhouses and urban loft condominiums within Potomac Yard; the completion of conventional townhouses, urban loft condominiums and ARHA multifamily apartment rental units in Old Town Commons, and the mixed-use Printer's Row which is a high-end 21-unit residential townhouse condominium development with a small retail component. The Safeway store at 3526 King Street was redeveloped with a new 61,949 square-foot lifestyle grocery store. EYA completed the redevelopment of the former Sheet Metal Workers Building into a high-end residential multifamily condominium project containing 60 units known as The Oronoco. Also completed was The Kingsley Apartments (175-mid-rise units) which includes a Harris Teeter grocer, Del Ray Towers f/k/a The Calvert (334 high-rise units with ground floor retail, Bell Del Ray (276 mid-rise units with ground floor retail), Bell Pre (360 units with ground floor retail), and Broadstone Van Dorn (a hotel converted to 184 high-rise apartment units). Of significant interest in the Hoffman Town Center area is the early 2014 groundbreaking and subsequent on-going construction of the National Science Foundation office building (697,417 square feet of net leasable area) which is expected to be a catalyst for additional new development, particularly in the hospitality sector.

**New construction** also includes a significant number of multifamily projects throughout the City. These are in various stages of construction and include: The Bradley a/k/a Braddock Metro Place (165 units - Old Town), Park Meridian at Eisenhower Station (505 units - Carlyle), Notch 8/JBG Development (233 units with a first floor grocer - Potomac Yard), Station 650 at Potomac Yard/Woods Partners (183 units - Potomac Yard), The Frazier/Bozzuto (249 units - Potomac Yard), The Alric/JBG Development (323 units - Potomac Yard), and the Modero Tempo a/k/a Landmark Gateway (502 units - West End).

- In accordance with the terms and conditions associated with the development of Potomac Yard Metrorail station, 0.33% of the City's tax base growth which occurred on Potomac Yard with be set aside (after service cost deductions) to assist in financing of the proposed Potomac Yard Metrorail Station.

#### **Distribution of Real Property Assessments**

• Real property classified as residential for assessment purposes for CY 2015 represents 57.06% of the total real property taxable base, while property classified as commercial and public service corporations represents 42.94% of the base. If multifamily housing is excluded, commercial comprises 25.27% of the base. The compares to 2014 when 56.6% of the tax base was residential, and property classified as commercial and public service corporations represents 42.94% of the base. If multifamily housing is excluded, commercial and property classified as commercial and public service corporations represents 42.94% of the base. If multifamily housing is

excluded, commercial comprises 25.9% of the CY 2014. A historical distribution of the City's real property tax base allocated between classifications of real property for assessment purposes is detailed in Attachment 4.

• Attachment 5 details the distribution of the 2015 assessments in terms of actual dollars and percentages by land use. Land uses include: residential single-family; residential condominium; residential vacant land; commercial multifamily rental; commercial office, retail and service; commercial and industrial vacant land; and public service corporations.



**ISSUE**: Receipt of the Monthly Financial Report for the Period Ending December 31, 2014.

**<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>**: That City Council receive the Monthly Financial Report (Attachment 1).

**<u>BACKGROUND</u>**: The following discussion is a summary of the Monthly Financial Report for this period. The complete report is attached.

The regional economic slowdown continues to present one of the most, if not the most, significant ongoing financial challenges the City currently faces. From a fiscal management perspective, the City has a long standing record of managing expenditures, items under its direct control, prudently and below budgeted levels. Furthermore, the City estimates future revenue collections conservatively and based on local and regional data available. However in the last two fiscal years, in particular, slower regional economic growth continues to put pressure on the revenues necessary to meet costs and demands for services. The Washington D.C. regional

economy has gone from one of the fastest growing regional economies in the U.S. to the second slowest growing regional economy in the U.S. The Detroit economy on a percentage basis is growing at a faster pace than our regional economy. This report will show the impact to the City's current Fiscal Year 2015 budget and planning for the FY 2016 budget. Additionally, this month's report provides a more in-depth look at the underlying economic indicators that are potentially contributing to our current economic environment. Economic Indicators highlighted in this report include unemployment, job inventory and payroll.

At the halfway point of fiscal year 2015, year-to-date General Fund revenues and expenditures are 1.4% and 3.2% lower than the four-year average for percent of budget collected and spent, respectively. While expenditures appear to be on pace to end the year within budget, the revenue picture is concerning. Based on current projections, the City estimates \$631.3 million in revenue against a revenue budget of \$634.3 million, for a net difference of \$3.0 million. With such a narrow gap, the City is continuously monitoring expenditures and will make spending adjustments as necessary.

As of December 31, 2014, General Fund revenues totaled \$312.5 million, which is 1.4% less than the four-year average of percent of revenues collected through December. Through the midpoint of the fiscal year, "General Property Taxes" collected to date, which represent 65% of the City's total revenues, are in line with historical trends as it relates to year-to-date collections. The three areas of concern for FY 2015 that also impact available revenues for the FY 2016 budget are "Local Sales and Use Taxes," "Business License Taxes" and "Revenue from the Commonwealth." However, a category that is performing better than projections is "Transient Lodging Taxes." These will be discussed further in the State of the Local Economy section of Attachment I.

As of December 31, 2014, General Fund expenditures totaled \$256.4 million, or 39.9% of budgeted expenditures. Compared to the historical four-year average, the City spent has spent 3.2% less of its budget in FY 2015. Personnel expenditures are 3.1% less than the four-year average percent of budget spent to date, and non-personnel expenditures are 3.3% less than the historical average. Although expenditures are lower than budgeted, they need to be closely monitored and managed to ensure that they do not exceed actual revenues. As mentioned previously, departments have been asked to project their expenditures from month six to the end of the year so that City staff can appropriately plan and potentially adjust given the financial outlook of the rest of the fiscal year.

#### DOCKET TITLE:

Consideration of Receipt of FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report Related to City Council Approved Capital Projects and Approval of a Capital Projects Budget Transfer.

**ISSUE**: (1) Receipt of the FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report as relates to City Council approved capital projects; and (2) Transfer of \$485,000 in previously appropriated funds for a Fleet Facility Air Handling Unit (AHU).

#### **<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>**: That City Council:

- 1. Receive as information the FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report; and
- 2. Approve the transfer of previously appropriated funds from the Fleet Facility Lift project in order to accelerate the Fleet Air Handling Unit (AHU) Replacement project in the amount of \$485,000.

**BACKGROUND**: Attached to this docket item is the executive summary/overview (Attachment 1) and a link to the full report (Attachment 2) of the FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report, summarizing project progress through December 31, 2014 and anticipated project progress through March 31, 2015. The executive summary/overview provides details on projects which have been completed, and selected active projects with high community visibility. The executive summary/overview also provides summary budget and expenditure information for all active capital projects.

The full FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report, as well as the executive summary/overview is posted on the City's website at <<u>http://www.alexandriava.gov/Budget></u>. The next status report is expected to be presented for Council consideration at the May 12, 2015 legislative meeting.

As part of the Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report, City staff is recommending approval to accelerate the Fleet Facility Air Handling Unit (AHU) project through a transfer of previously appropriated capital projects funding.

It is recommended to use of Fleet Facility Lift project savings of \$485,000 for the Fleet AHU replacements. Normally, funding this project would be considered for reprioritization as part of City Council's consideration of the FY 2016 - 205 CIP, but due to the condition of the AHU and the potential health and safety concerns surrounding this equipment if it fails, and optimal seasonal timing for this project, it is the professional opinion of the General Services staff that this project be accelerated to FY 2015, utilizing the remaining balance of the Fleet Lift project. According to City Code City Council authorizes the movement of CIP project balances.

This action will free up planned funding of \$150,000 in FY 2017 and \$336,000 in FY 2018 (as part of last year's Approved CIP) for this replacement project for other critical infrastructure repairs and/or scheduled replacements at other City-owned facilities. Contingency for the AHU replacement project will be coming from the General Services Capital Facilities Maintenance Program (CFMP).

**FISCAL IMPACT:** City Council's receipt of the FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report does not require any additional resources. The report will be utilized in the development of the FY 2016 - FY 2025 City Manager's Proposed CIP. Available project balances, implementation rate, and current and projected project status will be utilized to determine the appropriate level of investment in a project for the forthcoming fiscal year.

The transfer of funds for the Fleet Facility AHU project will not require additional funding. The funding requested has been previously appropriated by City Council through prior year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) appropriations.

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

#### Section I. Second Quarter Project Status and Financial Overview

Included in the FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report are detailed updates on City Category 2 and Category 3 capital projects along with summary financial information on all Category 1 projects. Not included are Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) capital projects. ACPS produces a quarterly capital projects status report which can be found at: <u>http://www.acps.k12.va.us/</u>.

In the FY 2015 Second Quarter Capital Projects Status Report, there are 121 projects classified as Category 2 or Category 3, with status updates of those projects found in sections two through twelve of the full report.



Category 3 New or expanded facilities of level of service

The full report can be found online at <u>http://www.alexandriava.gov/Budget</u>. Summary budget and financial information for these projects can be found on page 1-7 through 1-11 of the executive summary.

Projects classified as Category 1 projects (of which there are 72 projects) are included in the summary budget and financial information section on pages 1-12 through 1-15 of the executive summary. Full status report updates are not provided for these on-going capital projects designed to provide annual funding to preserve and improve existing capital assets.

Budget and financial information found throughout the executive summary and the individual project pages is through December 31, 2014. The next status report is anticipated to be presented to City Council at the May 12, 2015 City Council meeting and will provide updated project statuses and financial information through March 31, 2015.

Section I A. Pro	ject Status Review - (	Category 2 & 3 Projects

As of December 31, 2014, there were 121 active Category 2 & 3 City capital projects included in the report. The table to the right provides a summary of the status of the projects at the end of the second quarter of FY 2015 (December 31, 2014).

New this quarter, this report includes more descriptive project status designations to reflect the project's current status. Previously, there were three project status options to describe the project: Pre-Implementation, Implementation,

and Close-Out. These descriptions were too broad to provide an accurate current project status. The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) worked with departments to expand the project status options from three to five in an effort to provide better information to City Council and the public. The five project status options are listed in the table above, and are defined as follows:

**Initiation:** Work related to the primary scope of work in the project has not started. For example, this could be due to seasonal schedules or coordination with other entities, funding sources or grants that result in specific start dates in later quarters, or other projects have been a higher priority.

**Planning/Design:** Planning and design work of the project has started. This could include reviewing the project scope, conducting feasibility studies, permitting, interdepartmental or interagency coordination, beginning planning or design, acquiring land for a construction project, etc.

The project is still in this phase during the project solicitation process. The project solicitation process involves sending the procurement documents to Procurement for the primary scope of work all the way through the contract being ready to be signed and project moved to implementation phase.

**Implementation:** Work towards completing the primary scope of work has started. Construction has begun, equipment has been received and is being installed, a master plan is being updated, etc. Work has started on implementing what City staff communicated to City Council regarding the primary scope of work when funding was approved.

**Pending Close-Out:** The defined/primary scope of work has been completed. Staff is reviewing punch list items, ensuring invoices have been paid and grant reimbursements have been submitted and received, etc. There should be no more work on the project except in cases where additional items surface during final project review (punch-list items) that are related to the initial scope of work.

**Close-Out:** The final invoices have been paid, reimbursements (if applicable) received, and work is complete. The project will be removed from the subsequent Quarterly Status Report.

Any remaining balances will be assumed to be available to fund future capital improvements and prioritized as part of the annual CIP budget development process.


Section I B. Budget and Financial Information Review

At the end of the second quarter of FY 2015, the 121 active Category 2 & 3 projects and the 72 active Category 1 projects had combined project balances of \$200.6 million.<sup>1</sup> The table to the right compares project balances at the end of the first

quarter of FY 2015 and the end of the second quarter of FY 2015. Approximately \$21.8 million in capital projects funding was expended or encumbered during the second quarter of FY 2015. Pages 1-7 through 1-15 provide summary budget and financial information for all projects.

The total City Council appropriated budget for all active projects through the end of the second quarter of FY 2015 was \$732.2 million. Approximately 72.6% (\$531.6 million) of all appropriated funding for these projects has been expended or contractually committed leaving the available balance of \$200.6 million as of December 31, 2014. The chart below provides information on all available project balances organized by CIP document section.

#### Section II. FY 2015 Second Quarter Project Highlights

The second quarter project highlights will focus on three areas: (1) projects which have been completed and will be closed out and removed from the next quarterly status report; (2) selected high visibility projects that are currently in the pending close-out or project implementation; and (3) other projects.

#### Section II A. Completed (Closed-Out) Projects

The five projects listed below will be officially closed-out during the second quarter of FY 2015 and will not appear in future reports except in the summary section of closed-out projects (page 1-16 through 1-17).

- Chinquapin Aquatics Center (Existing Infrastructure) (page 3-4) This project which provided for immediate capital asset renewal at the Chinquapin Aquatics Center has been completed. This project is not to be confused with the new Chinquapin Center (New & Renovated Facilities) which is an active project in the planning/design phase (page 3-5). The Existing Infrastructure project remaining balance of \$120,181 will be utilized for future capital improvements.
- E. Del Ray Avenue Pocket Park (page 3-8) This project completed the accessible hardscape and plaza features of the approved pocket park plan. The project was funded with \$21,500 in private capital contributions and \$27,400 in City funds. All project funds were expended.
- **Charles Houston Recreation Center** (page 3-12) The kitchen repairs the final outstanding element of this project were completed. The remaining balance of \$23,300 will be utilized for future capital improvements.
- Old Dominion Boat Club Property Acquisition (page 3-15) This project was approved by City Council on September 13, 2014 as part of docket item #14-3100. Using prior year open space funds and future sale of Health Department site land proceeds, the City escrowed the funds for the acquisition of the Old Dominion Boat Club Property.
- Library Wireless Solution (12-17) This project allowed for the acquisition of multiple Internet access points to all four Library buildings to help improve the existing wireless service. The project has been completed, and the remaining balance of \$2,932 will be utilized for future capital improvements.

#### Section II B. Significant Projects in Implementation or Pending Close-Out Phase

The following projects are currently in the implementation phase. This is a small sampling of the 51 active projects that are currently in the pending close-out or implementation phase; however, these are highly visible projects within the community.

**Fire Station 210 – Eisenhower Valley** (page 4-5) - This project provides funding for a new three story fire station at 5255 Eisenhower Avenue of approximately 39,430 gross square feet (GSF) and two new impound lots. The building construction and furniture installation has been completed. Construction punch list items within the facility and site work outside the building will continue during the third quarter of FY 2015. The pictures below depict the completed facility viewed from Eisenhower Avenue (left) and the completed four-bay garage (right).



**City Marina Dredging (page 2-9)** – During the second quarter of FY 2015, a construction contract was awarded for dredging of the City Marina and all permits were obtained. The dredging began during the second quarter of FY 2015, an as of December 31, 2014, Phase I A/B piers and fairway have been completed and work is in progress on G/H and E/F piers and fairways. Dredging activities (pictured below) are anticipated to be completed and the project closed-out during the third quarter of FY 2015.





**Taylor Run @ Janney's Lane (page 11-8)** – This project consists of reconstructing a culvert head wall, stream restoration and realignment of a sanitary sewer to eliminate a siphon at the culvert located at Taylor Run Parkway at Janney's Lane. During the second quarter of FY 2015, all construction was completed and a punch list of items to be completed was generated. The project is anticipated to be closed-out in the third quarter of FY 2015. The picture to the right shows the completed concrete headwall, newly installed gabion basket retaining wall and a portion of a newly installed mechanically stabilized earth wall.



#### Section II C. Other Projects

This section contains information on other projects which appear – or are anticipated to appear – in the current or future Quarterly Capital Projects Status Report.

**Fleet Facility Air Handling Unit (AHU) Replacement** – As part of the Quarterly Capital Projects Status Report (docket item #14-3570) being presented to City Council at the February 10, 2015 City Council meeting, City staff will request approval to transfer the remaining project balance from the completed Fleet Facility Lift project (closed-out in the first quarter of FY 2015) to a new Fleet Facility AHU Replacement project.

The Department of General Services is requesting use of Fleet Facility Lift project savings of 485,000 for the Fleet AHU replacements. Normally, funding this project would be considered for reprioritization as part of City Council's consideration of the FY 2016 – 205 CIP, but due to the condition of the AHU, timing considerations, and the potential health and safety concerns surrounding this equipment if it fails, it is the professional opinion of the General Services staff that this project be accelerated to FY 2015.

Funding in the amount of \$585,000 was budgeted in the FY 2014 CIP for the replacement of four heavy vehicle lifts. However, after staff analysis and a detailed value engineering process, the three heavy vehicle lifts were replaced with three light vehicle lifts at a cost of \$100,000, resulting in savings of over \$485,000. If approved by City Council, this project will appear on the FY 2015 Third Quarter Capital Projects Status Report.

**DASH Bus Purchases – Replacement and Expansion** – In previous Quarterly Capital Projects Status Reports, the DASH Bus Expansion project was included in the Category 2 & 3 section (which included a full page description) and DASH Bus Replacements were included in the Category 1 section (summary information only). As bus orders for expansion and replacement have been traditionally made at the same time on the same order, it will be more beneficial for project reporting purposes to merge these two projects together. Furthermore, the DASH bus purchases will be split into two projects – buses purchased from FY 2014 and before, and buses planned for purchase with FY 2015 funding. The summary budget and financial information on DASH bus purchases can be found on page 1-13.






