I. DISCUSSION

The Special Use Permit (SUP) #2021-00119 review represents a City Council one-year review of an SUP and its conditions for indoor and outdoor live entertainment and for outdoor dining uses at 711 Princess Street. Added to this SUP review are condition amendments, requested of the applicant, Blue Heart Travel, Inc., dba Classical Movements, for an extension of the hours for indoor and outdoor live entertainment, an expansion of the number of seats for outdoor dining and outdoor live entertainment, permission for amplified sound, and for a parking reduction.

SITE DESCRIPTION

The subject property is an 8,491 square foot lot of record and is developed with a 5,642 square commercial building, foot constructed circa 1785 (Figure 1). Open space behind and on the side of the building east measures approximately 2,849 square feet and is landscaped as a garden with patio area, where the business conducts concerts. dining and outdoor special events. A driveway and two parking spaces exist to the east of the building.

A mix of commercial and residential uses surround the

applicant's property. Commercial and residential properties share property lines with 711 Princess Street to the east, and the senior living facility, Sunrise of Old Town, shares property lines to the north and west (Figure 2). The surrounding uses' property lines range between 10 and 60 feet from the stages the applicant uses for performances.

BACKGROUND

I. Applicant business uses

Classical Movements at 711 Princess Street has organized concert tours, nationally and internationally, for orchestras and choirs since 1992. This function is defined as a business and professional office use in the City's Zoning Ordinance. With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, cancellations of in-person concert performances world-wide resulted, and Classical Movements sought to diversify its business to remain economically viable. In March 2021, the applicant received City Council approval of SUP #2020-00102 for a live entertainment use for indoor and outdoor concerts and for a restaurant and outdoor dining use for special events, such as weddings.

Businesses that hold special events where food is served are categorized as restaurant uses in the Zoning Ordinance. The private, ticketed outdoor concerts were staged at two locations in the rear yard, where weddings also took place.

II. City Council Review of SUP #2020-00102

In addition to standard SUP conditions and staff conditions to mitigate impacts, City Council amended and added several conditions to SUP #2020-00102 during the public hearing to reduce the potential for noise impacts on nearby residents and to ensure compliance with the City Code noise ordinance. The amended and added conditions were:

- <u>CONDITION AMENDED BY CITY COUNCIL</u>: Indoor live entertainment, restaurant and outdoor dining are permitted on Saturdays and Sundaysdaily, between 10 a.m. and 10 <u>9 p.m.</u> All patrons must leave the premises at 10 <u>9 p.m.</u> (P&Z) (PC) (CC)
- 10. <u>CONDITION AMENDED BY CITY COUNCIL: The indoor live entertainment,</u> restaurant and outdoor dining uses must comply with the city's noise ordinance. No indoor amplified sound shall be audible at the property line after 10:00 <u>9</u> PM. (T&ES) (PC) (CC)
- 23. <u>CONDITION AMENDED BY CITY COUNCIL</u>: The Director of Planning and Zoning shall review the Special Use Permit one year after it has been operational and shall docket the matter for consideration by the Planning Commission and City Council if (a) there have been documented violations of the permit conditions which were not corrected immediately, constitute repeat violations or which create a direct and immediate adverse zoning impact on the surrounding community; (b) the Director has received a request from any person to docket the permit for review as a result of a complaint that rises to the level of a violation; or (c) the Director has determined that there are problems with the operation of the use and that new or revised conditions are needed one year from SUP approval at the February 2022 hearings. (P&Z) (CC)
- 24. <u>CONDITION AMENDED BY CITY COUNCIL</u>: The maximum number of outdoor seats for live entertainment shall comply with the Virginia Uniform Statewide building code. be 50. City Council approval is required for an SUP amendment to increase outdoor seating over 50 for live entertainment. (P&Z) (PC) (CC)
- 25. <u>CONDITION AMENDED BY CITY COUNCIL:</u> Outdoor live entertainment <u>is limited</u> to four hours a day and is permitted on <u>Friday and</u> Saturdays between 10 a.m. and 9 p.m. and Sundays <u>through Thursday between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.</u>-(P&Z) (PC)-(CC)
- 29. <u>CONDITION ADDED BY CITY COUNCIL:</u> Within thirty days after the third representative concert to be held following the SUP approval, the applicant shall submit a report on his conducting noise measurements during three representative concert events using the service of a professional acoustic consultant to verify compliance with the City noise code at all property lines including those of 409 and 411 N. Columbus properties. City staff shall be invited to observe the measurements of the consultant. (CC)
- 30. <u>CONDITION ADDED BY CITY COUNCIL: If the results of the noise measurements</u> show non-compliance with the noise code, the applicant shall submit a mitigation plan to

the City within one month from the date of the report submission and implement all mitigation measures within two months from the submission date of the mitigation plan, all to the satisfaction of the Director of T&ES. During this period of non-compliance, the applicant shall apply for a temporary noise variance permit. (CC)

31. CONDITION ADDED BY CITY COUNCIL: Amplified sound is not permitted. (CC)

III. SUP condition compliance

Staff presents an outline of the applicant's compliance with the conditions of SUP #2021-00102 since its approval in March 2021 for City Council consideration.

A. SUP warnings and citations

Zoning inspectors issued the following warnings and citations for non-compliance with SUP conditions since the March 2021 SUP approval:

Additionally, staff received complaints from a resident, who shares a property line with the business, regarding noise levels that interfered with the enjoyment of his property, however, these did not result in documented warnings or citations as City staff were not on-site to measure and verify noncompliant noise levels.

B. SUP Noise Compliance Testing – Condition #29

The applicant worked diligently with the City's Transportation & Environmental Services staff to comply with Condition #29, to collect noise measurements for three representative concerts, and with Condition #30, to submit a noise mitigation plan if noise measurements were found to exceed the permissible noise levels of 60 dB(A) as measured at the property lines. Classical Movements conducted noise compliance testing during three concert events that took place on April 25, May 27 and July 23, 2021. City staff was present at all three concerts to conduct noise measurements independently of those obtained by the applicant's consultant. The applicant submitted to the City the initial noise compliance testing report on August 20, 2021 and an amended report on October 18, 2021.

City noise measurements were conducted based on the measurement procedures written in the noise code section 11-5-5(2). As such, no readings that would have been affected by other noise sources such as a passing truck or aircraft were recorded. Table I shows the results whereby the median readings of a series of nine consecutive readings taken at least 20 seconds apart were derived and compared to the maximum permissible limit of 60 dB(A) as stipulated by the noise

ordinance in effect at that time. These results clearly demonstrated that all three concert events had noise readings that exceeded 60 dB(A).

The noise measurements conducted by the applicant's consultant are summarized in Table II and include only those measurements for the last two events of May 27 and July 23 since for the first event of April 25, the consultant's noise meter was not equipped with a noise calibrator and could not provide comparable results to the ones used by City staff. Again, the results from the applicant's consultant also indicated that the median noise readings for these two concert events exceeded the permissible level of 60 dB(A).

1. Revised Noise Ordinance

The City Council adopted a revised noise ordinance on December 18, 2021. Accordingly, the maximum permissible noise limits (MPNL) at the property lines are determined by the property use category of the noise source. The daytime (7 a.m. to 11 p.m.) MPNL for commercial uses increased from 60 dB(A) to 65 dB(A). Moving forward, the applicant's operations must now adhere to the maximum noise limit of 65 dB(A) at its property lines. Although, more of the noise readings fall below 65 dB(A), staff recognized that some still exceed, and others fall within the margin of error of, the new, higher limit. For this reason, staff found that the noise measurements continued to indicate non-compliance with the noise code and submission of a mitigation plan was necessary, as required in Condition #30.

C. Noise Mitigation Plan – Condition #30

The applicant submitted the final noise mitigation plan dated November 18, 2021. The specific actions in this plan are:

- Sound proofing would be installed along the western property line, as suggested by its sound mitigation experts. The structure would be 18 feet wide and ten-feet high and constructed of noise-reducing materials. There would be three panels, each six feet wide, placed between four, ten-foot high pillars. They will be erected about six-feet apart along the western fence wall, inside the 711 Princess property line, from which these sound buffering materials can be hung.
- Additional plywood would be installed up to the height of the existing fence at the location adjacent to 411 N. Columbus Street.
- Tall trees, bushes and plants at the property lines would be planted.
- Suggest that the audience limit clapping to short durations as these contribute to some of the loudest noise readings.
- Use of three different performance stages, which would be selected based on the type of instruments, weather, artist's express priorities and other artistic decisions.
- Two staff members on-site during concerts to monitor the music and audience noise levels and take readings with a decibel meter.
- Conduct programs featuring soft Jazz, Classical Music, Folk, Opera, Cabaret/Musicals/Broadway, Flamenco, and similar generally soft and pleasant music. Dance bands or disc jockeys would not be allowed.

PROPOSAL

This SUP report represents a City Council one-year evaluation of the business operation guided by the conditions of SUP #2020-00102, as required in Condition 23, and includes a simultaneous consideration of condition amendments proposed by the applicant. Although the applicant, Blue Heart Travel, Inc., dba Classical Movements, continues to engage in tour sales and proposals for 2022, it does not anticipate a return to a full concert tour scheduled until 2023. As such, outdoor garden concerts remain an important source of income, leading to the condition amendment requests to intensify the indoor and outdoor live entertainment and outdoor dining uses. The applicant's website provides an example of the number of events scheduled between February and June 2022: one indoor concert and dinner in February, four outdoor concerts in March; six outdoor concerts in April; eight outdoor concerts in May: and five outdoor concerts in June. The one-hour outdoor concerts are posted as typically taking place on Tuesdays and Thursdays with start times of 5 p.m. and 6:30 p.m.

The applicant's proposed amendments to the conditions of SUP #2020-00119 are:

- Condition 2: Amend the closing hour for indoor live entertainment from 9 p.m. to 11 p.m. and remove the restaurant and outdoor dining reference since the applicant believes these are accessory uses and do not qualify as SUP uses.
- Condition 4: Delete the condition for the limitation of 50 seats for outdoor dining since it believes the outdoor dining use is an accessory use and does not qualify as an SUP use.
- Condition 10: Amend to indicate that no indoor amplified sound shall be audible at the property line after 10 p.m. instead of after 9 p.m.
- Condition 24: Amend the number of seats for outdoor live entertainment from 50 to 181 seats (Figures 3-5).
- Condition 25: Amend to allow outdoor live entertainment daily between 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. instead of Fridays and Saturdays, 10 a.m. 9 p.m. and Sundays through Thursdays, 10 a.m. 8 p.m.
- Condition 31: Delete condition to allow for amplified sound.

Given that the applicant proposes an increase in number of seats for outdoor concerts in Condition 24 to 181 seats, 48 off-street parking spaces would be required for the office and the SUP uses. The applicant provides 10 off-street parking spaces resulting in the need for SUP approval of a 38-space parking reduction.

PARKING

Section 8-200 (A)(8) of the Zoning Ordinance requires theaters, auditoriums and assembly halls to provide one off-street parking space for every four seats. With an auditorium style seating arrangement, the applicant is required to provide 46 parking spaces in addition to the two spaces for its office use, for a total of 48 spaces. The business provides 10 parking spaces -- two spaces on-site, four spaces at 715 Princess Street and four spaces at 300 N. Washington Street -- requiring SUP approval for a 38-space parking reduction.

ZONING/MASTER PLAN DESIGNATION AND CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES

Use Requirements

The applicant's business and professional office is a permitted use in the CD zone, pursuant to Section 4-502. Section 4-503(A) requires SUP approval for any use with live entertainment. Outdoor dining with over 40 seats requires SUP approval in accordance with Section 11-513(M)(3), due to the potential of impacts in an outdoor environment. Since the previous SUP approval, staff has observed that the applicant infrequently holds indoor special events where food is served (defined as a restaurant in the Zoning Ordinance) and finds that the indoor restaurant use could qualify as an accessory use, pursuant to Section 2-104, and would not require SUP approval.

City Council Review of Special Use Permits

Section 11-501 of the Zoning Ordinance details the City Council's authority in its review of Special Use Permits: "The city council may approve an application for a special use permit provided for in this ordinance if the proposed location is appropriate for the use and if the proposed use or structure will be designed and operated so as to avoid, minimize or mitigate any potentially adverse effects on the neighborhood as a whole or other properties in the vicinity."

Further, City Council considerations for SUP proposal reviews are found in Section 11-504. Section 11-504(B)(8) states, "Notwithstanding any other provisions of the city code, whether the proposed use will have noise characteristics that exceed the sound levels that are typical of permitted uses in the zone."

Historic District Requirements

Given the location within the Old and Historic District, any permanent exterior changes require BAR approval.

Master Plan Designation

The property at 711 Princess Street is sited within the Braddock Road Metro Station Small Area Plan and the supplemental Braddock Metro Neighborhood Plan, which designate the lot for commercial use.

City Code of Ordinances

The noise ordinance requirements of Section 11-5-5 of the City Code of Ordinances establishes the maximum decibel levels to be measured at the noise source's property lines. The maximum decibel level allowed at the property lines surrounding 711 Princess Street is 65 dB(A).

II. STAFF ANALYSIS

Staff recommends approval of the one-year SUP review, proposed condition amendments and the parking reduction to the extent noted in Section III of this report. The implementation of a noise mitigation plan (Condition #32), including the applicant's self-monitoring of noise levels (Condition #33), and a limitation on late night hours and number of outdoor patrons would balance the applicant's ability to financially succeed with the City's responsibility to limit noise impacts on nearby residents who directly abut the property at 711 Princess Street.

Conditions from SUP #2021-00102 have been carried forward and recommended amendments and deletions are outlined in Section III with a discussion of each in this staff analysis. Given that the indoor restaurant use has proven to be an accessory use to the by-right business and professional office, the restaurant reference in Conditions #2 and #3 has been deleted. Consistent with other SUP restaurant uses with indoor live entertainment, staff also recommends amending Condition #2 to allow indoor live entertainment until 11 p.m., as requested by the applicant, given that noise levels are reduced when indoor doors and windows remain closed, as required in amended Condition #10.

Although the applicant requested 181 patrons at outdoor live entertainment events, staff recommends limiting the attendance to 100 to control noise. Figures 3-5 indicate that the placement of 166-181 guests would extend closer to the residential properties to the west and to the property lines shared with Sunrise of Old Town. Noise measurements conducted during the three sample concerts identified that noise from the patrons at the end of performances and in between sets often resulted in noise levels over 65 dB(A), exceeding the current noise ordinance requirement. Limiting the patrons to 100 would allow the applicant to concentrate the seating within the main body of the courtyard, closest to the building at 711 Princess Street, and the farthest away from residents.

With 100 seats, the applicant's total parking requirement would fall to 27 off-street spaces. As it provides 10 off-street spaces on-site and at properties within 1,000 feet of 711 Princess Street, a parking reduction of 17 spaces is required to comply with Section 8 of the Zoning Ordinance. Staff recommends approval of a 17-space parking reduction as the applicant directs patrons to the availability of mass transit, to the nearby North Alfred Street garage and to the surface parking lot at the corner of Cameron and St. Asaph Streets, satisfying Conditions #14 and #15. In addition,

the applicant is required to maintain parking agreements for at least eight off-street parking spaces at sites within 1,000 feet of the business in Condition #11.

As in Condition #24, staff has increased the number of seats from 50 to 100 for outdoor dining in Condition 4. Although the applicant requested the deletion of this condition as it deemed the outdoor dining use an accessory use, staff maintains that the outdoor dining use should remain part of the SUP to ensure through conditions that nearby residents do not experience impacts from noise, odors and cleanliness, commonly associated with outdoor dining. Hours for outdoor dining remain as 10 a.m. and 9 p.m. (previously noted in Condition #2) and the outdoor area must be cleaned no later than 10 p.m., required in amended Condition #5.

In response to the applicant's request to extend outdoor live entertainment daily between 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. in Condition #25, staff finds 10 p.m. to potentially interfere with the well-being of residents in the immediate area. An extra source of noise measuring 65 dB(A) at the shared property lines after the currently conditioned 9 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and 8 p.m. on Sunday through Thursday could still be potentially disruptive for some residents who wish to retire for the day. Further, although music would end at 10 p.m. in the applicant's proposed scenario, noise would continue past this hour while up to 100 patrons disperse from rear yard and out to the streets, extending neighborhood impacts later than 10 p.m. Staff continues to recommend existing Condition #25, which the City Council specifically amended in March 2021 to limit noise impacts, allowing outdoor concerts on Fridays and Saturdays, 10 a.m. – 9 p.m., and on Sundays through Thursdays, 10 a.m. – 8 p.m.

Given City Council's March 2021 restriction for amplified sound in Condition #31 due to the potential for noise impacts on neighbors, staff is not supportive of the applicant-requested deletion of this condition. All test measurements occurred without amplified sound and the probability exists that the use of amplifiers on a regular basis would elevate noise readings. Nonetheless, recognizing the applicant's interest in short-term amplified music to accompany wedding parties, staff proposes a condition amendment to accommodate only wedding events by allowing an electric piano or other similar instruments with soft tones as background music for short durations. Public address systems and bands would not be permitted during wedding events, however.

With the applicant's and staff's completion of the noise readings at three representative concerts and the development of a noise mitigation plan, staff has deleted Conditions #29 and #30. Added Condition #32 requires the implementation of the noise mitigation plan prior to the first event should City Council approved this SUP. Although the noise standard was recently approved for an increase from 60 dB(A) to 65 dB(A), staff believes the noise mitigation plan and the applicant's monitoring of noise levels during events, as stated in added Condition #33, is critical to allow the commercial and residential uses to reasonably coexist side-by-side. Because sound measurements from the applicant's consultant and staff indicated some noise levels hovering near and over 65 dB(A), staff supports limited intensification of the outdoor live entertainment use with the implementation of the noise mitigation plan.

CONCLUSION

Subject to the conditions contained in Section III of this report, staff recommends approval of the Special Use Permit one-year review and applicant's request to intensify the SUP uses and for a parking reduction.

Since June 2020, Classical Movements has been presenting innovative live concerts of classical music in the garden of our historic building in Old Town Alexandria, the first and largest series of its kind in the United States since the beginning of the pandemic. Due to Covid-19, our company – based in Alexandria since 1997 – has seen a complete loss of income as a concert tour company for orchestras and choirs operating at the intersection of travel and music, two of the industries hit hardest by the pandemic. Most of our concert tours will return in 2023 because of the Delta variant. We continue to operate our office and work on tour sales and proposals even for 2022 hoping for the return of our primary business. In the meantime, our garden concerts have become an important accessory source of income and a valuable asset to the community. Through these concerts, we have been able to hire many of our colleagues in the music community, the vast majority of who are freelancers for whom this has been their only opportunity to perform in a safe and in-person environment since March 2020. They also boost the economy in Old Town as our audiences frequently dine before or after the concerts. We have received overwhelming support from our artists, audiences including neighbors (3,327 since June 2020), local businesses, and press. We are regularly listed thing to do in Alexandria and bring revenue to the city, retail shops and restaurants. We have kept our staff, paid all of our taxes and been an asset to the city. Our building, the Rectory on Princess Street, from 1785 is historic, beautifully maintained and is now one of the buildings that attracts people rather than one more empty building in the city. Our livelihood is contingent upon being able to continue these concerts.

- 1. Increase the number of seats.
 - a. Condition 4: The maximum number of outdoor seats for outdoor dining shall be 50. Since Restaurant and Outdoor Dining is limited and an accessory use, we do not need to include in our new Special Use Permit application.
 - b. Condition 24: The maximum number of outdoor seats for live entertainment shall be 50. Change to the maximum number of outdoor seats for live entertainment shall be determined by the <u>Fire Prevention Permit</u>. (Current Fire Prevention Permit Approval is for up to 99 but we can increase up to 499 with an additional entrance/exit that we are currently adding.). **Our request is for up to 181 seats.**
 - i. Equitability Precedence: Lloyd House 100 seats (outdoor garden and north parlor room), Lee-Fendall House (outdoor rentals 125), Carlyle House (130 with Terrace and Garden), and more, some of which are smaller than us. These properties host live concerts and not just weddings and other events.



- ii. Because of the limit of outdoor seats put by the SUP our income is severely limited and we need to generate more to pay our bills until our primary business returns.
- iii. The audience is the primary absorber of sound so a larger audience is one of the mitigation strategies for our outdoor garden.
- iv. Beyond essential financial feasibility, an increase in the number of seats would allow us to give more free and reduced tickets and facilitate access and opportunities to more students and children, foster programs, disabled, veterans, first responders, older adults including those at Sunrise of Old Town next door to us, and others to experience live music. We are already doing this and being as generous as we can, but with artists fees, the current limit of 50 seats means we have hardly any ability to offer free seats to those in need.
- 2. Change the hours.
 - a. Condition 2: Indoor live entertainment, restaurant and outdoor dining are permitted daily between 10 a.m. and 9 p.m. All patrons must leave the premises at 9 p.m. Change hours for indoor live entertainment to permitted daily 10 a.m. and <u>11 p.m</u>. Since Restaurant and Outdoor Dining is limited and an accessory use, we do not need to include in our new Special Use Permit application.
 - b. Condition 25: Outdoor live entertainment is limited to four hours a day and is permitted on Friday and Saturdays between 10 a.m. and 9 p.m. and Sundays through Thursday between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. Change to: Outdoor live entertainment permitted <u>daily</u> between 10:00 a.m. and <u>10:00 PM</u>.
 - c. Condition 10: No indoor amplified sound shall be audible at the property line after 9:00 PM. Change to: No indoor amplified sound shall be audible at the property line after <u>10 p.m.</u>
 - i. The Noise Ordinance Phase II increased the commercial decibel standard from 60 to **65 decibels** between the hours of **7:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m.** effective 12/18/2021.
 - ii. We really need extended hours until 10pm so we have a choice to plan better, this 8 p.m. limit Sunday to Thursday is impossible, especially in summer in the heat and 9 p.m. on Fri and Saturday.
 - iii. Equitability Precedence: Lloyd House 10:00 am 10:00 PM (12 midnight indoors or no music outdoors), Lee-Fendall House 10:00 am 10:00 PM (11 PM indoors or no music outdoors), Carlyle House 3:30 PM 12:00 midnight (both indoors and outdoors), Atheneum (until 12 midnight), and more. These properties also host live concerts and not just weddings and other events.
 - iv. Because of the limit of hours, we need to have the first of two concerts sometimes start as early as 3:30 PM which no one can attend and if combined with food it is impossible. This affects our ability to sell tickets as people are working. If it is a live entertainment event with catered food it is too late for lunch and too early for dinner.
- 3. Remove the No Amplification Condition
 - a. Condition 31: Amplified sound is not permitted. We request that this condition is removed.
 - i. The permit and conditions are based on the noise ordinance so this should not matter if there is amplification or not. Amplification should be permitted as long as it is within the noise code.



- ii. Equitability Precedence: Lloyd House allows lightly amplified music as a certain amount of amplification is required to hear the sound of a keyboard, guitar, and wind instruments such as a clarinet. The Lee-Fendall House is permitted amplification. The Carlyle House permits amplification in the form of small Bluetooth speakers (i.e. Beats Pill). All of the outdoor dining establishments with Limited Live Entertainment that play music through speakers or have bands. These 3 properties also host live concerts and not just weddings and other events.
- iii. In regards to Live Entertainment, we should be permitted to use amplification. We are referring to examples such as a small lapel microphone and small speaker as the audience cannot hear important emergency instructions (where the exits are) or other information (a musician explaining the program) especially with other factors such as noise from airplanes, wind, cars, sirens, birds, whistles, voices, HVAC, Neighbors, and so on. We should be able to use light amplification for instruments if needed. For example, a keyboard (which is quieter than a piano), and other instruments like a lute that were too quiet for the audience to hear at the back. When we talked about amplification in our original application and hearings we were thinking about large speakers that rock and roll bands and DJs use, as an example, etc. We do not allow dance bands or DJs.
- iv. Further to this, Mr. William Skrabak confirmed that the conditions were not intended to limit us in regards to the type of examples I mentioned above. In another call, he said the same to Neeta and Johan and that it was meant to limit large speakers (like 2 feet tall).
- v. Throughout each event, staff will monitor to ensure that an appropriate volume level is maintained.

Addressing Other Conditions

- 1. Noise Readings as per SUP Conditions
 - a. Condition 29: Within thirty days after the third representative concert to be held following the SUP approval, the applicant shall submit a report on his conducting noise measurements during three representative concert events using the service of a professional acoustic consultant to verify compliance with the City noise code at all property lines including those of 409 and 411 N. Columbus properties. City staff shall be invited to observe the measurements of the consultant.
 - b. Condition 30: if the results of these noise measurements show non-compliance with the noise code, the applicant shall submit a mitigation plan to the City within one month from the date of the report submission and implement all mitigation measures within two months from the submission date of the mitigation plan, all to the satisfaction of the Director of T&ES. During this period of non-compliance, the applicant shall apply for a temporary noise variance permit.
 - i. We still stand by our expert consultants report as well as our own analysis that the overall median and average of the **valid** readings is in compliance as per the noise ordinance. 9% of the noise readings should be excluded because of significant noise from extraneous sources as marked on the noise measurement readings, leaving a total of 739 out of 813 noise readings. April 25, 2021 Median 59.7, Average 58.3. May 27, 2021 Median 56, Average 57.1. July 23, 2021 Median 57.2, Average 57.7. We also gave the median and average by location in our email on October 17th. Our overall is Median 57.1 and Average 57.6 and this still includes the intermittent applause which we also felt should not be included.



- ii. This is just a note that we are working closely with T&ES in regards to noise readings, our mitigation plan, and the implementation of our mitigation plan. We will continue to do all that we can to mitigate an impact on the community.

 - a. Conditions 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15.
 - i. We have maintained our agreements to meet the parking requirements of all of these conditions. During the last year, we monitored the street parking situation and during all events we took photos of Princess St and N. Columbus St to make record that the streets were mostly empty with ample open spots for the residential neighbors.
- 3. Community Questions and Noise Concerns

Our expert consultant report as well as our own analysis shows that the overall median and average of the valid readings are as follows: April 25, 2021 Median 59.7, Average 58.3. May 27, 2021 Median 56, Average 57.1. July 23, 2021 Median 57.2, Average 57.7. Patrons are very quiet except they show their appreciation of the artists by briefly clapping.

B. How will the noise be controlled?

The outdoor garden is surrounded on all sides by our three story office building, tall 6 and 8 ft. fencing, 10-30 ft trees around property, and other landscaping to help mitigate the "noise". Our windows are double paned. We have strict guidelines about what is allowed. Staff will actively monitor the "noise" levels at our property lines to ensure that an appropriate volume level is maintained within the noise ordinance. If the "noise" level exceeds the noise ordinance, we will tell the performers to decrease their sound. We have been in the process on ongoing mitigation and will continue with more measures that we are implementing based on consultation with TE&S and private acoustic and sound experts. **8.** Describe any potential odors emanating from the proposed use and plans to control them:

On rare occasions we may have food provided by a permitted caterer or a food establishment (restaurant). Food is stored and prepared at the permitted food establishment (not on site), transported on the day of an event using approved storage, and all refuse, trash and equipment will be collected and removed fromour site immediately at the end of the event.

Covanta Alexandria Waste Management facility on Eisenhower or the Recycling Drop Off Center in Alexandria on Eisenhower.

We have a trash receptacle at the entrances/exits of the garden and building. Our concerts do not have any printed materials as due to COVID-19 everything is provided electronically. Staff monitors the area surrounding our property before, during and after concerts and would pick up litter if any left behind.

To the editor:

I was both dismayed and saddened by the recent letter published from Guy Lamolinara regarding Classical Movements. Many of the facts presented in his letter were misleading and largely untrue. For example, most of the programs sponsored by Classical Movements are in fact just one hour each - typically spread a few hours apart on a Saturday. Two hours total.

And fortunately, most of the attendees left their "rock and roll stage" a long time ago and are all rather somber. The large events are few and far between. Due to the pandemic, the crowds are kept to a minimum at all events.

The process for approval of this venue followed the same public process with the same level of integrity as others, with support provided from many other neighbors. Lamolinara is indeed in closer proximity to the venue than most of us – but I would urge him to refocus his concern.

His current goal appears to be getting retribution by making paying customers suffer as he believes he is. Rather than putting his energy into disrupting the programs, as he has during the two one-hour shows I've attended – e.g., yelling loudly in his yard during chamber music, banging pots during opera – I would instead invite friends over to take advantage of the proximity. We are all paying good money to hear artists of this caliber and he would be able to enjoy it all for free!

It's especially unfortunate that the artists are equally impacted. We've all had to make sacrifices during the pandemic and the arts industry was hit especially hard. Artists are struggling to survive.

I personally am far more concerned about the level of activity and noise associated with the imminent Sunrise facility also adjacent to his property, with its hundreds of residents utilizing outdoor spaces.

I do hope Lamolinara finds ways to enjoy reading a book and have conversations while Mozart or light jazz plays in the background. And I hope that Classical Movements continues to bring joy to so many people in the community we all share and love.

Neeta Helms, the president of Classical Movements in Old Town, was named one of Musical America's top 30 professionals of 2021, according to a news release.

Classical Movements organizes tours of classical music ensembles around the world. In 2020, with concerts cancelled or put on hold due to the pandemic, Classical Movements shifted gears and started hosting outdoor concerts in the "secret garden" behind its Old Town headquarters at 711 Princess St. The first entry in the concert series, which took place in June 2020, was the first live classical music concert since the start of the pandemic. The concerts remain a huge hit with residents and local classical music fans and regularly feature musicians from renowned national symphonies.

Helms also oversaw other pandemic-era projects, including virtual music education programs, a live streamed concert of India and a crosscountry celebration of President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris' inauguration.

Helms was recognized as part of a special report from Musical America, one of the country's oldest classical music magazines, titled "The Pandemic: Meeting the Moment." This year's report honored those "whose heroic efforts have helped to sustain the performing arts during one of the most difficult and often tragic times in modern history — the pandemic." Helms was named alongside acclaimed musicians such as Jennifer Koh and the leaders behind the San Diego Symphony and Seattle Opera, according to the release.

Chapman and Aguirre run for re-election

Councilors John Chapman and Canek Aguirre announced on Feb. 1 they would be running for re-election for Alexandria City Council.

Chapman, a lifelong Alexandrian, has served on City Council since 2012. He has worked as an educator throughout the region and currently works in Fairfax County Public Schools as a community use program specialist. He also owns and operates Manumission Tour Company, a local Black history tour company.

Aguirre, the first person of Hispanic heritage to serve on council, was elected in 2018 and during his time on council helped lead the city's 2020 Census Complete Count Committee, resulting in a 100% count of Alexandria households.

Council approves stormwater fee increase

City Council unanimously passed an ordinance doubling the stormwater utility fee from \$140 to \$280 during a Feb. 20 public hearing.

The increased fee will add \$155 million into the city's coffers over the next

10 years and will help fund an ambitious new flood mitigation action plan, according to city staff. The plan includes various capacity and spot improvement projects meant to overhaul Alexandria's crumbling stormwater infrastructure.

Although residents have been calling on the city to take action and address the stormwater system after a slew of intense flooding events over the past two years, several residents said they believed enlarging the city's budget was not enough to curb flooding in their neighborhoods. Previously, the city has used the stormwater fee to fund projects intended to control water quality and not flooding.

Bagley, Lewis join City Council race

Another City Council candidate, affordable housing advocate and community activist Sarah Bagley, tossed her hat in the ring on Feb. 9. James Lewis, vice chair of the Alexandria Traffic and Parking Board, also announced on Feb. 10 that he was running for City Council in the June 8 Democratic Primary.

Council denies Braddock West project

City Council voted 4-3 to deny a request from developer West Street Acquisitions, LLC, to build a 180-unit multi-use building across from the Braddock Road Metro station that would have featured 14 affordable housing units, during a public hearing on March 13.

In addition to housing, the building proposal included plans to provide additional space for retail, restaurants and other shopping. While the city's Planning Commission voted 6-1 in December 2020 to approve the project's development special use permit, several members of council expressed concern with the building's impact on an already over-taxed stormwater system and its relative lack of affordable housing when compared to other projects such as the redevelopment of the Heritage at Old Town apartment complex.

City and unions debate collective bargaining

The city discussed a proposed draft ordinance on collective bargaining on March 9 that, when passed, would bring the labor practice to Alexandria for the first time.

Collective bargaining is the legal process by which public sector employees negotiate their wages, benefits and working conditions with their government employers.

Alexandria's proposed ordinance was much more limited in scope than those on the books in Washington D.C. and Maryland. It allowed only for legally binding negotiations over wages and benefits. The proposed ordinance did not include negotiations about working conditions, such as how workplace hours and schedules are assigned and how the city manages its handling of grievances and discipline.

Council approves American Rescue Plan spending

City Council approved the immediate use of \$450,000 in American Rescue Plan funding to extend food distribution and housing assistance efforts through July during the March 23 legislative meeting.

Like localities across the country, Alexandria was eligible to receive a direct influx of funding from ARPA, the \$1.9 trillion federal COVID-19 stimulus package that President Joseph Biden signed into law on March 11. The city would ultimately receive \$59.4 million in direct funding, while Alexandria City Public Schools would receive about \$35.4 million.

It's coming up on four months since the <u>coronavirus</u> scattered every cluster of the classical music community back to their respective abodes, and over the course of this eerie interim, it's as though a whole new set of instincts has set in to replace the old ones. In the past, my preparations for a concert involved listening to the work a few times, finding a trustworthy pen and eating a big enough lunch to keep my stomach from joining in with the orchestra.

Saturday afternoon's checklist was a bit more thorough.

I was preparing to head to Old Town Alexandria, where the local orchestral and choral touring company Classical Movements was hosting "Sounds of Hope & Harmony," an outdoor trio of hour-long chamber concerts in the "Secret Garden" tucked behind its former-rectory headquarters on Princess Street. But it felt like I was preparing for battle.

I had my mask — two of them, actually — a blue plaid number that seemed formal enough to block pathogens at a garden party. I had a small bottle of Purell. A big bottle of water. A hankie for lens fog. An umbrella and a raincoat for the looming thunderheads. A printout of my assigned location in the garden (No. 11 of 35 or so reserved spots). And my usual kit of reporter stuff — phone, pad, pen. I also had a serious case of nerves.



Riding to the rectory in the back of a Lyft, I took shallow breaths (which I'm sure is effective) and hung my head halfway out the open window with all the enthusiasm of a golden retriever en route to the vet. It was raining, and the ominous droplets pelting my forehead felt like tiny omens that I should turn around and go back to the apartment, that this was all too soon, that it was actually crazy. My phone said crowds were starting to form at President Trump's campaign rally in Tulsa, and I felt around my tote bag to make sure I had my inhaler.

But upon reaching the garden, the rain stalled, the clouds parted, the sun glimmered through the trees, and the sounds of nearly two dozen musicians tuning in the various rooms of the 235-year-old rectory filtered into the courtyard. It was the sound of music preparing to return; and just like that, my jitters subsided.

This time out, hand-sanitizing stations stood at the ready and little flags staked out each listener's spot for standing, six feet apart (though couples could cluster). It felt odd at first, but also oddly luxurious if you've ever been vexed by the personal space afforded by seats in a concert hall. Attendees improvised their hey-I-know-you reunions in the rows through a mix of elbow bumps and weird waves and salutes.

The musicians, too, had some improvising to do. Ensembles representing the Alexandria Symphony Orchestra, the National Symphony Orchestra, the New Orchestra of Washington, as well as the Barclay Brass ensemble (which includes members of the Maryland, Annapolis and Fairfax symphony orchestras) were staggered across the three programs and spread around the stage — the unfamiliar acoustics of socially distant performance requiring more reliance on visual cues between the players.

A quintet of horn players from the Alexandria Symphony Orchestra opened the evening easing into selections from Giles Farnaby's "Fancies, Toyes, and Dreams" before seguing into "That's a Plenty," a 1914 rag-turned-jazz-standard by Lew Pollack, and one of a few detours into ragtime that lent the program a disarming lightness. Members of the NSO later took on Scott Joplin's "Maple Leaf Rag" and Barclay Brass chased the second suite from Handel's "Water Music" with Allen Toussaint's "Java." (And in all cases, even when a rag sounds a little rusty, it feels right.)

The wind quintet of National Symphony Orchestra players also gave a brilliant account of Valerie Coleman's "Umoja" (written for Imani Winds) that held court against the noisy birds in the tulip magnolia above us. And a quintet of string players from the Alexandria Symphony Orchestra showcased the skilled interplay of concertmaster Claudia Chudacoff and violinist Peter Haase, delivering a stirringly beautiful selection from Mozart's Divertimento No. 4 in D.

Their take on Shostakovich's lovably stumbling polka from "The Golden Age" — and its grasping toward a familiar form — felt freshly relatable; and likewise, their closing selection of "Toreador Song" from "Carmen" felt appropriately victorious for the occasion. After all, we'd made it!

Much like those nervously gathered to listen, the program was a little all over the place; but the intimacy of the experience — and our collective hunger to hear just about anything — gave the feeling that audience and performers were conducting the same experiment: just being there. Even before the first notes were played, I found myself getting lost in the music of chitchat and laughter — our own birdsong.

And while there were little reminders of the virus — the wiping down of musicians' seats between sets, the concerted effort to avoid touching the microphone, somewhat-matchy masks — it never overshadowed the evening. (The sun sails hung overhead did that, while helping keep the music contained from the roar of landing planes.)

For audience and musicians alike — and especially for Helms and her team, who found themselves immediately fielding questions about when the next concert will be (they're figuring it out) — the various tweaks, compromises and precautions required to realize something as simple as a night of music felt like a major achievement. I was tempted to high-five my neighbors in audience but, well, you know.

Live Outdoor Concerts by Four Indoor Organizations

As the cancellations mount up for performing arts organizations, most are continuing their valiant efforts to
stay in the public eye online.
A few brave souls are complementing that with small outdoor events, using safety protocols that are perhaps
awkward and labor-intensive to execute, but nonetheless worth it, both for the players and the listeners.
Among the first to go the al fresco route was the Minnesota Orchestra, earlier this month announcing a series
of 24 chamber concerts on the adjacent Peavy Plaza in August, each lasting no more than 70 minutes (no
intermission), requiring advance reservations, face masks, temperature screenings, and keeping to a total
capacity--including staff--of 250. Ensemble size is up to eight.
The Detroit Symphony has since followed a <u>similar path</u> - small ensembles of DSO musicians performing six
concerts out of doors in varying locales, some of which require reservations; all events are free with strict
protocols in place for social distancing (those who don't follow the rules will be asked to leave); no seating
provided—BYOBlanket.
The San Francisco Symphony, which has a new online series titled Currents, also has joined the al fresco crowd
with its <u>1:1 Concerts</u>, bringing a new level to intimacy—literally one orchestra member performing for one
listener at a time, using the Davies Hall outdoor terraces. First priority goes to donors, volunteers, etc., but it
appears they may be available to the general public as well.

Classical Movements just launched the first of an ongoing outdoor series in Alexandria, VA, titled <u>Sounds of</u> <u>Hope and Harmony</u>. National Symphony Orchestra musicians are among the performers and tickets can be purchased through CM's website. Planned to continue through October 4 on Saturday evenings, the 18 concerts take place in a church garden in Old Town, Alexandria, and feature a range of repertoire.

Kudos to all for fighting the uphill battle of the pandemic.

I'll just say it inspired a friend, to get a ticket for next week, which inspired my getting a ticket for me and , since she hasn't seen her friend and fellow artist for at least 5 months, a period that not coincidentally coincides with a certain current event. It will be a brass and percussion extravaganza, which means we may miss the many bird songs and occasional overhead jet.

I should say a word or two about this concert, which left me in varied states of mesmerization. It began with the beautiful soprano, Kaylee Norris, striking in a red-violet (I think?) gown, singing with poignant longing of love in French, Italian, and German. She has a lovely and expressive voice. The famous Chilian baritone Javier Arrey began with untypical song cycles by Dvořák and Beethoven, and I warmed to his singing as he progressed. He ended and brought the house down by acting and singing the Count's musical monologue from Act 3 of Mozart's "The Marriage of Figaro", not a typical operatic aria with a recognizable structure, but a soliloquy whose phrasing flows with the intensity of the expression.
