PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION, NOVEMBER 1, 2022:

On a motion by Commissioner Lyles, seconded by Vice Chair McMahon, the Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of Special Use Permit #2022-00046. The motion carried on a vote of 6 to 0 with Commissioner Ramirez absent.

Reason: The Planning Commission agreed with the staff analysis.

<u>Discussion:</u> Vice Chair McMahon spoke in favor of the project, noting that while many of the concerns raised are valid issues, the importance of upgrading existing recreational facilities as the City grows and demand increases is critical.

Commissioner Lyle spoke in favor of the City providing as many recreational facilities as possible, both programmed and unprogrammed.

Commissioner Brown expressed his appreciation for the speakers who attended the meeting and hearing the thoughts of both those for and against the proposed lights. He encouraged those with continuing concerns to attend the City Council meeting, given the more limited role that Planning Commission has in the decision.

Commissioner Koenig concurred with the comments made by Commissioners Brown and Vice Chair McMahon on the need to address limited resources and the challenges of shared uses.

Chair Macek spoke how he has been impacted by lack of lighted fields, and sees the benefit of longer use of the fields for both youth and adults. He noted the importance of lit football fields due to limitations made by past decision, the benefit of lit fields at middle schools and his overall support for lights at the recreational athletic fields.

<u>Speakers:</u> As the five SUP requests were presented together in a single staff presentation, the public testimony was given on the five SUP requests as a group, although they were recommended for individual approval.

Mary Cypressi, a resident, expressed concerns that the proposed lighting at the George Washington Field would impact the residential properties on Glendale Avenue.

Jim Hogan, an employee with the Alexandria Soccer Association (ASA), supports the addition of lights at the five sites and spoke about the overcrowding issues the addition of lights would help address.

Omar Maranon, a resident, spoke in support of lights at the five sites, as the lighting would provide more playing time at night to avoid the issues of playing during the day.

Carter Fleming, a resident with the Seminary Hill Association, spoke against the light proposal specifically at the Hammond School field, expressing concern with how the fields are monitored and enforced.

Brian Collins, a resident, expressed concern with the lights and installation of synthetic turf at the George Washington School field and Simpson Field.

Frank Putzu, a resident, spoke about his discussions with ASA about operations and listed recommendations to improve youth sports, concerns with adult leagues, and concerns with the lights proposed at Hammond School field.

Nathaniel Burkey, an ASA coach, spoke in support of lights at the five sites and how the lights progress schools and sports for the City.

Johnatan Nunez, an ASA coach, spoke in support of the lights at the five sites and how the increased time the fields are available would help with the issues with field space.

Lisa Chimento, a parent of a ASA player, spoke in support of the lights at the five sites, the positive impacts of sports on the community and the benefits of extended use of the fields.

Terry Androus, a resident, spoke it support of lighting at the five sites, discussing the crowding issues, rising demand for field use, and benefits of playing after dark.

Dino Drudi, a resident and associated with the West End Citizens Association, stated no issue with the lights but concerns with the proposed heights.

Christina Payne, a resident, spoke against the proposed lights at the George Washington School field, expressing concerns with the light spillage and glare impacting the residential properties north of the field.

Jennie Courts, a resident, expressed concern with increased activity at the Jefferson-Houston School field impacting pedestrian safety, parking issues along Cameron Street, trash and inaccessibility to restrooms.

Sarah Christie, an employee with ASA, spoke in favor of the lights at all five sites would help with field usage issues and programming.

Melkim Gutierez and Angel Valdez, ASA players, spoke in support of the lights at the five fields and the positive impact ASA has had on their lives.

Beka Wakene, a resident, spoke in support of the lights at the five fields, which provides more playing opportunities and the positive impacts ASA has had on the community.


Thomas Park, an ASA employee, spoke in support of lights at the five sites, as the increase in participants with ASA has increased field usage demand and lights would address crowding issues, and how ASA wants to work on addressing neighbors concerns.

Jerbin Rodriguez, an ASA player, spoke in support of lights at the five sites, describing having to move between fields due to lighting and space restrictions, as well as the benefits of playing sports.

Ruben Alverado and German Arenival, ASA players, spoke in support of lights at the five sites, as it would allow more opportunities to play and provides a benefit to kids.

Susan Nelson, a resident, spoke against lights at the Hammond School field, expressing her appreciation for playing soccer but concerns with the use of the field by so many groups and the negative impacts on the adjacent neighborhood.

Rob Benedict, a resident, spoke against lights at the George Washington School site, expressing concern that the lights will negatively impact the adjacent residents.



I. REPORT SUMMARY

REQUEST

The applicant, the City of Alexandria Department of Recreation, Parks and Cultural Activities (RPCA), requests Special Use Permit (SUP) approval to allow athletic field lighting for two athletic fields at Eugene Simpson Stadium Park, located at 600 E. Monroe Avenue.

SITE DESCRIPTION

Eugene Simpson Stadium Park and the two adjoining athletic fields (Simpson Park) combine for a 16-acre public City Park located in the northeast area of the City, connecting the Del Ray neighborhood to the north and west with the Potomac West/Yards neighborhoods to the east. The park is bordered by Richmond Highway to the east, East Monroe Avenue to the south, the YMCA Alexandria to the west, and a mix of townhouses and apartments to the north. The site is split zoned, with the western portion of the park zoned POS/Public Open Space and Community Recreation zone, and the eastern portion of the zoned CDD#10/Coordinated Development District #10. As such, the property is also split between the Potomac West Small Area Plan and the Potomac Yard/Potomac Greens Small Area Plan, as shown on the image below.

The land for Simpson Park was donated to the City in the 1940's and in 1953 Eugene Simpson contributed the funds to build the two diamond fields that currently exist at the park. After the realignment of Route 1 was completed in 2008, the two rectangular fields were established as part of the development of Potomac Yard Park, approved in 2008. It should be noted that when Potomac Yard Park was originally approved (DSUP2006-00013), six athletic field lights were approved with a condition that "lights shall be installed by others in the future" (condition 70.e.iv). However, the lights were never installed as it was uncertain if the site was to develop with a new school (discussed in Background section below). The two diamond fields and basketball court in the park currently have lighting that have been located at the park for many years and appear to pre-date the introduction, in 1992, of a SUP requirement for the installation of lighting. The existing light poles that were renovated in 2011 and 2013, and measure 70 feet tall for Simpson Stadium, the little league lights are 60 and 70 feet tall, and the basketball court lights are 40 feet tall. Additionally, in 2013, a SUP was approved for three light poles measuring 23 feet tall within the existing dog park area just west of the subject Field #1 in the image above.

BACKGROUND

RPCA has been conducting a community engagement program for the installation of athletic field lighting across the City. This application is one of five being processed concurrently for the October public hearings. The intent of the lighting is to provide additional capacity to accommodate current and increasing scholastic and community program needs with the City's fixed field resources. The new lighting will support the City Council 2022 Community Priority to Support Youth and Families program by expanding capacity for youth programs as well as the City's goal of providing equitable access to facilities and services across the City.

The portion of the park within the CDD #10 zone was designated for Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) use as a potential future school development (CDD2007-0001). While designated, the CDD condition stated that this area be maintained as public open space and utilized for active recreation purposes until such time ACPS and City Council pursues school development. As ACPS has not scheduled a new school at this site in the current 10-year CIP Budget, the School Board unanimously voted to allow RPCA continued use the land for recreational purposes for a minimum of 10 more years at their July 2, 2022, meeting (see attachment 1). It should also be noted that the City is planning to conduct renovations to Simpson Park per the 2014 Citywide Park Plan recommendations, including improvements to the diamond fields, parking, circulation and accessibility. The project received Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget approval in FY 2020 and is currently in the design process.

PROPOSAL

The City's Department of Recreation, Parks and Cultural Activities proposes to install twelve (12) sixty-foot-tall poles with LED fixtures to extend the time the two fields can be used. Three light poles will be placed on either side along the long sides of both fields to provide adequate coverage, six light poles per field. The galvanized steel light poles will be set on precast concrete bases. Ten poles will have four fixtures and two will have five fixtures (see Graphic 1). The light system is designed to comply with the International Dark-Sky Association (IDA) Community Friendly Outdoor Sports Lighting Program and provide full cutoff lighting. An

early draft of the proposed lighting designs were reviewed and received a letter of certification from the IDA (see attachment 2). Any adjustments to the light pole locations will be reviewed by IDA and recertified. The athletic field lights will be connected to the remote facility management system to provide staff control of the light schedules. There are 74 existing parking spaces at the park site that are available for the recreational field use.

BUDGET

If approved, this project will be submitted in the FY 2025 Capital Improvement Budget process with a potential completion date in calendar year 2026, if the project receives funding.

ZONING/MASTER PLAN DESIGNATION

The majority of the two rectangular fields are located within an area zoned CDD#10, with a small area that includes three of the 12 proposed light poles located within the area zoned POS. As previously noted, the CDD#10 has designated the area as public open space and active recreation. The SUP for this case is triggered by Section 6-403(F) which requires that light poles for congregate recreational facilities that exceed the height limit of the subject zoning district seek approval through a SUP.

While the two rectangular fields are not specifically noted in the Potomac Yard/Potomac Greens or Potomac West Small Area Plans, they were approved through CDD #10 (DSUP 2006-0013 and DSUP 2010-0012) as Monroe Fields as active recreation for the benefit of the community, key aspects of both plans. The proposed lighting is compatible with both Plan's principles for preserving/creating community serving open space and creating a sense of place with neighborhood identity and vitality and achieving a walkable neighborhood that is secure and feels safe.

II. STAFF ANALYSIS

Staff supports the request to install lighting at the Simpson Fields, which requires SUP approval given that height of the lights would exceed 45 feet. The proposed lighting would comply with the Zoning Ordinance Section 6-403(f), including the 35-foot setback requirement and height not exceeding 80 feet. The proposal for field lighting is a common recreational accessory found on many of the City's recreational fields. The added lighting will increase the capacity of the fields by extending the time in which they can be used. There is a current and increasing community need for lighted athletic field space, and the proposed lighting would also encourage equitable access to recreational facilities to all City residents.

The lights are embracing the latest in light technologies, comply with the requirement for luminaire assemblies. The LED bulbs will utilize full cutoff light fixtures which are independently certified by the manufactures and designed to not allow light to be emitted above the fixture and reduce glare by limiting the light output. Light spill will be very minimal, limited to no further than 45 feet from the field to the sides facing residential properties to the north (Graphic 2). The proposed lights will also not spill light into E. Monroe Avenue or Richmond Highway, minimizing any impacts to traffic at night when the lights are being used. While they

will be easily seen when lit at night, the design of the LED fixtures will also reduce any glare impacts to the taller multi-family buildings south across E. Monroe Avenue or in south Potomac Yard.

The lighting system controls will enable staff to operate the lights remotely and with program specific dates and time for use. The lights are proposed to operate with the same hours as existing field lighting and will turn off automatically no later than 10:00 pm. The lights will only be turned on if the field has been reserved and permitted through RPCA. On evenings where no permits have been approved the lights will remain off. Overall, staff views the proposal as a sensible and reasonable improvement to the highly used and desirable athletic fields for expanded use for the community.

III. COMMUNITY OUTREACH

As shown the chart below, there have been multiple community meetings and meetings with interested boards and commissions. The meetings discussed all five sites where new field lighting is being proposed. The Park and Recreation Commission has endorsed the proposed lighting at all five locations (see attachment 3).

RPCA made a concerted effort to do outreach to as much of the community as possibly, reaching out to 14 Civic Associations (see attachment 5) and many of the City's sports and activities organizations. Over 100 comments were submitted in response to the field lights at the five proposed locations (see attachment 4). The vast majority in support of the lights noting the benefits to the community of extended hours for the field lights. RPCA received comments and concerns from individuals related to noise, traffic, parking, and increased trash. To address potential increase in trash, RPCA has installed additional trash and recycling containers in and around the athletic field with signage to encourage users to deposit trash as appropriate. RPCA is

and will continue to work with permit holders to utilize the facilities parking lot and other designated parking areas on the school site. In addition, RPCA closely coordinates field use with the Youth Sports Advisory Board to assist with monitoring league activities to mitigate potential impacts to the adjacent community.


IV. RECOMMENDED CONDITIONS


Staff recommends **approval** subject to compliance with all applicable codes and ordinances and the following conditions:

Given that APCS has not scheduled a new school at this site in the current 10-year CIP Budget, ACPS staff can negotiate the use of the fields by RPCA. Dr. Alicia Hart, Chief of Facilities and Operations, indicated that there was no new information on this agenda item, regarding the use of Simpson Field by the City but her team was here to answer questions.

Board Members asked questions regarding clarity of the size of the site that was being discussed, what terms will be discussed in the negotiations with City staff, the availability of additional acreage if needed for a school site and where the final agreement language will be available for future reference.

Ms. Erika Gulick, Director of Capital Programs, Planning and Design, clarified the size of the area being discussed. She indicated that the soccer field is approximately four acres of land and the baseball field approximately two acres. Ms. Sophie Huemer, Planner II, further clarified that the space is approximately 120,000 sq. ft. of land.

Mr. Elnoubi moved to allow the City of Alexandria use of the identified site at Simpson Fields for a minimum of ten years and permit staff to negotiate the final details of field use by RPCA.

Ms. Booz seconded the motion.

The vote to allow use of Simpson Field for a minimum of 10 years by RPCA was unanimous, 9-0. The motion carried. Ms. Ignacio voted orally in the affirmative.

Dear Mayor Wilson and Members of City Council,

The Park & Recreation Commission unanimously endorses the plan put forth by the Department of Recreation, Parks and Cultural Activities to add field lighting to five proposed locations: Francis C Hammond Middle School, Patrick Henry K-8 School, Jefferson Houston K-8 School, George Washington Middle School and Eugene Simpson Stadium Park.

As you are aware, a multitude of new construction and modernization projects have limited the availability of field capacity during a time in which the City has experienced a significant increase in demand for recreational resources by both our student population as well as our fellow citizens. This is all good news! We want our fields to be actively utilized and have an opportunity to increase capacity to meet the increased demand.

Adding lights to an existing field, particularly a synthetic field, increases the useability of that field by approximately 1,100 hours per year. This increase in field capacity is extraordinarily efficient when compared to creating new fields, which are substantially more expensive to build and requires the land to accommodate the field and its infrastructure needs.

We understand the concerns related to additional field usage including excessive noise, and trash outside of the receptacles. Because the use of a lighted athletic field is by permit only, City staff will be in a better position to manage problems as they arise, and if necessary, we encourage RPCA staff to coordinate with ACPS and APD to respond to these issues by potentially revoking permits of non-complying parties or citing repeat offenders.

Opportunities to add capacity to our recreational system in a cost-efficient manner should not be missed and we encourage the full funding of these projects and endorse the approval of these five sites.

Dear ACPS Board Members.

I am a resident of Alexandria and an ACPS parent and I support the Athletic Field Lighting Proposal which is an important step towards meeting the needs of our community. Additional capacity for play space equals healthy, active and engaged students. For more than a decade my neighbors and I have opposed lighting on fields at schools, which are too close to residential property and of little value to the students attending these schools. Why the Parks & Rec Department keeps revisiting unwelcome plans--like lighting Hammond's field--is beyond rational understanding.

The lights on fields in the City are never properly monitored and shine unnecessarily after events are over. The City staff take no responsibility for controlling excessive noise or picking up the volumes of trash--some of which is hazardous and illegal--on these fields. The ACPS tells us they do not have the funds for trash cans or staff to clean the fields. The number of trash receptacles is woefully inadequate on all fields.



Mr. Browand,

Writing to provide feedback on the proposal to install field lighting, specifically as a homeowner living within a block of the Jefferson Houston field. Overall I support adding the lights. Providing kids and our community a safe place for exercise is critical and we should be doing everything we can to encourage it. With it getting dark early much of the school year, it's hard to believe we've gone this long without lights. I'd love to see the field and lights available for the greater community to use outside school events, such as adult pick-up soccer.

I do have the following concerns that I'd like considered when designing the lights and implementing usage policies:

- 1. Parking during games. Many of the homes near the Jefferson-Houston field such as mine rely entirely on on-street parking. The only time currently that can be challenging is during the daytime on weekends when soccer games are held. As far as I'm aware, there should be ample parking available at the school and at the pool, yet many parents decide instead to park onstreet, unaware they are creating an issue for local residents. Since we're near King St, we're on the border of the parking zone, and therefore can only go further north to park. By installing lights and having games during weeknights, I fear this problem will get much worse. While understandably the street parking is public, I'd like to see ways to encourage parents parking for games to use the lots, maybe by signage or consider lowering the allowed time for non-residents and strictly enforcing. I'd also like a reasonable limit on how late organized games can be held (say 7 or 8pm). Practices, casual pick-up games, and other usage unlikely to draw a large parking demand would be ok past this time.
- 2. Light pollution, both to the immediate neighbors as well as our city's larger contribution to it. As it is, I think our city could do better at decreasing light pollution, such as by upgrading and redesigning our street lamps, encouraging homeowners to limit excess light and more. While I don't have knowledge on the possibilities for the design of the field lights, I hope this can be taken into consideration with lighting technology available today. The usage of the lights should be limited only when the fields are actively being used, ideally with the community being able to turn on as needed, similar to public tennis courts.
- 3. Litter and maintenance. Simply consider the impact that greater field use will have on the amount of litter and wear and tear on the facility, increasing resources to address. Currently you often see some trash after games and there is at least one path light in need of repair.

In addition, once the lights are installed and in use, I'd like the City to commit to periodically assessing their impact on the community and soliciting feedback.

Hello,

I live at 704 Mount Vernon Ave, across the street from Lenny Harris Memorial Fields. I got a notice about a planning commission and city council meeting regarding lights to be installed at GW middle school.

I don't know much about the plans, such as where lights would be installed, the hours they would be on, etc. In case I am not able to attend the meetings, I have a few comments.

The city installed new streetlights a couple years ago -- so outside our house we have the regular street lights as well as the new high powered street lights. I noticed a huge difference in the light coming into our bedroom window at night and use a black curtain to keep out that light. At this point, the blackout curtain is sufficient for me, my toddler and my baby, but light still gets in. My main concern about the lights the city would like to install in the athletic fields is two-fold: 1. the lights will be powerful and will impact both my and my babies sleep (ideally the lights would be out by 7pm), and 2. Noise. if there is light at night, permitting athletic or recreational events, will there be resulting noise late into the evening? Again, a cutoff of 7pm would be preferable. As is, we already have a lot of noise coming from Lena's. It does impact the sleep on the nights of live music.

Finally, the city might consider the Dark Sky Initiative guidelines for athletic field lights:

Hello,

I am concerned about light glow from the existing and proposed athletic field lights at Eugene Simpson Park. I am a resident and homeowner on the 400 block of Duncan Ave, directly adjacent to Eugene Simpson Park, and I received a notice about SUP #2022-00046 (construction of 60ft tall lights) in the mail. I oppose SUP #2022-00046 because light glow from the existing baseball field lights shines directly into my bedroom, making it difficult to sleep, and I am concerned the proposed lights will exacerbate this problem. I have an infant son, and these lights make it difficult to sleep. It is unreasonable to expect children or adults to be forced to stay awake until 10pm. I am also concerned about light pollution generally, the energy consumption from these lights, and the cost to taxpayers.

The city could mitigate some of these issues by planting large shade trees along both sides of Duncan Ave and the edge of the park, to block glow from reaching resident's nearby bedroom windows. This tactic has proven successful in the small sections of the North side of the park where there are trees, but gaps remain on Duncan Ave where the trees along the baseball diamond outfield fence are too short, and there are no trees planted on either side of Duncan Ave. There are also large line-of-sight gaps without trees in the NE quadrant of Simpson Park and the abutting back alley. It appears the city has not adequately planned for tree succession at Simpson Park, as nearly all trees currently in the park are in mid- to late-stages of life, and there are no young oak trees (or comparable large shade trees) that have been planted to prepare for their succession.

Well said Mr. Deweese thank you. My wife and I live on Knox place and although we are on the opposing side of pegram we also experience the noise pollution from the adult soccer contingent. The adults play soccer on the main upper field(a) as well as the basketball court located slightly below the main field directly adjacent from the parking lot simultaneously. The amount of adult men participating in soccer seems to range between 30 -50. Obviously, there's going to be communication going on the fields during these games. Unfortunately, it's much louder than normal conversation. It's more like shouting. We also have a small dog we walk around the outside of Hammonds drives. What I've noticed is that the another bi-product of the adult soccer contingent is litter. The trash cans provided by Hammond are usually stuffed to capacity. Once they are overflowing trash is simply discarded on the grounds. However, the most unfortunate phenomenon of the adult soccer contingent is that they don't have access to a restroom. Consequently, they improvise. I have witnessed one man going number 2 at the bottom of the staircase descending from the upper field to the parking lot against the school wall. Additionally, I have seen several piles of soiled toilet paper on the walking path cutting between the basketball court and the upper field.

I don't necessarily have a problem with physical activity. I try to stay in pretty good shape. Occasionally, I take my four year old son over to the main soccer field. The issues I have are that I personally don't believe this is the correct location for 30-50 grown adult men to be participating in pickup soccer games. The field is a middle school field in a suburban neighborhood. It does not have appropriate waste management to accommodate these folks. Furthermore, it doesn't have a public bathroom. Consequently, whoever is using it would have to be within walking distance from their bathroom in their home or, be able to access the school bathroom during school hours.

These variables make the subject of adding lighting to this mismanaged situation moot. There's no way in heck that makes any sense. The city of Alexandria is failing Hammond Students as well as our neighborhood. Hopefully the city cares more for it's middle school students and it's tax paying neighborhood residents than a transient adult soccer contingent. There are plenty of accessible fields along Eisenhower avenue where they can go and play and express as loud and as late as they want.

Mr. Karl Moritz:

On August 8, 2022, Seminary Hill Association, Inc., (SHA) submitted a letter to City Manager Jim Parajon and Alexandria School Board Chairman Meaghan Alderton seeking information in connection with Special Use Permit (SUP) Application 2022-00042 to install lighting on one of the athletic fields at Francis Hammond Middle School (Hammond). Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) holds Development Site Plan 2000-0044 for Hammond. DSP 2000-0044 contains a provision prohibiting lighting unless ACPS applies for and receives a Special Use Permit (SUP). Despite this requirement, SUP 2022-00042 was submitted by the City of Alexandria Department of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs (RPCA). The September 13, 2022 letter did not mention or address DSP 2000-0044.

The Alexandria Planning Commission has docketed the item for its October 6, 2022 hearing. The September 13, 2022 letter concedes the SUP application is pursuant to Section 6-304(F) of the Alexandria Zoning Code as a congregate recreational facility.

We note that RPCA signed the application. RPCA was also identified in the staff report as a reviewer and approval authority of the application on behalf of the city staff, creating an irreconcilable conflict of interest. We further note that the staff report and supporting materials did not contain either the SHA August 8 letter or City's September 13 response. ¹

¹ The staff report is skeletal and does not address issues in this request for determinations.

There are four questions which SHA requests a Determination from the Planning Director in accordance with Section 11-1200 of the Alexandria Zoning Code:

1. A determination from the Planning Director that RPCA serving as both applicant and reviewer of its own application creates an irreconcilable conflict of interest.

ACPS operates a middle school at Hammond, and its DSP 2000-0044 contains Condition 16, requiring ACPS to seek and be responsible for a Special Use Permit (SUP) for any lighting at Hammond. Despite this clear requirement, RPCA submitted the application. Part of the rationale behind DSP 2000-0044 was to maintain integrity of the planning process, and avoid conflicts for the city to act as applicant and reviewing authority of itself. In this instance, RPCA is identified as reviewing authority and recommended approval of its own application. This is precisely what Condition 16 was meant to address.²

Please determine that it violates state and Alexandria conflict of interest requirements for an applicant to serve as its own reviewing and recommending authority on behalf of the city.

2. A determination from the Planning Director stating that all requirements of Section 6-403(F) must be met.

In the September 13, 2022, response, City Manager Parajon states that application for SUP 2022-00042 is in accordance with Zoning Code Section 6-403(F) as a congregate recreational facility. The application is silent on which section of the zoning code the application was under, and we appreciated this information. Please note that there is very little or almost no space between the track and the school wall, and very little between the track and the public right of way on Pickett Street. The application contained no analysis on this matter.

In this regard, we note that Section 6-403(F) of the Alexandria Zoning Code, adopted in 2018, granted relief from height requirements for lighting congregate facilities. It states that:

"d) Poles shall be setback a minimum of 35 feet from any right-of-way or residential property line; . . ." Section 6-403(F)(2)(d). The plain language used is an unambiguous minimum requirement. At the October 13, 2018, Public Hearing, Council amended the

draft legislation specifically to add a mandatory 35 foot setback requirement.³ There was a full and robust discussion on this specific issue. Council stated that it recognized that athletic lighting was close to public rights of way and residences in many locations, recognized the negative impacts, and determined it was critical to provide assurances that athletic light poles must be 35 feet from the public right of way.⁴

As well, Council also cautioned against viewing adoption of height relief for athletic lighting for "congregate recreational facilities" as approval of lighting every potential field in the city. That is how RPCA seeks to use it here, seeking SUPs for multiple athletic fields with almost no analysis or study other than it meets the definition of congregate recreational facility – precisely what Council warned not to do. Instead, Council voted for a mandatory 35 foot setback to provide assurances of minimum required setback to mitigate negative impacts.

There is less than 35 feet between any possible poles and the right of way on Pickett Street.⁵ The application and staff report for SUP 2022-00042 is silent on setback requirements.

Please determine that all requirements of Section 6-403(F) must be met, including mandatory setback requirements of Section 6-403(F)(2)(d).

3. A determination from the Planning Director stating that the Condition 16 in DSP 2000-0044 continues to apply at the Hammond site.

ACPS holds Development Site Plan 2000-0044 for Hammond. DSP 2000-0044 contains a provision stating that any application for lighting must be through an SUP submitted by ACPS. City staff verified this in its report accompanying ACPS' application for lighting at Hammond in 2011, Staff Report, page 4, citing that DSP 2000-0044 contains "a development condition requiring ACPS to go through a Special Use Permit review when considering the installation of athletic lighting" at Hammond. Despite this requirement, the September 13, 2022 letter states that the City can seek an SUP on the same site on the same property.

³ The Planning Commission had recommended a 25 foot setback requirement. Council felt that a 35 foot setback was more appropriate and increased the setback requirement from 25 to 35 feet. Staff noted that "[t]here are additional setback and screening provisions for congregate athletic facilities near residential properties . . . " that would compel more than 35 feet setback requirement. The staff report on this SUP application is silent on setback, even though the proposal cannot meet the requirement.

⁴ The motion was made by Councilor Paul Smedberg and then Vice Mayor Wilson asserted that amending and increasing the setback from 25 to 35 feet was a friendly amendment. Council voted for it 6-1.

⁵ We calculated a total of about 25 feet from the track to the public right of way. We assume that neither the City nor ACPS are planning to remove the track, an asset of great community importance.

We are aware that on September 8, 2022, ACPS passed a Resolution that the School Board "consents to the SUP applications set forth above" (for Hammond, George Washington, Jefferson Houston, and Patrick Henry), but ACPS declined to sign the application or serve as the applicant, as we believe Condition 16 requires. Condition 16 in DSP 2000-0044 remains in effect, and ACPS is not seeking an amendment or modification, nor does the application for SUP 2022-00042 seek relief from Condition 16. The failure of ACPS to apply for the SUP, has created the irreconcilable conflict of interest as cited in our Question #1.

Please determine that Condition 16 of DSP 2000-0044 remains in effect.

4. A determination from the Planning Director on whether the DSP 2000-0044 or SUP 2022-00042 takes precedence. ACPS holds the current DSP for the Hammond site. In the event the application for SUP 2022-00043 is granted, there will be dual permit holders for the same site on the same property. It is highly unusual for one site on one property to have multiple permits and permit holders governing activity at the site. This leads to confusion and conflicts. For example, the RPCA application states that "ACPS security" is responsible for maintenance and security. The September 13, 2022, letter states that the city is responsible for management and maintenance after school hours. This is a matter of great importance since RPCA has asserted it lacks resources to oversee compliance with SUP requirements regarding lights each evening. In effect, RPCA points to ACPS as responsible for compliance and security, the city points to RPCA, and both ACPS and RPCA point to the Alexandria Police Department as responsible for oversight. APD has informed us that since it views the property as "owned" by ACPS (not the city), compliance and security are ACPS responsibilities "at all times," unless there is criminal activity.

Please determine whether the ACPS' DSP or RPCA's SUP takes precedence where a conflict occurs.

SHA reserves the right to appeal to the Board of Zoning Appeals, if necessary. We look forward to hearing from you. Because the Planning Commission hearing is October 6, 2022, SHA was notified of the proposal in June 2022, and the City's delayed response to our request for information, SHA requests an expedited review and determinations.

These are comments for the special use permit #2022-00045, Patrick Henry Elementary School and Recreation Center Athletic Field Lights.

- 1). We own/live at 4640 Taney Ave which is across the street from Patrick Henry Elementary School and the temporarily Douglas MacArthur Elementary School.
- 2). We are currently dealing with light pollution shining into our house from the next door St. Martin's Senior Citizens Center for which so far Dominion Energy has refused to install energy efficient lights or a light shield so that the lights stop shining into our house.
- 3). We are also now dealing with the temporary Douglas MacArthur Elementary School installing lights in the front of the school that have now been on for over 72 hours straight which are also shining into our house at all hours. The school has not currently returned emails on this concern raised and our request for the lights to be put on a timer.
- 4). As noted above, there is already significant light pollution at night in this area. We are unable to see "dark" at night due to this which is unhealthy. I'm concerned that if these lights are used at the recreational facilities at Patrick Henry, the situation with light pollution is going to get far worse.
- 5). While I understand the need for kids to play in the evening safely at the recreational area, I request that if these recreational lights are installed, they are put on timer that shuts off by 9 pm each night at the latest. There is too much light pollution in this neighborhood currently as noted above.

Alexandria Leadership,

I have concerns regarding the cost, environmental impact and safety of the overall proposals to install lights and plastic turf around the GW athletic fields near E Glendale Ave. In addition, the lighting proposal has the potential to cause light spillage that could drastically impact the quality of life of over 20 homes and two residential apartment buildings that abut the field on E Glendale Ave. Further, I believe that a thorough examination of these factors that is coordinated by the appropriate Alexandria City Departments and Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) needs to be conducted prior to rushing through a decision. I believe this analysis will bear out that the proposal is not beneficial for the community and other options are preferable. Below are some key points I think should be addressed and considered:

Environmental, Health and Cost Concerns

A simple internet search yields hundreds of results of communities at odds with the installation of turf fields. Some of these are arguments are pre-construction but many are post-construction and use. Communities across the country are recognizing the potential health impacts and are having buyer's remorse after the fact with turf fields. To my knowledge it doesn't appear the city has done any unique analysis on the environmental or health impacts of these replacements. If this is the case, the city should conduct such analysis before moving forward with turf replacements. If I am mistaken and the city has completed research this should be shared with the impacted residents.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency recently released a PFAS action plan which looks to regulate the very chemicals that are known to be part of artificial turf fields. This action plan includes various on-going studies on the safety of these chemicals, potential minimum exposure levels both in air and water for these chemicals as well as potentially listing these materials as a toxic substance. It seems irresponsible to move forward with these questions of health and safety remaining unanswered and would potentially open the city to liability down the line.

In addition to the lack of study on environmental and health impacts it appears that based on conversations with the Planning and Zoning Department and the RPCA, it appears that more cost-efficient alternatives have not yet been studied. The city should conduct a full cost benefit assessment on the replacements including the impact on property values of the surrounding homes, the impacts on parking, increased traffic, and noise.

Traffic on Glendale Avenue has already reached a point of concern particularly when school gets out. Adding multiple night activities on a street that was not designed to act as a major thoroughfare will create safety issues and further restrict already limited parking.

Coordination of efforts and dual tracking of turf and lighting decisions

I am sure it is not intentional but the dual tracking of both the "lighting proposal" and the "turf proposal" with two differing bodies on seemingly the same time track is confusing and a bureaucratic nightmare for residents to navigate. It is tough to track which body is responsible for what and this leads to concerned citizens throwing up their hands and giving up. This was demonstrated by the dualling (but ultimately rescheduled) meetings of the planning commission and ACPS in early October. We ask that these groups better coordinate the "lighting" and "turf" proposals because to date it seems the process is meant to confuse and dissuade public input.

Light Pollution for the residents of East Glendale Ave

In addition to fears about the turf itself, the potential for light to impact the residents of E Glendale Ave is a very real and large concern. Regarding the light spillage issue the city's own Special Use Permit (SUP) request (#2022-00043) appears to acknowledge the issues of light spillage and flippantly dismiss the issue. The request states the following (penultimate paragraph of page 5):

Light spill beyond the school property up to 65 feet from the northern end of the field is possible, with the light limited to the sidewalk on the north side of E Glendale Avenue (Graphic 1). However, there are existing street trees along the south side of E Glendale Avenue which will help to minimize the light spillage as the trees continue to mature.

Note – The SUP text mistakenly refers to Graphic 1 instead of Graphic 2, illustrating the "Aerial Night Rendering" of the GWMS proposed lighting impacts. That said graphic 2 shows a 65 ft measurement at the north end of the field along E Glendale Ave. The surrounding neighborhood is darkened in Graphic 2, obscuring that the 65 ft marker falls within the front yard of the homes along E. Glendale Ave. Many of the residents of E Glendale have measured the distance from the field and it is approximately 50ft. This means that the light spillage will cover the front half of the over 20 rowhomes and two large residential rental buildings that abut the fields. These row homes feature a master bedroom on the second floor overlooking the GW fields. These bedrooms looks over the trees the SUP claims will block the light.

The SUP claims the existing trees will minimize the light spillage, but this is not accurate as the tree coverage is limited. Additionally, these trees are small and have been planted under powerlines, requiring annual trimming. They will not block the light from the larger towers, even as they mature. The installed light fixtures will be 60 ft tall, meaning it will be more than a decade before the trees are remotely effective at minimizing light spillage on to E. Glendale Ave. Put simply the SUP's assumptions on light spillage are flawed or purposely downplaying the findings to justify the project.

The Other Fields at George Washington Middle School being considered

I would also ask that if the City and ACPS were to move forward with lights and turf at GW middle despite the concerns we listed, please consider upgrading the run-down fields at the corner of Braddock and Mt. Vernon Avenue as an alternative. This would expand the availability of quality fields available (two new fields could fit there easily) and impact less residents since that area is largely lined with businesses, has ample parking, and a streetlight regulating traffic into said parking (unlike Glendale Ave.).

Specifically, there are over 20 rowhomes and two large residential apartment buildings on E Glendale Ave that abut the proposed location whereas upgrading the run-down fields at the corner of Braddock and Mt. Vernon Avenue would only impact 7 row homes and businesses which would not be impacted. <u>I am aware other locations were considered but I urge you to reconsider the E Glendale proposal in light of these valid concerns.</u>

Conclusion

I would ask that the city push pause and more closely examine the actual need for lights and plastic turf at the E Glendale location and the environmental hazards and health risks to children of plastic turf. As member of our community, I want the children and youth to have ample safe places to play sports but feel the city is rushing important decisions that impact many constituents.

My neighbors and I look forward to the opportunity to work closely with the Planning and Zoning Department, RPCA, and ACPS to find a solution that is both cost and environmentally conscious. I express the above concerns in an effort to find the best possible solution for the homeowners and youth of our community.

The information you request is available in the 2021 Athletic Field Report. This report identified approximately 1,400 hours of permitted use in Appendix C at the two fields. These figures were from the last full year of use before the pandemic, 2019, and do not account for daytime school use for physical education or drop in community use.

The best practice for programming a natural turf field is 750 hours. A synthetic turf field can be programmed up to 3000 hours based on best practices.

Athletic field programming has recovered from the pandemic and is expanding. It was reported this week that Alexandria Soccer has more than 3000 registrants.

ISSUE:

City Council, Planning Commission and City staff have received many letters and email correspondence related to the athletic field lighting SUP requests which are part of the record for the field lights SUPs. Though most are focused on the proposed lighting, some have noted other issues of concern. These issues include trash and litter left after field events, abandoned vehicles, alleged drug activity, noisy groups of people, including groups using the field without permits to use them.

In discussions with representatives of Seminary Hill, the focus of these complaints have been on the athletic facilities associated with FC Hammond Middle School. Staff investigated these issues further to determine if any formal complaints had been reported to the City regarding this location. Staff found that approximately 21 complaints were made through the City's 311 number and another 12 calls were made directly to the Alexandria Police Department. All these 33 calls were received between January 1, 2021 to October 10, 2022 and concerned the FC Hammond School property, and the adjacent streets including Taney Ave., Pegram St. and Lasalle Ave. These issues are not directly related to the lighting as no lighting exists on the athletic facilities today. Staff acknowledges these are important issues to be addressed but they are related to operational issues and not a result of field lighting.

Specifically, only a handful of the 21 complaints through 311 were related to field use (they concerned trash). The City has implemented activities reducing trash collection on the field. A number of the APD calls concerned perceived use of the fields without a permit. Field use is allowed without permit during posted operating hours (sunrise to sunset), and there are procedures already in place to address instances when unauthorized field use occurs. Because use of field lights requires a permit, the unauthorized use of a field is not exacerbated by the addition of lights.

Subject: RESIDENT CONCERN WITH GW ATHLETIC FIELD LIGHTING PROPOSAL

Alexandria Leadership,

I have concerns regarding the cost, environmental impact and safety of the overall proposals to install lights and plastic turf around the GW athletic fields near E Glendale Ave. In addition, the lighting proposal has the potential to cause light spillage that could drastically impact the quality of life of over 20 homes and two residential apartment buildings that abut the field on E Glendale Ave. Further, I believe that a thorough examination of these factors that is coordinated by the appropriate Alexandria City Departments and Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) needs to be conducted prior to rushing through a decision. I believe this analysis will bear out that the proposal is not beneficial for the community and other options are preferable. Below are some key points I think should be addressed and considered:

Environmental, Health and Cost Concerns

A simple internet search yields hundreds of results of communities at odds with the installation of turf fields. Some of these are arguments are pre-construction but many are post-construction and use. Communities across the country are recognizing the potential health impacts and are having buyer's remorse after the fact with turf fields. To my knowledge it doesn't appear the city has done any unique analysis on the environmental or health impacts of these replacements. If this is the case, the city should conduct such analysis

before moving forward with turf replacements. If I am mistaken and the city has completed research this should be shared with the impacted residents.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency recently released a PFAS action plan which looks to regulate the very chemicals that are known to be part of artificial turf fields. This action plan includes various on-going studies on the safety of these chemicals, potential minimum exposure levels both in air and water for these chemicals as well as potentially listing these materials as a toxic substance. It seems irresponsible to move forward with these questions of health and safety remaining unanswered and would potentially open the city to liability down the line.

In addition to the lack of study on environmental and health impacts it appears that based on conversations with the Planning and Zoning Department and the RPCA, it appears that more cost-efficient alternatives have not yet been studied. The city should conduct a full cost benefit assessment on the replacements including the impact on property values of the surrounding homes, the impacts on parking, increased traffic, and noise. Traffic on Glendale Avenue has already reached a point of concern particularly when school gets out. Adding multiple night activities on a street that was not designed to act as a major thoroughfare will create safety issues and further restrict already limited parking.

Coordination of efforts and dual tracking of turf and lighting decisions

I am sure it is not intentional but the dual tracking of both the "lighting proposal" and the "turf proposal" with two differing bodies on seemingly the same time track is confusing and a bureaucratic nightmare for residents to navigate. It is tough to track which body is responsible for what and this leads to concerned citizens throwing up their hands and giving up. This was demonstrated by the dualling (but ultimately rescheduled) meetings of the planning commission and ACPS in early October. We ask that these groups better coordinate the "lighting" and "turf" proposals because to date it seems the process is meant to confuse and dissuade public input.

Light Pollution for the residents of East Glendale Ave

In addition to fears about the turf itself, the potential for light to impact the residents of E Glendale Ave is a very real and large concern. Regarding the light spillage issue the city's own Special Use Permit (SUP) request (#2022-00043) appears to acknowledge the issues of light spillage and flippantly dismiss the issue. The request states the following (penultimate paragraph of page 5):

Light spill beyond the school property up to 65 feet from the northern end of the field is possible, with the light limited to the sidewalk on the north side of E Glendale Avenue (Graphic 1). However, there are existing street trees along the south side of E Glendale Avenue which will help to minimize the light spillage as the trees continue to mature.

Note – The SUP text mistakenly refers to Graphic 1 instead of Graphic 2, illustrating the "Aerial Night Rendering" of the GWMS proposed lighting impacts. That said graphic 2 shows a 65 ft measurement at the north end of the field along E Glendale Ave. The surrounding neighborhood is darkened in Graphic 2, obscuring that the 65 ft marker falls within the front yard of the homes along E. Glendale Ave. Many of the residents of E Glendale have measured the distance from the field and it is approximately 50ft. This means that the light spillage will cover the front half of the over 20 rowhomes and two large residential rental buildings that abut the fields. These row homes feature a master bedroom on the second floor overlooking the GW fields. These bedrooms looks over the trees the SUP claims will block the light.

The SUP claims the existing trees will minimize the light spillage, but this is not accurate as the tree coverage is limited. Additionally, these trees are small and have been planted under powerlines, requiring annual trimming. They will not block the light from the larger towers, even as they mature. The installed light fixtures will be 60 ft tall, meaning it will be more than a decade before the trees are remotely effective at minimizing light spillage on to E. Glendale Ave. Put simply the SUP's assumptions on light spillage are flawed or purposely downplaying the findings to justify the project.

The Other Fields at George Washington Middle School being considered

I would also ask that if the City and ACPS were to move forward with lights and turf at GW middle despite the concerns we listed, please consider upgrading the run-down fields at the corner of Braddock and Mt. Vernon Avenue as an alternative. This would expand the availability of quality fields available (two new fields could fit there easily) and impact less residents since that area is largely lined with businesses, has ample parking, and a streetlight regulating traffic into said parking (unlike Glendale Ave.).

Specifically, there are over 20 rowhomes and two large residential apartment buildings on E Glendale Ave that abut the proposed location whereas upgrading the run-down fields at the corner of Braddock and Mt. Vernon Avenue would only impact 7 row homes and businesses which would not be impacted. <u>I am aware other locations were considered but I urge you to reconsider the E Glendale proposal in light of these valid concerns.</u>

Conclusion

I would ask that the city push pause and more closely examine the actual need for lights and plastic turf at the E Glendale location and the environmental hazards and health risks to children of plastic turf. As member of our community, I want the children and youth to have ample safe places to play sports but feel the city is rushing important decisions that impact many constituents.

My neighbors and I look forward to the opportunity to work closely with the Planning and Zoning Department, RPCA, and ACPS to find a solution that is both cost and environmentally conscious. I express the above concerns in an effort to find the best possible solution for the homeowners and youth of our community.

- 1. Page 175 of SUP2023-00044 indicated that 0 footcandles will be reached 50 feet east of the field endline. The school will provide additional screening for the neighborhood.
- 2. Because the light poles are higher than the two-storey wing of the Jefferson-Houston K-8 School facing Queen St., will there be lateral light spillage from the poles, esp. the ones at the eastern end of the field, into the two- and three-storey houses near the corner of N. West & Queen St.? The proposed lighting is equipped with shields that direct the light toward the playing surface to avoid lateral light spillage. Page 175 of

- SUP2023-00044 indicated that 0 footcandles will be reached 35 feet north of the field sideline and 50 feet east of the field endline. The school will provide additional screening for the neighborhood.
- 3. If, due to defective, broken, or malfunctioning equipment, there is light spillage into residences, how rapidly will the Dept. of Parks, Recreation & Cultural Activities rectify the situation? The City will work with residents to resolve issues related to defective, broken and/or malfunctioning equipment as soon as possible based on the specific issues. The lighting controls include a feature that sends an alert if the system has broken parts. This will assist in identifying and diagnosing issues and expediting repairs.
- 4. Can technical information about how these light fixtures function with respect to light dispersal be provided? <u>Technical information regarding the proposed light dispersal is provided on pages 175-182 of SUP 2022-00044</u>. Additional information can be provided with further clarification on the type of information requested.
- 5. Can shielding be installed behind and on the side of the lighting fixtures to block light spillage toward residences? The light fixtures as proposed include shielding to direct the light to the playing surface. An image of the light fixture is attached.
- 6. On frame 182 out of 184 of the .pdf version of the staff report, the illustration shows four light beams onto the playing field from the two mid-field lights, consistent with their each having four lamps, but the four goal-line lights have three light beams illuminating different parts of the field, even though they are only supposed to have two lamps each. Consistent with the staff report analysis, the graphic on page 182 depicts the pole and lamp configurations. The Equipment List for Areas Shown table on the right side identifies four poles, poles S1, S3, S4, and S6, each having three luminaires (light fixtures) per pole and two poles, poles S2 and S5, each having four luminaries (light fixtures)



ACPS School Board members,

There is still no content under GW Middle school project link. Can you please just send us the document? Is Thursday going to be a time for actual community input? Can we attend in person?

I would welcome discussion of the following at the meeting on Thursday.

According to the Athletic Fields Report 2021 - all fields in the city of Alexandria were used 56% of their available hours based on best use practices. Most notably the Lenny Memorial Fields at Braddock Park were utilized at only 26% of their available hours. According to the Athletic fields 2021 report there are 4 total fields at Braddock park offering a total additional 3000 hours of playing time if left grass.

Also notable, according to RCPA, in 2022 no applications for field playing time have been denied. This is with the fields at Minnie Howard already having been taken offline for construction. The need for additional playing time has not been demonstrated by the current body of research compiled by ACPS/the

City. According to RCPA, the fields at Braddock park have not been studied as a location for enhancement of any kind - to include turf or lights. To move forward with this proposal - without that information in hand - would not be sound management of our tax dollars.

To be clear, I am against the use of plastic turf because cities across the country are realizing that they carry environmental and health risks for our youngest athletes - these cities are banning turf.

<u>Where is the possible compromise?</u> It may be plastic turf with organic infill in large areas where there are multiple fields - for example Lenny Memorial Fields at Braddock Park or Simpson Fields. Shift the funding for

plastic turf from GW and other schools with a small amount of field space and use it for these larger areas. The fields at Lenny Memorial Field do not currently have irrigation infrastructure under them, making them a smarter choice for plastic turf. The city would also realize a savings because it would be lighting fewer fields. Residents would be happier because our school playing fields would remain pristine for our youngest athletes and for students during physical education. There would be less light pollution pouring into our windows. Fully leveraging Lenny Memorial would also get ACPS better use of the onsite parking lot.

The residents of E Glendale Avenue respectfully request that Special Use Permit (SUP) 2022-00043 regarding the installation of lights around the George Washington Middle School be denied and removed from the 01 November docket. We make this request because the SUP contains inaccuracies and misrepresents the adverse impact to the community. The data below is drawn from the SUP and has been confirmed though conversations and e-mails with the International Dark Sky-Association and Musco Lighting on 24 and 26 October 2022.

- Light spillage/glare: On page eight of the SUP, the graphic incorrectly depicts slight spillage/glare to be limited to 65 feet over the north edge of ACPS property. The SUP further incorrectly claims that zero foot candles of light would reach the properties on E Glendale Ave.
 - On page 24 of the SUP, the rendering produced by Musco depicts light spillage at 150 feet from the edges of the field (blue line). The north side of the track receives between 10-14 foot candles of light (red line around the athletic field). The north side of E Glendale Ave will in fact receive 3 foot candles of light, (straight vertical black line) falling directly in the front yards of residents. Note that the foot candles on this rendering are taken at 30 foot increments. The red zeros are actual zero values and the black zeros are a fraction of a foot candle.
 - This level of light spillage is in direct violation of City Ordinance 13-1-3 which limits light trespass to .25 foot candles from any commercial or residential property onto the adjacent residential property. According to the Illuminating Engineering Society, three foot candles of light is sufficient to light an outdoor parking lot or an auditorium.
- Light spillage/glare cont: Page 27 depicts total candelas of light at 150 feet from the edges of the field. Candela is used to measure glare or light shining in your face. The rendering on this page shows 845 candelas shining 150 feet over the north edge of the field. That means the houses on E. Glendale Ave should receive about 2700 candelas of light (This is the only figure that is my own calculation). One candela is equal to about the light from one candle. Imagine sleeping with 2700 lit candles outside your window.
- Trees on E. Glendale Ave: The SUP incorrectly states that the trees along the south side of E. Glendale Ave will block the light spilling off the field. This is inaccurate. Those trees are located under power lines and are trimmed every year to stay at their current height. Also, the trees are deciduous.

In addition to, the inaccuracies in the SUP, we would like to highlight that the data in the 2021 Athletic Fields Report (AFR) does not support the need for additional synthetic fields or lights.

- According to Appendix C of the AFR, the city has 12 regulation size synthetic playing fields (counting Patrick Henry ES) and 8 of them have lights. *Every single synthetic, lighted field was under utilized during the time period covered in the report.* AFR states that the city should be able to program a synthetic field with lights for 2100 playing hours a year. With the exception of the Witter Fields, no synthetic playing fields with lights reached even 1600 hours, with average programmed hours coming in at 1400 per field. *Therefore*, according RCPA's own research, there are an average of 700 hours of unused playing time sitting on each of one of those fields that's 5600 total unused hours on our existing synthetic fields with lights.
- Of the 12 over-programmed natural fields, identified in the AFR, eight are baseball diamonds. However of the five locations for which RCPA has submitted SUPs to install lights none are used for baseball.
- According to the AFR, all playing fields (synthetic and natural) in the city of Alexandria were used 56% of their total programmable hours.
- Also notable, according to RCPA, in 2022 no applications for field playing time have been denied. This is with the fields at Minnie Howard already having been taken offline for construction.

Given the inaccuracies contained in the SUP 2022-0043 and because the need for additional playing fields has not been demonstrated by the current body of research compiled by ACPS/the City; to move forward with this proposal would be poor management of our tax dollars. The AFR states on page 15 that "the city has enough fields to meet its needs," but must focus on better programming the fields. We would ask that the RCPA do what it wrote in its own report - fully program those 5600 hours of playing time that are being wasted every year on our existing lighted synthetic fields, before investing additional tax payer dollars into additional synthetic fields or lighting.

To be clear the residents of E Glendale Ave love hearing the kids playing on the fields across the street from our homes. We just want the fields to be managed in a manner that is economically and environmentally conscious and protects our home values. To that end, we welcome a dialogue on how to fully leverage the Lenny Memorial Fields at Braddock Park, which were utilized at only 26% of their available hours and contain three baseball diamonds and one football field. We have already reached out to the local business community to obtain estimates on the cost of transforming those fields into the beautiful community athletic area that they should be.

Dear Chair Alderton and Manager Parajon,

The Seminary Hill Association (SHA) is writing to express our concerns and questions over the proposed lighting of additional athletic fields in the city. Mr. Jack Browand of the Department of Recreation, Parks and Cultural Activities (RPCA) informed us at our June 9th board meeting that RCPA or ACPS will be filing for a SUP for Hammond Middle School as one of the first two fields to add field lights. We learned that RPCA filed the application on August 5, 2022, to be heard at the October 6, 2022 Planning Commission meeting. Hammond is within the boundaries of SHA, and we have some specific questions that we believe should be answered by Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) and RPCA promptly in connection with the application.

First, by way of background for those who were not on the School Board or employed by the city in 2011, ACPS proposed adding a turf field with lights at Hammond that year. At that time, no site plan was required by the city in order to do this work, so only a grading plan was submitted as part of the SUP application. SHA and nearby residents warned ACPS and RPCA about the serious infrastructure and flooding issues at Hammond, but these concerns were ignored. Residents surrounding Hammond were forced to file an appeal to the Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) and a lawsuit to compel compliance with zoning and City Code requirements. As you are aware, ACPS abandoned plans to light the Hammond field and an agreement was reached that no electrical work would be placed on the site to facilitate the installation of lights.

Once construction began to install the artificial turf field, the extent of the stormwater and infrastructure issues became known. ACPS spent millions installing the field and remediating the site, which included enormous new concrete piping under most, if not all, of the field. The work also required moving the bus lane and creating a bioretention pond on the site. The actual cost of this additional work was never publicly released, but SHA was informed that the overrun was a minimum of \$1.9 million, which was paid by ACPS.

Given this background, SHA requests that ACPS and the city provide answers to the following questions regarding the current plan to light the Hammond field.

1. ACPS holds Development Site Plan 2000-0044 for Hammond. DSP 2000-0044 contains a provision stating that any application for lighting must be through an SUP submitted by ACPS. City staff verified this in its report accompanying ACPS' application for lighting at Hammond in 2011, Staff

Report, page 4, citing that DSP 2000-0044 contains "a development condition requiring ACPS to go through a Special Use Permit review when considering the installation of athletic lighting" at Hammond.

In 2011, when SHA brought the case of lighting the Hammond field to the Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA), the BZA entered a legally binding decision stating that "ACPS is the owner of the property" and "[t]he use of field and lights by other City Departments and community organizations does not change the characterization of the facility for school purposes." The city and ACPS urged the BZA to make those formal legal findings. In the subsequent lawsuit, ACPS and the city continued to represent that ACPS is the only correct applicant.

We learned on Friday, August 5, 2022, that RPCA inappropriately submitted an application for a SUP. Their application states that the City of Alexandria is the owner of school property and ACPS merely operates a school on the site, which appears inconsistent with the laws of Virginia. It was silent on the DSUP and binding legal decisions regarding the site (which are consistent with Virginia law). Is this your understanding of control of the use of land where ACPS schools are located? If the city's and ACPS lawyers have changed their position, ACPS will be required to seek a modification to its DSUP, and the city and ACPS will need to approach the BZA (and perhaps the court) to correct those legal decisions based upon faulty information from the city and ACPS in 2011 and 2012.

It is also concerning that the city believes it can place uses on property being "operated by ACPS" without the approval and consent of ACPS. Given the DSUP, city staff reports, city and ACPS legal submissions and the accompanying BZA order and court actions stating that ACPS is the property owner and must file the SUP application, under what authority is RPCA applying as the owner of the Hammond property?

- 2. A review of the June 2nd School Board meeting showed only a very brief informational presentation, and the docket noted that the presentation was "for information, not action" only. Dr. Hutchings stated that a School Board vote would be required to authorize lighting at any school field after the City Council approves any SUP, although there appeared to be some confusion. Is Dr. Hutchings correct, or is the statement by RPCA that the School Board has no role beyond being briefed? If so, can you please provide SHA with documentation from ACPS and the city transferring title to the property for the site from ACPS to RPCA, which appears to be a requirement in Virginia? Can you please clarify the role of ACPS and identify the ACPS person responsible for community engagement on this issue?
- 3. Does ACPS concur in RPCA's estimate of \$400,000 for the work at Hammond, given the conditions that are unique to Hammond, including the extensive underground stormwater infrastructure under and around your field? In the event of cost overruns, is ACPS or RPCA responsible for paying for the overruns?

It is important to remember that as part of the agreement with residents to drop the lawsuit with ACPS and the city regarding issues associated with lighting Hammond, ACPS and the city committed in writing that electrical conduits for field lights would not be installed at Hammond during the installation of the new turf field. ACPS and the city verified that the grading plan specifically excluded any infrastructure work supporting lighting, including any electrical work. ACPS updated SHA during

construction to confirm no electrical infrastructure work was being performed, and SHA toured the site to verify that no electrical work to allow for the installation of field lights was done before installing the current turf field. Does your preliminary planning with RPCA include a recognition that electrical conduits and other required infrastructure do not currently exist at the site, but can now be added given the large concrete stormwater infrastructure that was placed under the turf field in 2011?

In addition, a site visit to Hammond shows very little space between the track and the fence line and public right of way on Pickett Street. SHA would like to receive any planning analysis that has been done at Hammond to show that the installation of lights is feasible and consistent with land use requirements, including minimum setback requirements in the zoning code.

4. A chronic and serious challenge to city fields, and especially at Hammond, is the use of the fields without a permit. Around Hammond, residents have documented problems that have existed without resolution since the installation of the turf field and continue to exist now without lights, which involve unauthorized use and quality of life issues for adult events, such as broken beer bottles, drug paraphernalia, overflowing trash receptacles, and excessive noise. While the turf field is fenced from the publicly available track, there are routinely groups of "fence jumpers" who use the field as a dog run and other unauthorized events. Boom boxes send music into the surrounding neighborhood until dark. These problems will only get worse if the field has lights and can be used until 10:00 p.m. at night, which is the time RPCA has indicated on the Hammond application that the field will be used seven nights a week.

The major reason for the problems at Hammond and other city fields is that there is no clear responsibility or accountability for oversight for use of the fields. In the application, RPCA asserted that "site monitoring" at night is an "ACPS security responsibility." In contrast, ACPS has viewed use outside of school hours on the field at Hammond to be the responsibility of RPCA. Both ACPS and RPCA have advised residents to call the Alexandria Police Department (APD) for violations. When residents call, APD asserts such violations are not criminal in nature, they lack staffing, and do not respond, instead telling residents to work with ACPS and RPCA. There is, therefore, no remedy in place for residents who endure irresponsible and unauthorized behavior on a constant basis at Hammond.

As part of the application for lights, is ACPS prepared to commit resources and staff to oversee permit compliance and SUP violations during evenings and weekends? Or does ACPS view it as the responsibility of RPCA, despite the fact that RPCA has stated its position that it the responsibility of ACPS to monitor such illegal activities? Since APD has said it cannot assist, what then is the remedy that ACPS and RPCA propose for unauthorized use of the Hammond field if the hours of use are extended by the installation of lights? It is not appropriate to add more lighted fields that will only worsen and continue this shell game of "passing the buck" that leaves no one with the responsibility for field security and use.

5. The true purpose of installing the lights at Hammond is unclear to SHA at this time. Certainly, ACPS has a need for a field and track there during the school day for its students, and it is due for replacement in the next two years. At the June 9th SHA meeting, RPCA stated that the proposal was for use by adults and youth. At the June 2nd meeting School Board meeting, RCPA stated the purpose of the proposal is "expanding capacity for youth programs." SHA cannot imagine that the youth of Alexandria

need a field that can be lighted until 10:00 p.m. SHA believes it is necessary to be honest about who will be using this field if the proposal is approved.

6. If the lighting is approved, who will be authorized to control the timing and use of the lights at night? Will it be ACPS personnel or RCPA personnel or private citizens? The August 5 application states that "safety measures" include "user activated field lighting," suggesting that anyone can access and turn on/off the lights at any time. What access security will be in place to assure only authorized persons can access lighting? Who will serve as the person responsible for assuring the lights are off at the permitted time, especially in the event the lights continue to burn past the required time if staff fails to activate the remote shut-off? In addition, the construction of lights and new turf will mean the use of the field for Hammond students will be lost for at least several months, if not longer, depending upon the engineering challenges of installing lights.

Given that SHA was only made aware of this proposal in June and RPCA has stated its intent to bring this matter before the Planning Commission at its October 6, 2022, meeting, we would appreciate a prompt response to our questions. Given the importance of this matter to residents of Seminary Hill, we anticipate further questions once we have had more time to review the plan and conditions. Thank you very much for your attention to this matter that affects the quality of life for numerous residents of Seminary Hill.

The following is the City response to your letter on behalf of the Seminary Hill Association, Inc., dated August 8, 2022, regarding the proposal to add athletic field lighting at Francis C. Hammond Middle School (Hammond).

With regard to your first two questions, neither the development site plan (DSP#2000-0044), nor the Board of Zoning Appeal's (BZA's) decision, nor the court order, nor any other written agreements prohibit the current special use permit (SUP) application.

Under the Zoning Ordinance both ACPS and the City are qualified to apply for a SUP for the Hammond property. Per Zoning Ordinance Section 11-503(A)(1), a SUP applicant needs to be "the owner, contract purchaser, lessee or other party having a legal interest in the subject property." The City is the property owner of record pursuant to deed and ACPS has a legal interest in the property pursuant to Virginia statutory law. With respect to land use matters, the City and ACPS work collaboratively related to school properties and have done so in this situation. In support of the City's application, the Alexandria City School Board adopted the attached resolution.

The current land use application for Hammond is for the approval of a SUP. Pursuant to Zoning Ordinance Section 6-403(F), a SUP for field lighting can be approved that exceeds the zoning height limits for congregate recreational facilities. This differs from the earlier proposal under SUP#2010-0079, where ACPS was seeking SUP approval for field lighting under Zoning Ordinance Section 7-2100 (Increased density and height for public elementary and secondary schools.). Additionally, the court appeal related to the BZA's decision was dismissed through an agreed order between the parties on the basis of the withdrawal of the SUP application by ACPS (see attached order). Further, there are no agreements that limit the City's ability to file the current SUP application.

Regarding your question 3, the lighting project is funded by the City. ACPS is not responsible for potential additional costs to implement the installation if approved. The City, in coordination

with ACPS, do not have information to support the potential barriers as presented in your letter. The current athletic field has a standard underdrain system and that will not impede the installation of athletic field lighting. The analysis related to the compliance with the Zoning Ordinance related to the SUP, and as per regular practice, will be part of the staff report written by Planning and Zoning staff.

As to your question 4, the City is responsible for the management (permitting & monitoring) and maintenance (e.g. trash collection) for the athletic field after school hours. All synthetic turf fields are open for community use after school hours, either through a permit issued by the Department of Recreation, Parks & Cultural Activities (RPCA) or for open drop-in use by the community during posted operating hours. If lighting is approved, athletic field lighting will only be available for use by permitted activities through RPCA.

During school hours, ACPS school administrators and security are responsible for enforcing athletic field usage at Hammond. Should unauthorized use occur during school hours, ACPS may coordinate with Alexandria Police for assistance as needed. Should use of the athletic field or any other amenity be used after posted operating hours, security is primarily monitored by ACPS security.

Regarding your question 5, all athletic fields and recreation amenities managed and operated by the City are available to any and all members of the community. Although this field and many others are on school property, permitted and drop-in use is not limited by age group.

With respect to your question 6, all athletic field lighting, including the lighting at this location, will be monitored and operated by RPCA. This is consistent with all fields, with the exception of the ACHS Parker-Gray Stadium, which is operated by ACPS through an agreement with the community. The management of athletic fields are addressed in the Shared Facility Use & Outdoor Maintenance Agreement between the City and ACPS.

The system that is proposed to be installed at Hammond, and at all locations that are new or upgraded, are programmable and only available when a permit is approved. Lights are programed to only be activated (turned on) during the approved permit time, and will automatically be deactivated at the end of the permit time or by 10 p.m.

The installation of lighting will not require the field being offline. All lighting installation activity will occur outside the athletic field and under the field through boring. When the field is scheduled for turf replacement, the lighting will not be impacted, and the field will be offline for approximately one month.

RPCA is planning to hold one additional community meeting in late September to address concerns raised from the meetings held in the spring and to answer further questions. If you have

The residents of E Glendale Avenue respectfully request that Special Use Permit (SUP) 2022-00043 regarding the installation of lights around the George Washington Middle School be denied and removed from the 01 November docket. We make this request because the SUP contains inaccuracies and misrepresents the adverse impact to the community. The data below is drawn from the SUP and has been confirmed though conversations and e-mails with the International Dark Sky-Association and Musco Lighting on 24 and 26 October 2022.

- Light spillage/glare: On page eight of the SUP, the graphic incorrectly depicts slight spillage/glare to be limited to 65 feet over the north edge of ACPS property. The SUP further incorrectly claims that zero foot candles of light would reach the properties on E Glendale Ave.
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- taken at 30 foot increments. The red zeros are actual zero values and the black zeros are a fraction of a foot candle.
- This level of light spillage is in direct violation of City Ordinance 13-1-3 which limits light trespass to .25 foot candles from any commercial or residential property onto the adjacent residential property. According to the Illuminating Engineering Society, three foot candles of light is sufficient to light an outdoor parking lot or an auditorium.
- Light spillage/glare cont: Page 27 depicts total candelas of light at 150 feet from the edges of the field. Candela is used to measure glare or light shining in your face. The rendering on this page shows 845 candelas shining 150 feet over the north edge of the field. That means the houses on E. Glendale Ave should receive about 2700 candelas of light (This is the only figure that is my own calculation). One candela is equal to about the light from one candle. Imagine sleeping with 2700 lit candles outside your window.
- Trees on E. Glendale Ave: The SUP incorrectly states that the trees along the south side of E. Glendale Ave will block the light spilling off the field. This is inaccurate. Those trees are located under power lines and are trimmed every year to stay at their current height. Also, the trees are deciduous.

In addition to, the inaccuracies in the SUP, we would like to highlight that the data in the 2021 Athletic Fields Report (AFR) does not support the need for additional synthetic fields or lights.

- According to Appendix C of the AFR, the city has 12 regulation size synthetic playing fields (counting Patrick Henry ES) and 8 of them have lights. *Every single synthetic, lighted field was under utilized during the time period covered in the report.* AFR states that the city should be able to program a synthetic field with lights for 2100 playing hours a year. With the exception of the Witter Fields, no synthetic playing fields with lights reached even 1600 hours, with average programmed hours coming in at 1400 per field. *Therefore, according RCPA's own research, there are an average of 700 hours of unused playing time sitting on each of one of those fields that's 5600 total unused hours on our existing synthetic fields with lights.*
- Of the 12 over-programmed natural fields, identified in the AFR, eight are baseball diamonds. However of the five locations for which RCPA has submitted SUPs to install lights none are used for baseball.
- According to the AFR, all playing fields (synthetic and natural) in the city of Alexandria were used 56% of their total programmable hours.
- Also notable, according to RCPA, in 2022 no applications for field playing time have been denied. This is with the fields at Minnie Howard already having been taken offline for construction.

Given the inaccuracies contained in the SUP 2022-0043 and because the need for additional playing fields has not been demonstrated by the current body of research compiled by ACPS/the City; to move forward with this proposal would be poor management of our tax dollars. The AFR states on page 15 that "the city has enough fields to meet its needs," but must focus on better programming the fields. We would ask that the RCPA do what it wrote in its own report - fully program those 5600 hours of playing time that are being wasted every year on our existing lighted synthetic fields, before investing additional tax payer dollars into additional synthetic fields or lighting.

To be clear the residents of E Glendale Ave love hearing the kids playing on the fields across the street from our homes. We just want the fields to be managed in a manner that is economically and environmentally conscious and protects our home values. To that end, we welcome a dialogue on how to fully leverage the Lenny Memorial Fields at Braddock Park, which were utilized at only 26% of their available hours and contain three baseball diamonds and one football field. We have already reached out to the local business community to obtain estimates on the cost of transforming those fields into the beautiful community athletic area that they should be.

Good morning,

Staff will be prepared to address the issues of concern that you raised at the hearing, but I thought I would address the issue of light trespass now so that you know why the items are still on the docket.

- Page 24 shows the foot candle measurement of the light on the ground from the light posts. This is exclusive of any impacts from existing lighting in the area, such as street lights (which normally measure from 3 to 4 foot candles). To clarify, the track does indicate receiving 10 to 14 foot candles, but the line just north of the track is the approximate property line for the field property on the sidewalk south of Glendale Avenue, not the north side of Glendale Avenue. Beyond this sidewalk, the light continues to drastically lessen to less than 1 foot candle (indicated by the zero) that will not significantly impact the lighting along the residential properties along Glendale Avenue more than what already exists there today. City staff can speak to the light level concerns and clarify the measurements at the public hearing. Since photometric plans are difficult to understand/visualize, the light manufacturer sent staff the attached example showing before and after photos with similar lighting fixtures, if this helps illustrate reduction in light spillage.
- Regarding the 2nd part questioning City Ordinance 13-1-3, that section refers to the side or rear yard of the adjacent property occupied for residential purposes. It is our understanding this section is intended to protect residential properties from their neighboring properties "thrown" lighting onto the side and rear yards, such as security flood lights. The lighting in this case is from lights that are not directed towards the residential properties, oriented perpendicular to the front yards of the residential properties facing the field. The lighting for the fields has been designed so there is no additional lighting of the properties from the field lights. Adjustments will be made through the final design and light readings will be taken after installation and there are adjustments that can be made.

I would like to follow-up on the below request to deny SUP 2022-0043 and remove it from tonight's docket. What is the status of your team's review of the data presented below?

We have provided solid evidence that GWMS is an inappropriate location for this proposal. Due to the close proximity of the fields to GWMS' property line, if installed GWMS would be in constant violation of the city ordinance on light trespass. There is no precedence for installing lights so close to taxpayers' homes. I looked at all the other lighted fields on GIS parcel view - and none have residential properties as close by as GWMS.

RCPA's own 2021 Athletic Field report clearly demonstrates that there is plenty of field space in the City of Alexandria - it just needs to be programmed more efficiently. The current surplus 5600 hours of lighted field time will more than satisfy ASA's projected need for additional field hours through 2030.

For all of these reasons this proposal is a misuse of taxpayer dollars and we ask that it be denied.

Re: Installation of Lights and Artificial Turf at George Washington Middle School

I. INTRODUCTION

The Alexandria Department of Recreation, Parks & Cultural Activities (RPCA) is moving forward with permit requests for new lights on five athletic fields throughout the city of Alexandria. The RPCA is requesting permits for lights on Francis C Hammond Middle School, George Washington (GW) Middle School, Jefferson Houston Elementary School, Patrick Henry Elementary School and Recreation Center Simpson Stadium Park Athletic Field.

The new field lighting is part of the City Council's "2022 Community Priority to Support Youth and Families", which outlines goals of extending capacity for youth programs and providing more equitable access to facilities and services. City officials have previously said that it's unlikely that all five fields will get lighting simultaneously and the two middle schools and Jefferson Houston are better positioned to get lighting sooner rather than later.

In addition, to the lighting of the field it appears that the Alexandria City Public School System (ACPS) is concurrently considering tearing up the current natural grass GW Middle School fields and the associated irrigation systems and replacing them with artificial turf. Public information of the turf replacement has been very limited. In fact, ACPS, has no information on the turf replacement in their website.

These two proposals (lighting and artificial turf) are seemingly being dual tracked by the City of Alexandria and ACPS, and it is unclear whether they are linked. This concurrent consideration of these projects has created confusion.

II. THE UNDERSIGNED INTEREST IN THE PROPOSAL

The as residents of Alexandria City we understand and support the City and ACPS's desire to extending capacity for youth sports programs and providing more equitable access to

facilities and services we have concerns regarding the cost, environmental impacts and safety of the overall proposals to install lights and plastic turf around the GW athletic fields near E Glendale Ave.

The lighting proposal has the potential to drastically impact the quality of life of over 20 homes and two residential apartment buildings that abut the field on E Glendale Ave. Further, we believe that a thorough examination of these factors that is coordinated by the appropriate Alexandria City Departments and ACPS needs to be conducted prior to rushing through a decision. We believe this analysis will bear out that the proposal is not beneficial for the community and other options, namely the Lenny Harris Memorial Fields (LHMF) at Braddock Park is preferable. Below are some key points we think should be addressed and considered.

III. ENVIRONMENTAL AND HEALTH CONCERNS WITH ARTIFICAL TURF

A. Artificial Turf is Linked to Negative Environmental Impacts for the Surrounding Communities

Many of the undersigned either utilized the fields themselves as athletes or have children who play on these fields, and we recognize the benefits and drawbacks of artificial turf. A simple internet search yields hundreds of results of communities at odds with the installation of turf fields. Some of these are cases are pre-construction, but many are post-construction and use. Communities across the country are recognizing the potential health impacts and are having buyer's remorse after the fact with turf fields.

To our knowledge it doesn't appear the city has done any unique analysis on the environmental or health impacts of the turf replacements. When this issue was raised with Alexandria City leadership, we were told by Mayor Justin Wilson that "there are natural fill alternatives that we are exploring. Having had two kids play travel soccer for several years, I was never a big fan of the rubber fill that is used on most artificial turfs. We will consider alternatives when the time comes." The city should conduct an analysis before moving forward with turf replacements. The city should also consider the completed and on-going work of U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as they are studying the safety of recycled tire crumbs on athletic fields.¹

The U.S EPA has also recently released a PFAS action plan which looks to regulate the chemicals that are known to be part of artificial turf fields synthetic grass blades.² This action plan includes various on-going studies on the safety of these chemicals, potential minimum exposure levels both in air and water for these chemicals as well as potentially listing these materials as a toxic substance. It seems irresponsible to move forward with these questions of health and safety remaining unanswered and would potentially open the city to liability.

In addition, to the concerns about the artificial turf itself, the undersigned also have concerns regarding potential storm water run-off associated the installation of artificial turf. Alexandria City is known for flooding issues, and it would be logical to believe that removal of

natural grass turf would diminish the ability for the land to absorb more water. We are concerned that artificial turf could lead to additional flooding. It is our understanding that Alexandria City hired Daniel Medina, Ph.D., P.E., last year as the Flood Action Alexandria Program Manager. We urge coordination with this individual and additional study on potential flood impacts associated with removal of the grass fields.

Concerns about the environmental and health impacts are not just an issue in the United States. In September of this year, the European Commission released its draft proposal to restrict the supply and sale of products containing intentionally added microplastics, delivering on a 2017 pledge.³ Such microplastics are part of most commercially available artificial turfs. The most commonly used type of rubber granulate in artificial turf is made from a synthetic polymer called Styrene Butadiene Rubber. As a result, the rubber fill used in artificial turf can contain small quantities of harmful chemicals and heavy metals that wash out into the environment over time. Studies show that zinc, in particular, leaches out from the granulate in sufficiently high concentrations to harm soil biota and aquatic life. Based on this, the residents of E Glendale Ave are concerned about the impacts to stormwater and drinking water. In addition, the installation of such fields seems to run counter to the Eco-City Clean Waterways initiative to manage the quality of our local streams.

Related to environmental concerns we are also worried about the increased ambient heat associated with artificial turf fields. Penn State University researchers have found that the surface temperatures of synthetic turf playing surfaces are significantly higher than natural turfgrass surfaces when exposed to sunlight. Specifically, they found that the surface temperatures of traditional synthetic turf were as much as 35-60 °C higher than natural turfgrass surface temperatures. These high temperatures also result in off-gassing of pungent heated chemicals that are part of the turf.

B. Artificial Turf is Correlated to Increased Injury Risk for Athletes

It has been clearly documented that the risk of injury is much higher on turf fields that grass. In fact, a study in the American Journal of Sports Medicine showed that, from 2012-18, players had a 28% higher rate of noncontact injuries on artificial turf vs. natural grass. The rate of noncontact knee injuries shot up to 32% higher on turf, while the rate of foot ankle/injuries surged to 69% — primarily "due to the synthetic turf's lack of ability to release an athlete's shoe."

In just the last two weeks, two star receivers in the National Football League, Cooper Kupp and DK Metcalf, and one of the longest tenured coaches in the league, Seattle's Pete Carrol joined the growing call to prohibit turf fields due to injury concerns. Anyone who has played on artificial turf knows the risk of injury goes beyond knees and ankles, turf burn is almost to be expected playing on artificial turf. We believe the city should have a mix of field

turf types and where possible, like the high-quality existing fields at GW, maintain the ability to play on natural grass.

IV. PROJECT COST AND CURRENT FIELD UTILIZATION

A. The City and Alexandria Public School System Have Not Adequately Justified the Cost of Turf Replacement

In addition to the lack of study on environmental and health impacts it appears that based on conversations with the Planning and Zoning Department and the RPCA, that more cost-efficient alternatives have not yet been studied. The city should conduct a full cost benefit assessment on the replacements including the impact on property values of the surrounding homes, the impacts on parking, increased traffic, and noise. Traffic on Glendale Avenue has already reached a point of concern particularly when school gets out. Adding multiple night activities on a street that was not designed to act as a major thoroughfare will create safety issues and further restrict already limited parking.

Further, replacing the GW field with artificial turf would require removal of the existing irrigation system underneath the turf. This seems like a poor use of taxpayer dollars. Adding turf and lights to a field that is not already irrigated would be a much more cost-effective way to add field capacity. To this end, as we discuss further below, improving lower quality fields such as LHMF would do more to achieve the City's goal of extending capacity for youth sports programs and not require tearing up an existing high-quality field and its irrigation system that is working perfectly fine.

B. Based on Alexandria City's own Analysis Existing City Fields are currently Under Utilized.

In addition to, the inaccuracies in the Special Use Permit (SUP) request (#2022-00043), we would like to highlight that the data in the 2021 Athletic Fields Report (AFR) does not support the need for additional synthetic fields or lights. According to Appendix C of the AFR, the city has 12 regulation size synthetic playing fields (counting Patrick Henry ES) and 8 of them have lights. Every single synthetic, lighted field was underutilized during the time period covered in the report. AFR states that the city should be able to program a synthetic field with lights for 2,100 playing hours a year. Except for the Witter Fields, no synthetic playing fields with lights reached even 1,600 hours, with average programmed hours coming in at 1,400 per field. Therefore, according RCPA's own research, there are an average of 700 hours of unused playing time sitting on each of one of those fields - that's 5600 total unused hours on our existing synthetic fields with lights.

Of the 12 over-programmed natural fields, identified in the AFR, eight are baseball diamonds. However, of the five locations for which RCPA has submitted SUPs to install lights none are used for baseball. According to the AFR, all playing fields (synthetic and natural) in the city of Alexandria were used 56% of their total programmable hours. Also notable, according to RCPA, in 2022 no applications for field playing time have been

denied. This is with the fields at Minnie Howard already having been taken offline for construction.

Given the inaccuracies contained in the SUP and because the need for additional playing fields has not been demonstrated by the current body of research compiled by ACPS/the City; to move forward with this proposal would be poor management of our tax dollars. The AFR states on page 15 that "the city has enough fields to meet its needs," but must focus on better programming the fields. We would ask that the RCPA do what it wrote in its own report - fully program those 5600 hours of playing time that are being wasted every year on our existing lighted synthetic fields, before investing additional taxpayer dollars into additional synthetic fields or lighting.

In addition, as we discuss further below, improving lower quality fields such as LHMF would do more to achieve the City's goal of extending capacity for youth sports programs then tearing up an existing high-quality field and replacing it with artificial turf.

V. POOR COORDINATION AND CONSIDERATION OF PUBLIC INPUT

We are sure it is not intentional but the dual tracking of both the "lighting proposal" and the "turf proposal" with two differing bodies on seemingly the same time track is confusing and a bureaucratic nightmare for residents to navigate. It is tough to track which body is responsible for what and this leads to concerned citizens throwing up their hands and giving up. This was demonstrated by the dualling (but ultimately rescheduled) meetings of the planning commission and ACPS in early October. We ask that these groups better coordinate the "lighting" and "turf" proposals because to date it seems the process is meant to confuse and dissuade public input.

As detailed throughout this document, we have concerns about inaccuracies and omissions in the SUP request and lack of analysis on relevant environment and cost issues. Whether it is the assumptions made on the impacts of lighting or the lack of concern for the impacts on the surrounding neighborhood is seems like the only analysis being completed is focused on a predetermined desired outcome. We simply ask the city to take a honest look at the project and alternatives.

VI. NEGATIVE IMPACTS TO THE RESIDENTS OF SURRONDING COMMUNITY

A. The Installation of Lights and Artificial Turf will create considerable light and Noise Pollution

The potential for light to impact the residents of E Glendale Ave is a very real and large concern for the neighboring residents. Regarding the light spillage issue the city's own SUP request appears to acknowledge the issues of light spillage and flippantly dismiss the issue. The request states the following (penultimate paragraph of page 5):

Light spill beyond the school property up to 65 feet from the northern end of the field is possible, with the light limited to the sidewalk on the north side of E Glendale Avenue

(Graphic 1). However, there are existing street trees along the south side of E Glendale Avenue which will help to minimize the light spillage as the trees continue to mature.

We would note that the SUP text mistakenly refers to Graphic 1 instead of Graphic 2, illustrating the "Aerial Night Rendering" of the GWMS proposed lighting impacts. That said graphic 2 shows a 65 ft measurement at the north end of the field along E Glendale Ave. The surrounding neighborhood is darkened in Graphic 2, obscuring that the 65 ft marker falls within the front yard of the homes along E. Glendale Ave. Many of the residents of E Glendale have measured the distance from the field and it is approximately 50ft. This means that the light spillage will cover the front half of the over 20 rowhomes and two large residential rental buildings that abut the fields. These row homes feature a primary bedroom on the second floor overlooking the GW fields. These bedrooms look over the trees the SUP claims will block the light.

The SUP claims the existing trees will minimize the light spillage, but this is not accurate as the tree coverage is limited. We would also note the trees are not consistently placed leaving clear gaps and these trees lose their leaves and provide no protection from light in the winter. Additionally, these trees are small and have been planted under powerlines, requiring annual trimming. They will not block the light from the larger towers, even as they mature. The installed light fixtures will be 60 ft tall, meaning it will be more than a decade before the trees are remotely effective at minimizing light spillage on to E. Glendale Ave.

The SUP incorrectly claims that zero-foot candles of light would reach the properties on E Glendale Ave. On page 24 of the SUP, the rendering produced by Musco depicts light spillage at 150 feet from the edges of the field (blue line). The north side of the track receives between 10-14 foot candles of light (red line around the athletic field). The north side of E Glendale Ave will in fact receive 3-foot candles of light, (straight vertical black line) falling directly in the front yards of residents. Note that the foot candles on this rendering are taken at 30-foot increments. The red zeros are actual zero values and the black zeros are a fraction of a foot candle. This level of light spillage is in direct violation of City Ordinance 13-1-3 which limits light trespass to .25 foot candles from any commercial or residential property onto the adjacent residential property. According to the Illuminating Engineering Society, 3-foot candles of light is sufficient to light an outdoor parking lot or an auditorium.

Page 27 depicts total candelas of light at 150 feet from the edges of the field. Candela is used to measure glare or light shining in your face. The rendering on this page shows 845 candelas shining 150 feet over the north edge of the field. That means the houses on E. Glendale Ave should receive about 845 candelas of light (This is the only figure that is my own calculation). One candela is equal to about the light from one candle. Imagine sleeping with 845 lit candles outside your window. Put simply the SUP's assumptions on light spillage are flawed or purposely downplaying the findings to justify the project. Mayor Wilson seemed to indicate that this analysis will be updated, and we hope that it reflects the reality of the potential light pollution.

We ask that the city push pause and more closely examine the actual need for lights and plastic turf at the E Glendale location and the environmental hazards and health risks to children

of plastic turf. As member of our community, I want the children and youth to have ample safe places to play sports but feel the city is rushing important decisions that impact many constituents.

B. The Installation of Lights and Artificial Turf will Negatively Impacts Home Values

There are over 20 rowhomes and two large residential apartment buildings on E. Glendale Ave that abut the proposed location. We believe installation of the turf field and lighting would potentially adversely impact property values. We ask the city to consider the impact of property values when choosing a location for turfed and lighted fields. Specifically, the city should seek to minimize the number of private residents impacted. To this end upgrading the run-down LHMF fields at the corner of Braddock and Mt. Vernon Avenue would only impact 7 row homes and businesses which would not be negatively impacted. In fact, the businesses would like welcome increased traffic. We are aware other locations were considered but we urge you to reconsider the E. Glendale proposal in light of these valid concerns.

C. The Increased Hours of Field Utilization will Exacerbate Already Serious Traffic and Parking Issues

As you are aware, with the development of Potomac yard area, E. Glendale Ave was chosen to be the connecting road with Main Line Boulevard. This has resulted in E. Glendale Ave being used as a popular cut through to reach Mount Vernon Avenue. The traffic volume on E. Glendale Ave has increased exponentially and road is further strained during times of sports activities and when school lets out. With only one exit from GW middle school to a one-way street and no traffic signal at the connecting point with Mount Vernon Ave, residents of E Glendale often experience a significant backup of cars. In addition, E Glendale is often used as surplus parking during field use. All these issues will only be worsened with increased utilization of the fields.

We also note that the LHMF's has the existing parking and traffic infrastructure – in the form of a traffic signal emptying on a two-way street – that GW middle lacks. We ask the city to consider this when determining the fate of the lights and turf at GW middle. Even without a traffic analysis it makes far more sense of a traffic management perspective to develop the LHMF than to continue to tax the traffic and parking situation on E. Glendale Ave.

VII. THE CITY SHOULD CONSIDER THE LENNY HARRIS MEMORIAL FIELDS (LHMF) AT BRADDOCK PARK AS A REASONABLE ALTERNATIVE

A. Revitalizing the LHMF Feilds Would Increase the Number and Quality of the City Fields

We welcome a dialogue on how best to increase the availability of playing fields in Alexandria City. That said we believe redeveloping an already high-quality field at GW while continuing to underutilize LHMF runs counter to that goal. The LHMF complex provide a unique opportunity to double the capacity of useful fields on the GW complex. It is clear that the

quality of the GW fields is far superior to the quality of the LHMF. That said it would be logical to upgrade the LHMF fields to realize the most benefit, taking a bad field and making it good as opposed to taking an already good field and making it artificial turf. As previously mentioned, selecting LHMF site over GW middle would be more cost effective as you would not be tearing up a functioning irrigation system.

B. The LHMF Location Would Impact Far Fewer Residents and Already Has the Existing Infrastructure in Place to Handle Increased Use

We would also ask that if the City and ACPS were to move forward with lights and turf proposal on the GW complex, you consider upgrading the run-down fields at the corner of Braddock and Mt. Vernon Avenue as an alternative. This would expand the availability of quality fields available (two new fields could fit there easily) and impact far fewer residents since that area is largely lined with businesses. Specifically, there are over 20 rowhomes and two large residential apartment buildings on E Glendale Ave that abut the proposed GW fields location whereas upgrading the LHMF at the corner of Braddock and Mt. Vernon Avenue would only impact 7 row homes and businesses which would not be impacted and more than likely welcome the added traffic.

Further the LHMF location has existing infrastructure to handle increased use that GW currently does not. Specifically, the required infrastructure like stormwater drainage, ample parking, traffic signals regulating traffic into said parking and a two-way street. We encourage a discussion on how to fully leverage the Lenny Memorial Fields at Braddock Park, which were utilized at only 26% of their available hours and contain three baseball diamonds and one football field. We have already reached out to the local business community to obtain estimates on the cost of transforming those fields into the beautiful community athletic area that they should be.

VIII. CONCLUSION

To be clear the residents of E Glendale Ave love hearing the kids playing on the fields across the street from our homes. We just want the fields to be managed in a manner that is economically and environmentally conscious and protects our home values. To that end, we encourage more study on the impacts of artificial turf and lighting at the GW fields. We also urge the City and ACPS to consider alternate locations namely the Lenny Memorial Fields at Braddock Park. We welcome a dialogue on how to fully leverage the LHMFs, which were underutilized and contain ample space for activities (three baseball diamonds and one football field). We have already reached out to the local business community to obtain estimates on the cost of transforming those fields into the beautiful community athletic area that they should be. In addition to our concerns in this document we have include some potential questions for consideration in the appendix below.

- 1. What is the reason to tear up a perfectly good field fully grassed and underutilized for plastic grass at GW (including has embedded sprinkler system?)
- 2. What makes GW and Simpson Field better candidates for improving field conditions than the Lenny Harris Memorial park fields bordered by Braddock and Mt. Vernon they are in deplorable condition in comparison?
- 3. Plastic Grass fields are hot 50 degrees hotter based on temperature readings taken throughout the summer at Jefferson Houston school. What temperatures are safe to play on what heat level is unacceptable for children and adults?
- 4. When the infill gets hot it stinks Jefferson Houston field smelled like a tire garage during the heat what can be done about the smell?
- 5. Plastic fields emit fumes what studies have been done to assess the safety of the fumes?
- 6. Plastic Grass and Infill are known to contain forever PFAS chemicals what studies have been done to assess the safety to the users and the environment? Microplastics from shredded grass blades enter the environment and get airborne from shavings from abrasion.

Dear Planning Commission members,

I am writing regarding item 6 on the 11/1/22 Planning Commission Agenda (Special Use Permit #2022-00043). I am expressing my disapproval of the SUP, which is a position shared by all 500 block E. Glendale Avenue neighbors. My rationale for disapproval relates to the SUP Staff Report attachment, as it misconstrues the impact of light spillage on the neighbors along the north side of E. Glendale Ave.

The SUP request states the following (penultimate paragraph of page 5):

Light spill beyond the school property up to 65 feet from the northern end of the field is possible, with the light limited to the sidewalk on the north side of E Glendale Avenue (Graphic 1). However, there are existing street trees along the south side of E Glendale Avenue which will help to minimize the light spillage as the trees continue to mature.

Note – The SUP text mistakenly refers to Graphic 1 instead of Graphic 2, illustrating the "Aerial Night Rendering" of the GWMS proposed lighting impacts. Graphic 2 shows a 65 ft measurement at the north end of the field along E Glendale Ave. The surrounding neighborhood is darkened in Graphic 2, obscuring that the 65 ft marker falls within the front yard of the homes along E. Glendale Ave.

I have attached an image from the city's GIS Parcel Viewer using the viewer's measuring tool; the red-highlighted parcel is 506 E Glendale Ave. Measuring 65 ft from the GWMS field fence line, the GIS viewer shows that light will spill over the entire front half of all the homes on the north end of E. Glendale Ave. I have confirmed that the center of my front yard is just 50 ft from the edge of the GWMS field using a tape measure.

The SUP request's suggestion that existing trees minimize light spillage as the trees mature is also inaccurate. The trees are currently shorter than the roofline of our homes. The trees were planted directly below power lines, so the trees must be trimmed each year to not encroach upon the lines. Even if the trees were allowed to grow unencumbered, these trees would grow at a rate of approximately 1-3 ft per year. The installed light fixtures will be 60 ft tall, meaning it will be more than a decade before the trees are remotely effective at minimizing light spillage onto E. Glendale Ave.

In summary, the SUP request's presentation of the GWMS field lighting impacts is inaccurate. I am concerned that the effects of light pollution on the neighboring homes have not been adequately considered. This is particularly important given the possibility that the lights will be on until 10 pm any evening and that the light will spill into the master bedrooms of each of our homes.

Mr. Macek,

With all due respect, your service to our community on 01 November was lacking. Your commission is supposed to serve as a check and balance to Planning/Zoning and RCPA. Yet you took our well researched questions and lobbed them back to RCPA in a severely dumbed down manner. You did not require them to provide any real data or commitments. These are the tough questions you could have asked based on our public testimony.

A constituent noted that there is in fact a surplus of playing hours on our existing regulation size, synthetic, lighted fields. Why are you submitting permits to light more fields?

If some of the existing inventory of lighted fields are "undesirable" - are you just going to scrap those fields? Wouldn't it be more economical to fix those minor issues rather than spending \$800,000 to light new fields?

Your Athletic Field Report identified 12 over programmed natural fields - 8 of them are baseball diamonds. However of all the locations you identified for new lights - none are baseball diamonds. Why is that?

A constituent noted that the Planning Commission has only ever approved lighted fields on properties zoned CDD, POS or I. There are existing fields zoned CDD, POS, or I without lights. Why not choose one of those instead of properties in more densely populated areas.

According to public comments submitted prior to this meeting, Lenny Memorial Fields has 2 baseball diamonds and 1 football field. Its also zoned POS. These fields are boarded by two major roads, both with traffic lights. Seems like a perfect fit, but according to RCPA Lenny Memorial has not even been studied as an option for lights. Why is that?

A constituent noted that, based on her conversation with the Musco Lighting engineer that drafted the renderings in SUP 00043, there will be 3 foot candles of light that fall on the north

edge of E Glendale Ave. Yet the SUP claims zero light will hit the properties on E Glendale Ave. How is there this much confusion on light spillage this far into this project? What will you do to prevent these lights from violating City Ordinance 13-1-3?

A constituent noted that based on conversations with the Musco Lighting sales rep, painting the inside of the light covers black and installing shades on the sides of the light covers comes free of charge. In the interest of good community relations - why in the world did you not include that in the SUP?

Why do you plan on increasing capacity by installing lights on new fields without first installing restrooms on any field? Isn't that putting the cart before the horse? Based on public testimony today, Hammond and Jefferson Houston already have people peeing in the street.

Everyone has an off day at work. I know I've had numerous off days. Its not too late to ask these tough questions and serve as that check and balance that the community needs.
