



What are the facts?

National

- Council on Criminal Justice (CCJ) mid-year study shows nearly all offenses are lower, or have changed little, in the first six months of 2023 compared with the same period in 2022.
- Violent crimes remain elevated compared to 2019, the year prior to the COVID pandemic though crime patterns continue to shift.
- Though the level of serious violent crime is far below historical peaks, it remains high, especially in poorer communities of color.




% change in offense January-June 2019 to January-June 2023, by year Source: https://counciloncj.org/mid-year-2023-crime-trends/

Northern Virginia Crime Rate per 100,000



Washington, DC

- The District's 193 homicides to date is a 30% increase over the same period last year. That eclipses the number killed in all of 2018 and follows back-to-back years of more than 200 homicides. (MPD)
- 107% increase change in Motor




Shots Fired January to August 2023




Focused Deterrence:

Reducing crime in places of elevated risk

- Preventative Patrols & Community
 Assistance Safety Team (CAST)
- Police Saturation and Residential Police Officers
- Recruitment & Retention: 6 FTEs short of authorized strength with 22 in field training and 20 in academy








License Plate Reader Camera Pilot

- 6 operational devices in past six months, 12 more to be deployed
- Average ~2.6m plate reads, per month
- Average ~220 plate "hits" per month



Multi-Jurisdictional Grand Jury

Currently, Arlington is part of the Grand Jury. We have plans to add other Northern Virginia CA's offices in the future.

A Grand Jury is the only legal process by which a witness can be forced to tell authorities what they observed.

In a Grand Jury, a witness is under oath, may therefore be prosecuted for perjury, and their testimony is reduced to a written transcript.

Recidivism

Alexandria Sheriff's Office Mission: "Our Purpose is to help and protect people"

Inside the Detention Center our services and programs aim to reduce recidivism, enhance public safety, and offer our inmates every opportunity to successfully 'reenter' society as positive contributors by:

- Addressing physical and mental health
- Helping achieve sobriety
- Increasing education
- Transitional preparation






Outside of the Detention Center,


we provide direct support to APD to enhance community safety while accomplishing our state mandated responsibilities.



Bradlee Shopping Center Initiatives

ACPS is working both independently and with APD to complete walkthroughs at Bradlee Shopping Center

- Occurring on different days and at different times throughout the school day
- Goal is to engage with students and redirect them back to school
- Visits help reinforce closed campus policy for all ACPS campuses







Attendance and Truancy Initiatives

- ACPS Attendance Task Force to monitor attendance
- Teachers take attendance every class period
- Attendance notifications out to families through email and texts morning, after lunch, and at 6pm
- Outreach to families around impact of absences on academics
- Positive attendance video, social media posts and school-wide campaigns



Safety Processes and Initiatives

ACPS has a number of safety processes and protocols in place to promote safety within our facilities:

- Secured entrances
- Visitor Management System/Check-In Protocol
- Security Cameras
- Weapons Abatement Systems (Pilot Program, Secondary Locations)
- Employee ID Requirement
- Student ID Requirement (HS Campuses)
- SRO's and SSO's at all Secondary Locations

Citywide Crime Reduction Strategy

- 1. Use focused deterrence & technology to aggressively reduce crime & gun violence in hot spots
- 2. Prioritizing Commonwealth Attorney resources to gun offenses, fentanyl, sex offenses and school incidents
- 3. Continue focus on low recidivism
- 4. Build safe, supportive environments for our youth
- 5. Actively pursue federal, state funding and legislative fixes
- 6. Remain accountable with focus on performance indicators

- Pursuing federal and state earmarks for technology
- New state funding available via Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention Fund and Operation Ceasefire Grant Fund
- Funding available through Dept. of Education for school safety and security
