Key Policy Consideration

- Vision Zero as a new program recommended for development in the plan
- Development of Vision Zero program would likely include:
 - Physical safety improvements
 - Programmatic support
 - Enforcement resources




Primary Project Objectives

- Update Pedestrian and Bicycle Chapters of Transportation Master Plan
 - Improve safety for pedestrians and bicyclists
 - Provides priorities and focus
 - Similar to Transit Chapter of Transportation Master Plan
 - After plan adoption, second phase of detailed design and analysis, and public outreach to occur with projects
- Develop Complete Streets Design Guidelines
 - Design guidance for staff, developers, and community

What We've Heard




- Focus on maintenance (trash collection, snow removal)
- Focus on providing more separation from motor vehicles for bicyclists, less shared roadways
- Education/outreach must target all groups (people who drive, bike and walk)
- Need improved outreach to older adults
- Need additional staff to implement programs, projects and track progress
- Vision Zero strategy should be specific and a high priority
- Evaluate City Code to address eBikes, eBlades and other non-traditional travel modes
- Make clear that project priority rankings aren't necessarily the order of implementation
- Implementation of projects on the West End is important

Close sidewalk gaps and improve the sidewalks.

Improve ADA accessibility on sidewalks and at pedestrians and intersections.

Reduce conflicts between, bikes, other users on sidewalks.


Increase education and outreach programs related to walking and safety.

Improve the maintenance of the sidewalk network.






What is your highest priority for biking?

Draft Plan Recommendations



- Prioritized trail crossings
- Prioritized on-street bicycle projects
- New bicycle network map with enhanced bicycle corridors, shared roadways, and trails

- Mount Vernon Trail
- Old Town
- Van Dorn/ Eisenhower Metro

Case Study Areas



Added Commonwealth and Braddock Road

Key themes:

- Accessibility issues on curb ramps and sidewalks
- Need for new and improved crosswalks
- New sidewalk recommendation on Commonwealth Ave. and in other locations
 - A. Remove Obstruction
 - B. Install New Curb Ramp
 - C. Replace/Upgrade Existing Curb Ramp
 - D. Install New Crosswalk
 - E. Repair/Upgrade Existing Crosswalk
 - G. Modify/Repair Existing Pedestrian Signal

- I. Install Pedestrian Scale Lighting
- J. Improve Bus Stop Access
- M. Adjust Parking to Improve
 Sightlines
- O. Install Bicycle Spot Improvement
- P. Reconfigure
 Roadway/Intersection
- Install New Sidewalk
- Repair/Upgrade Sidewalk






Vision Zero

- New approach to the way we think about safety on our streets
- Origin: 1997 policy in Sweden
- Goal = zero deaths/serious injuries by a given date
- 3 main differences from previous approaches:
 - 1. All traffic fatalities are preventable
 - 2. Interagency collaboration
 - 3. Data-based approach




Prioritized Sidewalk Projects






Priority Trail Crossing Improvements
