Dear Mayor Silberberg and City Council Members:

I am a long-time Alexandria City resident, property owner, and ACPS parent. I write regarding the budget proposed by City Manager Mark Jinks.

Mr. Jinks recently proposed a budget that he has promoted as "future-oriented" and "investing in needed services, public buildings and infrastructure." I applaud Mr. Jinks' commitment to the future of the city, and agree that investments must be made now to secure its future.

I am, however, seriously concerned about the lack of full funding for Alexandria City Public Schools in the proposed budget. The budget provides a significant shortfall from the funds both the ACPS school system and the school board have identified as necessary. Those necessary expenses relate both to infrastructure maintenance and improvement, as well as teacher retention. The ACPS school system is critical to the future of Alexandria City, just as its municipal services are. Our family chose to invest in property in the city because of the many opportunities it offers. One of the most important for us was our local elementary school. Because we are at the beginning of our school journey, we are continually monitoring our school options. If ACPS cannot provide quality educational opportunities for our children, we will make the decision to move to a neighboring county.

Mr. Jinks explained in a recent letter to the editor that there was "not enough money at the tax rate [he] recommended to fund all the needs on . . . the school side." That is the beginning of the process, not the end. I urge the City Council to examine carefully not only the monetary amounts Mr. Jinks has proposed, but the proposed tax rate as well. I, for one, would support an increased tax assessment, if it is necessary to provide funding for our schools. No vote on a budget should be held until a variety of options—and the consequences of each—are fully explored and explained to the residents of Alexandria.



Madam Mayor, Members of City Council and City Manager

Good Afternoon and thank you for allowing me to speak today.

I would like to start by saying that we have the UTMOST respect for the Police and Fire Departments. With that being said, those departments are receiving a raise AND a bonus and we will be receiving nothing. Let me also say that I do believe that those 2 departments deserve those raises, but, with all due respect, the Police and Fire Departments would have a very difficult time doing their jobs if not for T&ES Public Works Services. We are the backbone of the City that keeps it possible for everyone to get around quickly and safely.

T&ES is responsible for maintaining the streets, sidewalks, sanitary sewers, fire hydrants and storm drains, including BMPs. For clarification, BMPs are all the storm water filtration systems. There are approximately 500 BMPs in the city and we maintain roughly 100, with more being added nearly every month.

We have a single BMP crew consisting of one person to inspect the BMP and a crew of 3 to maintain them to remain compliant with the MS4 Permit.

Our sewer, fire hydrant and street crews are also understaffed.

We understand the dangers of being police officers or fireman, however, our crews risk dangers as well, on a daily basis. After setting up traffic control, our crews are in danger of being hit by passing vehicles, as the drivers do not always slow down when passing our work zones. I, myself, have had passing cars not notice me and have had to jump out of the way to miss being struck.

There are also manholes we need to enter. The air quality needs to be tested at 3 different levels before it is safe to enter. The same procedure is done when we excavate a sewer or fire hydrant. While a crew member is in a sewer or ditch, someone must always be on top to ensure their safety.

Lets not forget, that during the winter months our department is always on call, ready to make the streets passable and safe for the Police, Fire, Rescue and the citizens.

If the City continues in the direction of taking from our department but giving us nothing in return, then soon we will be unable to afford to work here. Even looking at our insurance premiums rising every year and with such high deductibles, I personally, only go to the Doctor once a year to maintain my DOT card.

With the rising cost of living, we would like for you to please give our department the same consideration you are giving to the Police and Fire Departments. We understand that there are times when the budget needs to be cut, however, it seems to affect our department more often than not. I love my job and working for the City of Alexandria. I am asking again, please reconsider how the budget is allocated.



I am Mollie Danforth, current chairperson of the Alexandria Commission on Persons with Disabilities.

We were very pleased to see the City Manager's proposed budget for FY 2018; there are no proposed reductions for a number of programs supporting persons with disabilities: namely, programs in the Division of Aging and Adult Services, paratransit services, tax relief and workforce development. In addition, by reallocating program savings, there is a proposed wage increase for in-home aides.

We fully support the Vision Zero initiative and funding therefor.

We also support full funding for affordable housing development in the City. There is an unmet need for affordable housing with accessibility features and a particular need for affordable, supportive independent housing for individuals with cognitive disabilities.

There are some items ACPD would like to request be added to the budget:

First is the supplemental request from the Office for Human Rights for a full time paralegal position. We support this request for several reasons:

- This position supports the work of our commission. This person facilitates communication between members and between the Commission and the Human Rights Office and other City departments.
- 2. Population growth, growth in the aging population, and deinstitutionalization have increased the number of individuals seeking accommodations and needing accessible public spaces.
- 3. Aging city infrastructure is creating a significant number of situations that create accessibility issues. For example, the handicapped stalls at City Hall are not large enough for motorized wheelchairs, the Beatley Library entrance is too steep to comply with the ADA, many parks and recreation programs have not been updated to comply with the ADA, aging brick sidewalks create impassible areas for wheelchairs and others with mobility issues. These issues need to be addressed proactively to avoid legal action.

To follow up on issues such as these and complaints about accessibility at privately owned buildings that serve the public requires more than one full time investigator. The workload of the Human Rights Office requires additional staff. We urge you to **add this paralegal position**.

Second, we request additional funds so the more diagonal curb cuts can be replaced with perpendicular curb cuts. This request is related to Vision Zero goals of safety. Diagonal crosswalks are dangerous. A person must enter the moving lane of traffic and then turn back into the safe crosswalk. Large strollers, persons with vision impairments, and those in wheelchairs are at risk. The former head of TE&S, Rich Baier, committed to favoring perpendicular curb cuts, but since his departure no perpendicular curb cuts have been implemented. Cost seems to be a factor in implementing this safety measure. Please provide sufficient funding to the street repair budget to correct these dangerous curb cuts.

Please support the funded programs and grant our request for two additions to the budget. Thank you for the opportunity to offer ACPD'S suggestions on the FY 2018 budget.

I am Mary Eileen Dixon and I am here on behalf of ALIVE!, Alexandria's largest private safety net organization. I am here specifically on behalf of ALIVE!'s Child Development Center. As I told you a year ago, the CDC may be one of ALIVE!'s lesser known programs but it is one of which we are extremely proud.

Since 1972, we have been providing full day, year round early care and education to children of low-income working families in Alexandria. We are unique in offering a sliding scale tuition structure to families who are not eligible for various government programs but who cannot afford market rate programs.

We provide a small but highly rated program in a warm and nurturing environment to 3 and 4 year olds to help prepare them for kindergarten while their working parents are assured that their children are being well cared for.

But, as I told you last year, we are a program which has experienced substantial financial difficulties over the last few years, caused primarily by a reduction in the number of children referred to us with a state child care fee subsidy. Between 2014 and 2016 that number fell from 25 to 8. The amount that ALIVE! itself has to underwrite for each student has doubled, from \$4600 in 2014 to almost \$9400 last year. While ALIVE! is committed to subsidizing all our students— even those who receive government support—to some extent, this trend could not continue. The increase in the ALIVE! subsidy to CDC students was impacting the money available to support our other valuable programs.

But I am happy to report that this year has been a better year for us, thanks in no small part, to the additional dollars that you put into the local fee subsidy and Scholars for Fours programs last year.



With the income from 5 additional Scholars for Fours who we enrolled this year, as well as some substantial paring of expenses on our part, we have been able to keep ALIVE!'s subsidy to a manageable level. We think (we hope) we are on our way to making the program sustainable so that we can continue to provide high quality education and care to children of low-income working families. Many of our students arrive already exhibiting the problems that too often accompany low incomes and parental job insecurity. For many of our children, the hours at the Center appear to be the most stable in their existence. To watch them leave, much more self-confident and ready to enter kindergarten on a level with other students, is a real joy.

I know that you have very difficult choices this year with competing demands that need to be met and that come with very high price tags. But if you could find your way to doing something similar to what you did last year, it would be extremely helpful to the CDC and to other programs serving at risk preschoolers. Compared to some of the other amounts you are considering, it is a small price to pay and yet will have a huge impact in the lives of some very vulnerable children.

STATEMENT BY RICHARD MERRITT, CO-CHAIR, ALLIANCE FOR ALEXANDRIA'S UNINSURED BEFORE THE ALEXANDRIA CITY COUNCIL BUDGET PUBLIC HEARING MARCH 13, 2017

MY NAME IS RICHARD MERRITT AND I AM THE CO-CHAIR OF THE ALLIANCE FOR ALEXANDRIA'S UNINSURED. THE ALLIANCE'S MISSION IS TWO-FOLD:

(1) TO EDUCATE THE PUBLIC AND COMMUNITY ABOUT THE PLIGHT OF THE VERY LOW-INCOME UNINSURED ADULTS WITHIN THE CITY WHO FOR THE PAST THREE YEARS HAVE BEEN DENIED COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH INSURANCE THROUGH MEDICAID BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY; AND,

(2) TO FOSTER PUBLIC/PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS TO EXPAND ACCESS TO PRIMARY HEALTH CARE SERVICES FOR THOSE LOW-INCOME ADULTS WHO ARE WITHOUT A MEDICAL HOME OR A ROUTINE SOURCE OF CARE.

THE MORAL UNDERPINNING OF THE ALLIANCE AND ITS NON-PROFIT, ALEXANDRIA CARES FOR THE UNINSURED, WAS SUCCINCTLY STATED MANY YEARS AGO BY H. JACK GEIGER, MD, A PIONEER IN THE COMMUNITY HEALTH MOVEMENT IN THE US. HE WROTE:

"THE POOR ARE LIKELIER TO BE SICK. THE SICK ARE LIKELIER TO BE POOR. WITHOUT INTERVENTION, THE POOR WILL GROW SICKER AND THE SICK WILL GROW POORER. AND THAT HAS TROUBLING CONSEQUENCES FOR ALL OF US. "

I AM HERE TO SAY THANK YOU FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP AND COMPASSION OVER THE PAST FEW YEARS WITH RESPECT TO STRENGTHENING THE CITY'S HEALTH SAFETY NET FOR THE POOR AND UNINSURED AND SPECIFICALLY TO URGE YOUR SUPPORT FOR THE CITY MANAGER'S PROPOSED BUDGET OF \$667,997 FOR NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH, THE FEDERALLY QUALIFIED HEALTH CENTER THAT HAS BEEN PROVIDING PRIMARY CARE SERVICES TO ALEXANDRIA'S POOR AND UNINSURED SINCE 2004.

FOLLOWING THE CONCLUSION OF THE 2014 SESSION OF THE VIRGINIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY – THE SESSION WHICH PROVIDED OUR STATE LAWMAKERS WITH THE FIRST OPPORTUNITY TO EXPAND THE MEDICAID PROGRAM AS PERMITTED UNDER THE AFFORDABLE CARE ACT (OTHERWISE KNOWN AS OBAMACARE) BUT CHOSE NOT TO DO SO – CITY COUNCIL UNANIMOUSLY ENDORSED THEN MAYOR EUILLE'S REQUEST TO ESTABLISH A SPECIAL ADVISORY PANEL ON THE HEALTH CARE NEEDS OF THE UNINSURED IN ALEXANDRIA, WITH SPECIAL ATTENTION TO BE GIVEN TO THE APPROXIMATELY 5,500 LOW-INCOME, NON-DISABLED, NON-ELDERLY (18-64 YRS.) ADULTS – MANY OF WHOM ARE AMONG THE "WORKING POOR" – THAT WERE BEING DEPRIVED OF COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH INSURANCE THROUGH MEDICAID BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

THE PANEL MET ON MORE THAN TEN OCCASIONS OVER A SIX MONTH PERIOD AND BASED ON FINDINGS FROM LONG-STANDING RESARCH THAT INDICATED A CLOSE ASSOCIATION BETWEEN LACK OF HEALTH INSURANCE AND INCREASED RISK FOR POOR HEALTH OUTCOMES, INCLUDING PREMATURE DEATH, A MAJORITY RECOMMENDED TWO ACTIONS THAT THE CITY AND COMMUNITY COULD PARTNER ON TO IMPROVE ACCESS TO HEALTH CARE FOR AT LEAST THE MOST VULNERABLE AND NEEDY MEMBERS OF THE LOW-INCOME UNINSURED POPULATION:

- (1) HOST A FREE COMMUNITY HEALTH FAIR FOR THE CITY'S LOW-INCOME UNINSURED IN 2015; AND,
- (2) SUPPORT NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH IN ACHIEVING ITS GOAL OF PROVIDING A MEDICAL HOME FOR THE PROVISION OF PRIMARY CARE, DENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES FOR AT LEAST 90 PERCENT OF THE CITY'S LOW-INCOME, UNINSURED POPULATION BY 2018.

THE CONTITUTION OF THE ADVISORY PANEL BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL, ALONG WITH ITS RECOMMENDATIONS, WERE THE CATALYST BEHIND THE CREATION OF THE ALLIANCE FOR ALEXANDRIA'S UNINSURED – AS IT ASSUMED RESPONSIBILITY FOR FACILITATING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE TWO KEY RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PANEL.

IT IS WELL DOCUMENTED THAT A SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF UNINSURED ADULTS GO WITHOUT NEEDED CARE DUE TO COST CONCERNS OR THEY FORGO CARE UNTIL SYMPTOMS ARE SO ADVANCED THEY ARE DIFFICULT AND VERY COSTLY TO TREAT.

FINANCIAL COVERAGE FOR PRIMARY CARE VISITS TO NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH FOR A SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF LOW-INCOME UNINSURED ADULTS – AS PROVIDED FOR IN THE FY 2017 BUDGET DUE TO COUNCILMAN LOVAIN'S BUDGET AMENDMENT AND INCLUDED IN THE CITY MANAGER'S PROPOSED FY 2018 BUDGET – SHOULD GO A LONG WAY TOWARD REDUCING FINANCIAL BARRIERS TO SEEKING HEALTH CARE FOR MANY UNINSURED RESIDENTS OF THE CITY. MOREOVER, BY MAKING IT EASIER TO ACCESS TIMELY AND AFFORDABLE PRIMARY CARE SERVICES, AND THEREFORE HAVING THEIR ILLNESSES OR DISEASES DIAGNOSED AND TREATED AT AN EARLY STAGE, SHOULD ALSO LEAD TO REDUCTIONS IN COST AND IMPROVEMENTS IN HEALTH OUTCOMES.

DR. BASIM KHAN, THE CEO OF NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH, PUT IT NICELY BY SAYING:

"OUR GOAL IS TO FIND THE PERSON WITH CHRONIC ILLNESS, LIKE DIABETES, WHICH AFFECTS 20 PERCENT OF THE ADULT PATIENTS AT NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH, BEFORE THE PATIENT NEEDS DIALYSIS OR AMPUTATION." BY THE WAY, I HOPE COUNCIL REALIZES THAT THE DOLLARS IT HAS CONTRIBUTED TO NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH (FORMERLY ALEXANDRIA NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH SERVICES INC.) GOES TO A COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER THAT WAS ONLY ONE OF 57 AMONG 1,200 HEALTH CENTERS NATIONALLY TO BE RECOGNIZED AS A NATIONAL QUALITY LEADER. IT RECEIVED THE AWARD FOR EXCEEDING NATIONAL BENCHMARKS FOR CRHONIC DISEASE MANAGEMENT AND PREVENTIVE CARE.

IT IS IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND THAT COUNCIL'S SUPPORT LAST YEAR TO EXPAND NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH'S CAPACITY TO PROVIDE PRIMARY CARE SERVICES TO APPROXIMATELY 700 LOW-INCOME UNINSURED RESIDENTS ALSO PROVIDED THE IMPETUS FOR THE HOSTING OF A SECOND FREE COMMUNITY HEALTH FAIR FOR ALEXANDRIA'S UNINSURED IN NOVEMBER OF 2016.

WHILE THE PREVENTIVE SCREENS AND SERVICES OFFERED AT THE FAIR ARE PROVIDED WITHOUT COST BY THE MANY HEALTH CARE PROVIDER PARTNERS, AND SCORES OF COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS COVER THE STAFFING NEEDS AT THE FAIR, CRITICAL FOLLOW-UP CARE IS NEEDED FOR THOSE UNINSURED RESIDENTS WHO ARE DIAGNOSED WITH ABNORMAL SCREENS OR HIGH RISK FACTORS FOR CHRONIC DISEASE. WITHOUT THE ABILITY TO REFER MANY PATIENTS TO NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH FOR SUCH CRITICAL FOLLOW UP CARE, IT IS DOUBTFUL THAT THE SECOND HEALTH FAIR WOULD HAVE TAKEN PLACE.

BUT SINCE THE SECOND FREE COMMUNITY HEALTH FAIR DID TAKE PLACE LAST NOVEMBER 5 – AND WE WERE HONORED TO HAVE MAYOR SILBERBERG AND COUNCILMAN LOVAIN ATTEND, ALONG WITH CONGRESSMAN DON BEYER, AND SENATOR ADAM EBBEN AND DELEGATE MARK LEVINE – I HOPE YOU WILL TAKE A FEW SECONDS TO REVIEW THE SUMMARY HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FAIR THAT IS ATTACHED TO MY STATEMENT.

I WILL SAY THAT DISCUSSIONS ARE ALREADY UNDERWAY REGARDING THE POSSIBILITY OF A THIRD FREE COMMUNITY HEALTH FAIR FOR ALEXANDRIA'S UNINSURED LATER THIS YEAR. WE HOPE TO BE ABLE TO ANNOUNCE A DATE AND SITE FOR THE FAIR RELATIVELY SOON.

TO CLOSE, I WANT TO THANK COUNCIL AGAIN FOR ITS EARLY ATTENTION AND POSITIVE CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE NEEDS OF THE CITY'S LOW-INCOME UNINSURED RESIDENTS WHO FOR MORE THAN THREE YEARS RUNNING HAVE BEEN EXCLUDED FROM VALUABLE MEDICAID COVERAGE BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

WE REGARD COUNCIL'S ACTIONS SO FAR ON BEHALF OF THE UNINISURED AS A CONCRETE MANIFESTATION OF ITS RECENT DECLARATION THAT "ALEXANDRIA IS A CITY OF KINDNESS AND COMPASSION" AND THAT COUNCIL IS "COMMITTED TO DIVERSITY AND..... INCLUSIVENESS THAT RESPECTS THE DIGNITY AND WORTH OF EVERY PERSON...."

IN OUR HUMBLE OPINION, THERE ARE FEW OTHER THINGS A CITY OR COMMUNITY COULD DO TO RESPECT THE DIGNITY AND WORTH OF ITS MOST VULNERABLE RESIDENTS THAN TO ASSURE THEM ACCESS TO A QUALITY HEALTH CARE PROVIDER WHEN THEY NEED ONE. CITY COUNCIL AND THE CITY MANAGER, THROUGH HIS PROPOSED LEVEL OF SUPPORT FOR NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH IN FY 2018, HAVE DEMONSTRATED REAL LEADERSHIP ON BEHALF OF THAT GOAL

I DON'T HAVE TO TELL YOU, HOWEVER, GIVEN THE PROPOSALS CURRENTLY UNDER DISCUSSION WITHIN CONGRESS AND THE ADMINISTRATION TO REPEAL AND REPLACE OBAMACARE, THAT PROSPECTS FOR FUTURE FUNDING FROM WASHINGTON OR RICHMOND FOR THIS POPULATION ARE DIM AT BEST.

IN FACT, BASED ON THE ANALYSIS OF THE IMPACT OF THE CURRENT HOUSE REPUBLICAN BILL ON THE 8TH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT OF VIRGINIA, "REPEAL OF THE LAW COULD ENDANGER THE HEALTH AND WELFARE OF THOUSANDS OF INDIVIDUALS AND THEIR FAMILIES IN REP. HIGHLIGHTS

Second Free Community Health Fair for Alexandria's Uninsured

- Approximately 350 to 375 adults and children, mostly uninsured residents of Alexandria, attended the Health Fair on Saturday, November 5, 2016 at the GW Middle School.
- The Fair was hosted by more than 60 community-based, faith-based and health care partners.
- More than 15 preventive health screens and services were offered at the Fair, including opportunities to register for assistance under Obamacare or to qualify for a new primary care benefit financed by the City and provided through Neighborhood Health.
- 63% of the attendees were female, 37% male.
- 50% indicated they were employed either full or part-time.
- English was the primary language spoken at home by 34%, followed closely by Spanish at 32%; Amharic or Arabic speaking individuals comprised 24% of the attendees.
- 11% evaluated their overall health as "Excellent"; 44% said it was "Good"; 43% evaluated it as only "Fair" or "Poor".
- Only 17% reported having a personal health care provider.
- Almost 60% reported they had not had a routine health check up and 70% said they had not seen a Dentist in the past 12 months.
- Asked to evaluate their overall experience at the Health Fair, 71% rated it as "Excellent"; 26% rated it "Good" and only 3% rated it as "Average" or "Poor"
- Among the 15 or more screens and services offered at the Fair, attendees pointed to Dental screens, glucose and cholesterol tests, vision and hearing tests, kidney health screens and insurance information as among the most beneficial. (It should be noted that many didn't single out a particular screen or service, but simply wrote in "all" or "todos" or "checkups" as a response.)
- Scores of attendees with abnormal or elevated test results were referred to other providers for free or low-cost follow up care and treatment. (Many of the referrals were made to Neighborhood Health.)

Impact of ACA Repeal on the 8th Congressional District of Virginia

Committee on Energy and Commerce, Democratic Staff

Roughly 20 million Americans have gained access to health care through the coverage provisions of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), including subsidized coverage through the insurance marketplaces and the ACA's historic Medicaid expansion. President Trump and congressional Republicans' plan to repeal the ACA will have devastating effects for all Americans. Eliminating premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions will likely make coverage unaffordable for the 10.4 million Americans enrolled nationwide through the ACA marketplaces as of October 2016. Similarly, eliminating the Medicaid expansion will likely result in coverage becoming unattainable or unaffordable to the more than 11 million Americans who were newly eligible and enrolled in Medicaid since 2014. Additionally, Republican proposals to tax employer-based health coverage could destabilize employer-based coverage and raise taxes on individuals who have health insurance through their employer.

This fact sheet summarizes what is at stake as Republicans in Congress consider eliminating many of the ACA's provisions through a process known as budget reconciliation. Repeal of the law could endanger the health and welfare of thousands of individuals and their families in Rep. Beyer's (D) district.

Here is what is at risk:

- The district's uninsured rate has gone from 13.7% to 10.6% since the ACA was implemented. This 3.1% drop in the uninsured rate could be reversed if the ACA is entirely or partially repealed.
 - 40,600 individuals in the district who have purchased high quality Marketplace coverage through now stand to lose their coverage if the Republican Congress dismantles the Marketplaces.
 - 31,800 individuals in the district who received financial assistance to purchase Marketplace coverage in 2016 are now at risk of coverage becoming unaffordable if the Republican Congress eliminates the premium tax credits.
 - 22,100 individuals in the district who are receiving cost-sharing reductions to lower out-of-pocket costs such as deductibles, co-pays, and coinsurance, are now at risk of health care becoming unaffordable if the Republican Congress eliminates cost-sharing reductions.
 - 10,000 individuals in the district who could become eligible for Medicaid if the state expanded Medicaid will now lose the opportunity to gain coverage if the Republican Congress eliminates the Medicaid expansion.



Mary Beth Testa, Policy Consultant, Voices for Virginia's Children Testimony to the Alexandria City Council on the FY18 city budget March 13, 2017

My name is Mary Beth Testa and I am with Voices for Virginia's Children. Voices is a statewide, nonprofit, privately-funded child advocacy organization promoting smart policies and investments for children and families. Voices urges federal and state leaders to prioritize action, and we also support localities taking bold steps to invest in children. That's my role here in Northern Virginia, working with colleagues in Alexandria.

There are 8,752 children in economically disadvantaged families in the City of Alexandria. That's one-third of the children in the city. It means their families are struggling to meet basic needs like food, housing, utilities, child care and transportation. In addition to the moment-to-moment challenges, this also correlates to experiencing toxic stress and trauma in early childhood. These children are more likely to face health and mental health challenges; less likely to have the opportunity to attend high quality early education; and face going without meals when not in school. The investments in early childhood can have a significant return when we think about prevention, and the costs in the future of inaction now.

The FY18 budget proposals from the schools and from the city manager include important investments for Virginia Preschool Initiative, for the Early Childhood division at DCHS, and for the Alexandria Fund for Human Services. There is also an increase coming for SNAP benefits – because this need is not only persistent but growing in the City of Alexandria.

Unfortunately, the FY17 increased investment in child care subsidy is gone from the FY18 proposal. These FY17 dollars also support the Scholarship for Fours so that low-income working families can participate in VPI and get help affording a full day of child care for their four year olds.

This local investment is making a real-life difference for Alexandrians. That was set up as a one-time investment, but it is not just a one-time need. There are infants, toddlers, *and* preschoolers on the waiting lists for child care assistance in the city. In the state's child care assistance program, from FY15 to FY16, we've had a loss of 4,500 children statewide due to insufficient funds. That number is only going to go up as we watch federal and state investments remain stagnant (or get threatened and cut).

Eyes are on localities like Alexandria now. City Council has a crucial opportunity to protect its families by investing again in child care subsidy and the Scholarship for Fours.

Child care subsidy is an urgent issue, but certainly not the only issue. Thank you for reviewing the letter we submitted in February, with data pointing to the needs of local families. We understand this is a challenging budget year. This is also a deeply challenging year for families. You are standing in the gap for families and we thank you for this leadership.

Statement of Beth Coast Co-Chair Capacity Committee of the Instructional Leadership Team T.C. Williams High School

Madame Mayor, members of the City Council, and Mr. City Manager: thank you for the opportunity to appear today on behalf of the Capacity Committee (the "Committee") of the T.C. Williams Instructional Leadership Team on the City Manager's Proposed FY 2018-2027 Capital Improvement Program Budget ("CIP").

My name is Beth Coast. I am in the Chair of the Visual Arts department at T.C. Williams and I have been an ACPS teacher for six years. My two children are in the seventh grade at George Washington Middle School. I am a past President of the Jefferson-Houston School PTA.

The Capacity Committee's purpose is to examine ways that TC teachers can make constructive contributions to solve our secondary school capacity crisis. The Committee supports the vision for a new secondary school building at the Minnie Howard site in the capital budgets proposed by Superintendent Crawley and City Manager Jinks.

As of March 9, the enrollments at our secondary schools are as follows: TC Williams (King Street Campus): 2,977, TC Williams (Minnie Howard Campus): 793, George Washington Middle School: 1,343 and Francis C. Hammond Middle School: 1438. As you know, there are additional students in grades 6-8 at Jefferson-Houston School.

As teachers, we see every day that the crowded conditions at TC-King Street and Minnie Howard make going to school more difficult for our students and teachers. We know that you have heard from school advocates about crowded conditions and overdue repairs at the elementatry schools. We empathize with them and we support their efforts.

Circumstances are different in the secondary schools and require urgent action. At grades 9-12 redistricing is not an option. Additions to existing buildings are also not feasible (at the King Street campus) nor cost-effective (at the Minnie Howard campus.) The only solution where, to use a memorable phrase from last Thursday's budget work session, "the juice is worth the squeeze" is to construct another secondary school building. A new secondary school building at the Minnie Howard site affords the opportunity to design program space that complements TC's King Street campus.

Our purpose in appearing before you today is not to whine or complain about working conditions. Alexandria's teachers will strive to do their best under any circustances.


We do, however, want to give you an idea of the challenges associated with the crowding at all of our secondary schools.


These challenges include:


- safety concerns including jammed passing times, fire drills and crowded lunches that result in students spending too much time in cafeteria lines;
- an increasingly chaotic cafeteria that drives students to eat lunch in all parts of the building;
- an increasingly slow Wi-Fi system;
- crowded classrooms and difficulty accessing elective courses;
- an inadequate complement of security personnel for a school of TC's size;
- large scale (SOL, PSAT/SAT, WIDA) testing that requires a shutdown of other academic activities;
- science classes being held in rooms without science equipment; and,
- teachers working in multiple classrooms, on carts and in similar makeshift arrangements.


At last week's City Council-School Board budget work session Vice Mayor Wilson and others raised the possibility of project-specific agreements or understandings, presumably in writing, between the Council and the Board that would apply to major long-term projects. The purpose of such a multi-year understanding would be to create a joint way forward that is more complete and reliable than the dollar amounts in the outyear columns in the CIP which, as everyone well knows, are subject to revision every budget season. The Committee applauds this thinking and respectfully suggests that a new secondary school building at the Minnie Howard site would be the ideal subject for such an agreement.

Resurrection affordable housing project Need \$4.3 million more in City funding

My name is Jo Belser. I am the priest at the Episcopal Church of the Resurrection in our City's West End. Resurrection is, by our reckoning, the only church of any kind in the Beauregard Corridor.

I am here to ask you to move \$4.3 million from the supplemental to the funded budget so that our church's gift of 113 units of affordable housing for families can be realized in the 2018 low-income housing tax credit cycle. This funding will leverage the total project value of roughly \$43 million, and add about \$200,000 to the City tax rolls. We feel "called" (a church word meaning "this wasn't our idea) to give our community some of the affordable housing it so desperately needs, perhaps because so few of our members can afford to live in our City.

This is our church's 53rd year. We have always given ourselves away to help those in need. Our "DNA" was formed in the Civil Rights Era March on Washington and by investing heavily throughout our history in our community. Just one example among many is that we were instrumental beginning Carpenter's Shelter, for which we organized people and money. Our Board chair even did double duty for a while, serving as the shelter's first Executive Director.

We who are in our 70s, surrounded as we are by three Continuing Care

Retirement Communities, feel badly that we have left our younger members with
significant deferred maintenance. So what our church will gain from this project is

just enough resources from a 65-year ground lease of the property for the housing to build a smaller church. This will ensure our physical continuity in a location that seems to desperately need us and our people-to-people ministries.

In 2016, for example, with the collaboration of many organizations in our city, Resurrection fed at least 7,817 people in 2,220 households, and provided \$98,119.42 to provide rent or utilities assistance to 535 households in the West End, an average of \$183.40 per check. I say "at least" because we have a "Little Free Food Pantry" that provides food round-the-clock, no questions asked.

I urge your support for our redevelopment project to continue our many collaborative helping ministries" in the west End; and to return 123 units of affordable housing to our community.

Budget Testimony for March 13, 2017

Good afternoon Mayor Silberberg and Members of City Council. My name is Bob Eiffert and I am here today representing the Alexandria Commission on Aging.

We were very pleased to see the City Manager's proposed budget for FY 2018. City Budget Director Morgan Routt made a presentation to the Commission's Advocacy Committee and reviewed programs that relate to older adults. There appeared to be no proposed reductions. Programs in the Division of Aging and Adult Services, transportation, tax relief and workforce development are all proposed to be fully funded. In addition, by reallocating program savings, there is a proposed wage increase for in-home aides to help in recruitment and retention of those who serve our most frail elders. The Commission also supports the proposed addition of a new top step in each pay grade for City employees who have reached the top of the scale. City employees who have not received a pay raise for five years would be eligible for a raise this year. We value their contributions to our programs.

We have learned of one program cut that is a concern: the elimination of daytime hours at the Cora Kelly Recreation Center. Senior participants have expressed concern that five volunteer-led daytime activities, including dance, yoga, exercise, Zumba and a weekly movie, would be eliminated at this neighborhood-based site serving the Lynhaven and Auburn Village communities. We hope you can find a way to allow those activities to continue at Cora Kelly, including the possibility of training the volunteers to open and secure the building themselves, as Fairfax County has successfully done at their senior centers to allow volunteer-led activities to continue outside normal business hours.

We thank the City Manager and his staff for this proposed budget, and we urge you to support it as well. The health, safety and well-being of older Alexandrians is of paramount importance, and we ask your continued support for us. In the Complete Streets program, we urge you to continue the momentum of the current year with support for appropriate measures in FY 2018 to move recommended projects forward. We fully support the Vision Zero initiative. We also support full funding for affordable housing development in the City, a priority we know you share. At least one project that is expected to come forward for an FY 2018 funding commitment – the Church of the Resurrection's affordable housing proposal – is not funded in the proposed budget, and we urge your consideration of that request, which will likely come to you in the fall. And we hope you can find an appropriate way to accommodate the senior programs at Cora Kelly.

We know this is another very difficult budget year, so we are very grateful that the vast majority of programs that support positive aging are fully funded. We applaud your many years of support, and urge you to continue. Thank you for your service and for the opportunity to address you today.

Presentation to the Alexandria City Council March 13, 2017

Mayor Silberberg, Vice-Mayor Wilson, Members of the City Council,

My name is Chuck Ziegler, Vice-President for Advocacy of the Friends of the Beatley Central Library. In the last City budget you admirably increased your support for Alexandria's public libraries, continuing a trend of increasing support over the last few years. For this we sincerely thank you. However, we notice with disappointment that this upward trend is not to continue in the proposed budget for FY2018; indeed, there is a small decrease. Although this decrease is to be regretted, we understand that the City is operating in a tight budgetary environment, with many other worthy demands on City resources. We hope that this slight downward trend is reversed in FY2019.

To govern is to choose, and you have many difficult choices to make this year. Nevertheless, I would urge you to continue your strong support of our public libraries as you continue to consider the budget for FY2018. There are many good reasons for you to do so. For instance, Alexandria's public libraries are a major component of the City's educational system, thus supporting "Healthy & Thriving Residents" focus area of the City's budget. They provide many means for self-improvement and education, available to *every citizen* of Alexandria. They deliver public education for all through Self-Directed Education, Research Assistance and Instruction, and Instructive and Enlightening Experiences. I would note especially that our libraries supplement the work of Alexandria's public schools, by offering hundreds of programs for children throughout the year that support early literacy and school readiness.

I would also draw to your attention the strong support of the citizens of Alexandria for our public libraries. For instance, in 2016, the Friends of the Beatley Central Library raised more than \$46,000, which will be used for the support of various programs in the Beatley Library. Indeed, the Beatley Friends Spring Book Sale—one of our largest fundraisers of the year—begins on March 21. Your visit will enable you to pick up some excellent book bargains, and show *your* support for our public libraries.

Also, the citizens of Alexandria extensively use their public libraries' resources. In FY2016 there were more than 1,200,000 library visitors and web users. Thus there is a compelling case for you to maintain strong support of Alexandria's public libraries.

Re: Alexandria City Budget vs Potomac Yards Project

I ask that the city Council consider alternatives with which to cope with the current and future budgets. That is, consider abandoning, scaling down or delaying the Potomac Yard Metro project until such time that Metro regains its safety, ridership and economic viability.

Consider, the Council is requesting a 2.7 cent - or 2.5 percent - increase in our tax rate to cover various items including schools, sewage and unfunded mandates from the state and WMATA – that is, Metro alone will account for some \$40 million for 2018. Yet, these unfunded liabilities are reported to extend for several years and there is no consensus how local governments will come up with the money!!

Additionally, it is now reported in the Washington Post that the Trump administration plans to propose in its budget this week a historic contraction of the federal workforce 'of magnitude not experienced since World War II.' Per Moody's Analytics, the reductions would reduce employment in the region by 1.8 percent and personal income by 3.5 percent, and lower home prices by 1.9 percent.

If this holds true, Alexandria City government will need to raise taxes easily exceeding 5 percent just to offset the reduction in taxes from consumer spending and decrease in home prices!!! Add to the mix that the Metro ridership will continue to fall in proportion to the reduction in workforce!

As such, I ask:

- If the Council moves forward with the project, how will the City of Alexandria be able to afford this project – especially since its cost has risen from an initial estimate of \$150 MM in 2009 to \$275 MM presently? That is, can the city afford to fund a project of this magnitude coincident with continuing unfunded mandates and reduced necessity of this Metro stop?
- Will you consider abandoning this project and prioritize the funding and needs of the schools and other capital improvement plans?
- Will you consider delaying this project until there is clarity in size of the Federal workforce and the resulting economic health of the surrounding region?
- Will you consider a more cost effective alternative such as completing the MetroWay project and increasing service between Braddock Rd and Crystal City stations?

Good afternoon, Mayor Silberberg, Vice Mayor Wilson, and members of the City Council. Thank you for the opportunity to speak.

I am Bill Pfister and I request that you support our schools by adequately funding the operating and capital budgets put forth by ACPS this year and supporting the use of the Lee Center for swing space. The shortfalls in the City's currently proposed budget further squeeze the already compressed operating budget and perpetuate the notion that our community is okay with substandard educational facilities.

I grew up in Alexandria and attended ACPS before my family moved out of state. When my wife and I decided to move back to Northern Virginia five years ago, we choose Alexandria as the community where we wanted to raise our children. We now have three young children. Our oldest child is in first grade at Douglas MacArthur and our middle child is in the Preschoolers Learning Together program at John Adams. We are active with the PTAs and other activities at both schools, I participated on the Redistricting Review Committee as a representative for John Adams, and I am a member of MacArthur's PTA board.

While there are funding concerns throughout the entire school system, I am focusing on the elementary schools because I know them well and their funding is currently excluded from the City's proposed capital budget.

We need capacity and we need appropriate learning spaces throughout the city.

As of fall, ACPS had 8,091 elementary students enrolled, which was 116% of the 6,998 student capacity. The budget proposed by ACPS included plans to eliminate this gap through a capacity increase at three existing elementary schools. However, the City's proposed budget incorrectly described these projects solely as modernization and they were excluded.

MacArthur currently has 704 students enrolled although its specified capacity is only 554 students. This is 150 students more than it was designed for. Young children are learning in spaces not designed for education, such as large closets, hallways, and rooms with no natural light.

MacArthur needs a new building.

Rebuilding MacArthur is an opportunity to increase capacity but the root cause of the rebuild is the condition of this 75 year old facility. The physical building needs to be replaced because it is failing and we don't want to continue paying for band aids.

We had a cold snap during the December holidays last year and some of the older heating equipment ran into problems when the kids returned to school. MacArthur had 6 kindergarten classrooms, half of which lost heat. My 5 year-old at the time casually mentioned wearing his winter coat and gloves all morning. Keep in mind the outside temperature one of those mornings was 16 degrees. The school corrected the issues as quickly as possible but students still spent three mornings bundled up because this building and its equipment need to be replaced.

Strong schools are critical for attracting and retaining the people that make this city great.

I work in the district and one of my colleagues lived in Del Ray. Similar to me, he has three young children although his are slightly younger than mine. When he was looking to move from his previous home into something larger, schools weighed heavily in his decision. He loved his neighborhood but despite my best efforts to convince him that Alexandria cares about its school, he moved to Arlington. That decision was based entirely on schools.

The City's proposed 2018 Budget in Brief pamphlet lists the average Home Assessed Value as \$528k and 20% of the homes are appraised at more than \$750k. I have a hard time getting my head around the fact that the average property value in our city is more half a million dollars and we have children learning in windows-less classrooms and over-sized closets.

Swing Space is the first step in correcting overcapacity.

MacArthur is one of several of our elementary schools that do not have enough land to construct a new building while students attend the current facility. As such, we need swing space to hold students for the 1-2 years while each of their permanent schools is being built.

ACPS started down the path of considering Lee Center for this Swing Space but given the early pushback toward using this facility, they decided to ask for a greenfield / brownfield option in the budget. Therefore, this number is significantly larger than it needs to be. Although I don't necessarily agree with this approach, it was a move ACPS obviously felt was necessary. The easiest and most economical solution here is to make Lee Center work for swing space. It would reduce the first year capital request by roughly \$45 million.

The 10-year CIP also includes a new elementary school to be designed starting in 2026. If we leverage Lee Center for swing space and then transition it to a permanent elementary school, you effectively reduce the 10-year CIP by about \$90 million.

How do we pay for this?

We have a known, large capital need over the next ten years; not just with the schools but on infrastructure throughout our city. We also have debt capacity we are not fully utilizing. Given the historically low interest rates, now seems an opportune time to leverage this additional debt capacity in the form of a bond. This would help not only to soften the immediate impact by spreading tax burden more predictably over a longer period, but it also signals that the city is dedicated to the long-term well-being of our community and schools.

In closing, I'll just ask this question: do we want a school system that is so crowded that the youngest of our students have to eat lunch before 10:30am or where the equipment is so antiquated that they have to wear winter coats inside the classroom to stay warm? The school board and leadership have developed a budget that addresses these facilities issues and we need your support to fund these efforts now.

 Request Description: Thank you for your service. I am writing today in regards to capital funding for our City's schools. I am a longtime City resident, have two kids in ACPS, and recently spent 18 months volunteering on the redistricting review committee for the City.

Within 10 minutes of being on the redistricting review committee, it became obvious that ACPS has a MAJOR capacity issue at the elementary school levels. The middle and high school are facing a similar problem, too.

Poor planning and poor funding support in the past have brought us to where we are today. While I am pleased that we have funded new construction projects for our schools (new TC Williams, new Jefferson Houston, etc...), these projects do not even come close to addressing the needs of our school system. For example, George Mason elementary was built in the 1930s. Not only does it have 200 more students than it should from a capacity perspective, it has vermin problems from holes in the building. I've been told of wet walls. There are no rooms for art. A first-class city should not have third-world school facilities.

I did my part by participating in a plan that will reduce capacity at George Mason. Now, please do yours and fund construction projects that help make sure our students are educated in appropriate buildings. Not every new construction has to be the pristine level of the new TC Williams. But our City and our kids deserve better than they are getting now.

I also hope that as you look to the budget that you will not use the schools as a way to impose a massive tax increase and piggy back increases for other programs on the backs of the school funding. My understanding is that bond funding is possible in this instance. Please use bonding authority.

The needs of ACPS are so clear that I will simply not vote (and my neighbors won't either) for anyone who does not support the construction needs of our school system. I will also not support folks who vote to raise taxes at a significant rate under the guise that it is needed for school construction unless it is proven to me that the bonding authority is not an option or that it is directly tied to that level of an increase in the real estate tax.

- Request Description: I am writing to urge City Council to reconsider the funds earmarked for ACPS in this year's budget proposed by the City Manager, and to FULLY FUND Alexandria Public Schools. Both proposed shortfalls are extremely worrisome, given the capacity issues faced by the school system and the improvement sorely needed in all of the city's schools. Most troubling is the \$70million funding discrepancy between the city's proposed budget and ACPS's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Please try to view the funding request as a vital infrastructural issue (similar to the combined sewer issue also facing the city): every year, over a thousand additional students enroll in ACPS schools, and the city has been experiencing population growth in its schoolaged child demographic for several years after decades of decline. Because of these growing numbers, all elementary schools are bursting at the seams, middle schools are crowded, and our one high school faces critical facility and capacity issues which will only get worse each year. Overcrowding, aging buildings, and an operational budget that prohibits the schools from hiring and retaining the staff they need to keep up with such growth will cripple schools' abilities to serve our kids and neighborhoods. Not only will school-aged kids and their families be affected - a strong public school system will attract better businesses, young families, and contribute to the stability and safety of our unique neighborhoods, just as much if not exponentially more than smooth roads and reasonable taxes. I support a real estate tax increase, given the multiple pressures on the city budgets, but only if more of it goes to simply keeping up with the public school infrastructural demands proposed in ACPS' operating budget and CIP plan. My daughter attends Jefferson-Houston school, and I can't tell you how much the new facility has contributed to an atmosphere of concentrated learning, achievement, and the attitude that this city believes in all of its children, teachers, and neighborhoods. Please fully fund ACPS!

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Dear Mayor Silberberg and City Council Members,

I am writing on behalf of Douglas MacArthur Elementary School, where my son is in Kindergarten. Each year MacArthur is faced with overcrowding and an inadequate and aging facility. In January 2017, new guidelines were approved by the School Board in which more students were redistricted into MacArthur with the understanding that our school was first in line to be modernized within the next 5 years. We urgently need a new, future ready, capacity appropriate school, as has been promised over the past 10 plus years. As you can see from the timeline below, these discussions continue to stagnate.

- 2014 MacArthur actively pursued and was approved for a cafeteria expansion, yet (by Council action) this did not occur.
- 2015 MacArthur was approved for new building modernization in SY2018 and it was our full expectation that this would occur.
- 2016 MacArthur sought funds for swing space funds which were not included in the City's budget.
- 2017 Under the City Manager's FY2018 recommendation much needed modernization and swing space have been completely removed from the CIP budget.

At the very least, we request a CIP budget allocation that bears a closer resemblance to the funding request that reflects our true needs—the one provided to you by the Superintendent and School Board. Further, we urge you to consider all available means of financing capital projects to ensure that new construction and modernization can proceed as quickly as possible.

MacArthur has been over its student space limitation for years. We currently have 704 students enrolled in a building designed for 554 students. With student projections expected to increase throughout the city, where will these students attend school? We can no longer under prioritize MacArthur Elementary School's critical infrastructure needs. We realize that the City and its schools face serious budget concerns; however, investment in our schools and teachers is important to economic growth and the quality of life we enjoy in Alexandria. Studies have demonstrated that higher property values, greater productivity in local businesses, and greater business, economic, workforce and community development were all associated with quality K-12 education.

We are a proud city and should have first-class schools with the ability to attract and keep talented teachers and staff. I ask for your leadership and commitment to the modernization of our elementary schools. I ask that you reinstate Douglas MacArthur in the 2018 budget with adequate swing space and funding. Our community and children need your support.
