Background information

- Alexandria City currently has budget line item for Four Mile Run entrance improvements that include benches, signs and plantings
- Current entrance is unnamed
- Strong desire from residents to memorialize local history and figures while north Alexandria is being developed and modernized in the near future

Why name entrance after Mrs. Betty King?



- Betty King was a longtime resident of Hume Springs from 1985-2016. Her home overlooked Four Mile Run Park and she enjoyed long walks in the park on a daily basis
- Betty was involved in an official capacity with the City of Alexandria:
 - Member of the Arlandria Small Area Planning group
 - Member of the Four Mile Run Restoration Joint Task Force between Alexandria and Arlington
 - Ran for Alexandria City Council as an independent in 1991
 - Member of partnership between residents and Alexandria Police Department to eject drug dealers from the Hume Springs neighborhood in the 1990s
- Betty was deeply involved in her community:
 - Member and past officer of Hume Springs Citizens Association
 - Historical recorder of the Hume Springs area using photography and research
 - Volunteer science tutor to elementary and middle school neighborhood children for the Hume Springs Citizens Association's Thursday Night Tutoring Program
 - Biology professor (retired) at the Alexandria campus of NOVA influencing young adult Alexandrians pursuing STEM careers





On behalf of the *Hume Springs Civic Association I write this letter of endorsement for the naming of Four Mile Run park entrance located at the north end of Edison Street as the Betty King Entrance to Four Mile Run Park. Mrs King was a well-known, long-time resident in the area of this entrance according to multiple generations of Alexandrians who knew her to be an advocate for the surrounding neighborhoods, a teacher and mentor to youth, and a holder of historical knowledge for new residents.

Dr. Betty Louise Josephson King was the epitome of the citizen activist – community involvement in her Hume Springs neighborhood was a passion. She was a member and past Board Member of the Hume Springs Citizens Association, a member of the Arlandria Small Area Planning group and the Four Mile Run Restoration Joint Task Force between Alexandria and Arlington, and she even ran for Alexandria City Council in 1991. Betty had a concern for public safety and was part of a group of residents who were instrumental in ousting drug dealers from Hume Springs in the early 1990s. (<u>Washington Post link here</u>) Betty followed the community growth by taking professional photographs of families, children and the neighborhood. When the neighborhood had events or gatherings, Betty would display her beautiful framed pictures.

Betty's kitchen window overlooked Four Mile Run Park and her love for the parkland was apparent. Each day she would walk at least two miles in the park. She had a great love for animals and adopted several neighborhood cats and dogs over the course of her life. She loved all types of music, but her favorite venue was the Birchmere Music Hall. She enjoyed eating out and supported a variety of restaurants along northern Mt Vernon Avenue. After retirement from teaching she continued to tutor children in her Hume Springs neighborhood. As our "Biology Guru", her young students loved her!

Betty was a scientist, teacher, community activist, photographer, mother, grandmother, neighbor, and friend who lived in the Hume Springs neighborhood in north Alexandria from the early 1980's until she passed away in her home on Mark Drive last year on June 2, 2016. Betty attended McGill University and later graduated from Brandeis University with a degree in Russian. She went on to earn a Ph.D. in microbiology from Harvard University. She taught biology at Bard College and Skidmore College in New York State for several years before returning to the Washington DC area, where she was involved in the early formation and development of Northern Virginia Community College's biology department and taught for more than three decades.

Betty gave so much of herself to Alexandria and so freely to others, her legacy should live on and be memorialized with the naming of the Edison Street entrance of Four Mile Run Park.
