A statement by Bert Ely to the Alexandria City Council regarding the recent Residential Permit Parking survey

January 12, 2019

Mr. Mayor and members of Council I am Bert Ely and I live at 200 South Pitt. Let me begin by offering my congratulations to the new members of Council and to our new mayor. Given all the challenges facing Alexandria, the next three years will be quite momentous for Council and the City.

For the new members of Council, let me commend to you the Open Mic session that opens every Council public hearing, for Open Mic will give you a unique opportunity to hear directly concerns that Alexandrians have. Some may seem trivial or repetitious, but Open Mic gives citizens the unique opportunity to vent directly to Council while often focusing attention on emerging issues or on a supposedly-settled matter that is reemerging as an issue.

Speaking only for myself I would like to talk to you this morning about the supposedly settled process by which local residents initiate requests for changes in on-street parking restrictions, as administered through the Residential Permit Parking program, or RPP.

That civic virtue of citizen participation in resolving residential parking issues is why I and many others were quite troubled when City staff announced recently, and I quote, that "in order to proactively manage parking issues in residential areas, staff has been directed to identify specific circumstances when staff could also initiate the public process for changes" in the RPP. I for one would like to know who gave that directive.

Having twice served on the Old Town Area Parking Study, or OTAPS, I fully appreciate how time-consuming and contentious debates over changes in parking restrictions can be for City staff, yet these debates represent the essence of democracy, and specifically citizen participation in resolving, as best as possible, the conflicting parking needs of residents, visitors, and local businesses.

I fully appreciate staff frustration with these often time-consuming debates and continuing complaints from the public about the administration of the RPP and parking enforcement, but giving City staff <u>bureaucratic authority</u> to establish and alter parking districts and to change parking rules and restrictions runs counter to basis democratic principles, principles increasingly being challenged across the river and around the world.

Council should not consider the results of the very superficial and poorly constructed RPP questionnaire that staff recently conducted on-line to be a sufficient substitute for direct citizen involvement, discussion, and debate before any changes are made in the RPP.

Attached to my statement is a copy of that questionnaire. I do not have sufficient time to itemize its many shortcomings, including how it was distributed to the citizenry, but Council should disregard its results.

Instead, Council should create an RPP Advisory Group, composed of residents from across the City, to develop recommendations to Council as to how the RPP process should be improved as well as possible changes in the procedures of the Traffic and Parking Board.

Most importantly, this Advisory Group should make specific recommendations to Council as to what RPP decisions, <u>if any</u>, should be delegated to City staff and what decisions should remain with those residents directly affected by those decisions.

I fully appreciate why City staff, and especially those who feel they know best how to resolve specific parking issues, might reject this recommendation but in this time of growing authoritarianism, Council should resist reducing citizen involvement in the administration or modification of the RPP.


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

Chapter 7 Animals and Fowl

Sec 5-7-1 Swine prohibited

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or allow to be kept any swine within the city.
- (b) Violations of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 and not more than \$10. Each day of violation exists or continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. (Code 1963, Sec. 4-1)

I do not want to make agricultural pigs legal in the city, I want to make domestic pet mini pigs legal. This is an update to the current city ordinances to reflect current times.
