4. Councilman Aguirre reported that he visited the new WMATA bus garage in Bladensburg last month and noted the building would be LEED Platinum.

5. Councilman Aguirre reported that he attended an event hosted by WEBA in the West End of Alexandria at Taqueria Picoso.

6. Councilman Aguirre reported that he attended the National Drone Competition in Arlington, where middle school students from Alexandria were competing. Councilman Aguirre noted that the students from Francis Hammond Middle School placed second

in the competition and will be participating in the national competition.

12. Councilwoman Gaskins recognized Dick Black, longtime resident of the Rosemont neighborhood and founding member of the PELT committee. Councilwoman Gaskins noted that Mr. Black and his wife are moving out of the City and she wanted to thank them for all of their civic work in the community through the years.

13. Vice Mayor Jackson reported that she attended the inaugural Special Olympics event at the Basilica School of St. Mary's.

14. Vice Mayor Jackson reported that she gave welcoming remarks to the Council of Social Workers Education of Spring Governance during their event.

15. Councilman Chapman reported the NVRC has began its Solarize NOVA campaign, which runs from April 1 - June 30. Councilman Chapman noted that the goal was to make solar energy more accessible and affordable.

16. Councilmember Bagley reported that she participated in the Take Down Tobacco event sponsored by ACHS students to discourage the sell of tobacco products to minors. Councilmember Bagley noted that the students were escorted by members of Alexandria Police Department and Sheriff deputies.
