In response to Councilman Aguirre, Councilwoman Gaskins reported that there has been work on a compilation of a regional salaries for Councils and Boards of Supervisors and the next step to do a regional comparison of salaries.

Councilman Aguirre requested that staff begin looking at Council compensation. Mayor Wilson reminded Council that compensation for elected members may not be considered until 2025.
