Amend (h) to read as follows: Outside Agencies: Organizations outside the City government that receive funding support from the City must demonstrate an alignment of their efforts with accomplishments of the City's strategic priorities and show efficiencies and cost saving measures.

Add a section (j) to read as follows: Alignment with Council Priorities: The City Manager shall provide the City Council with an overview of how the proposed budget prioritizes investments in equity, environmental justice, civility, transparency, respect and service and include the scored results of the Budget Equity Tool process as an appendix for the transparent evaluation of equity impacts in our final decision.
